

LONDON ADOPTS "AMERICAN QUICK LUNCH CUSTOM"

Business Men in English Metropolitan Forsaking Time-Honored Midday Feast for Light Meal at Noon.

LONDON, May 31.—London business men are adopting the American quick lunch idea and are not eating as much as formerly.

Dr. W. J. Howarth, medical officer for the health of the city of London, commenting in his annual report on the reduction of the number of "the more expensive and luxurious city restaurants," said:

"The heavy meal of former days is being replaced—I am referring to the successful men in the higher administrative ranks—by a lighter meal, consisting not a quarter of the time and was the custom in years gone by, when lunch was a sort of a midday feast."

"The increase in the number of cheaper restaurants has recently benefited a large number of people, who take a sandwich and milk, tea or coffee at the noon hour."

Mrs. Wilfred Ashley, wife of the minister of transport, bought her home recently to Lady Edith, who entered into London and Lady Beading who had just returned from India.

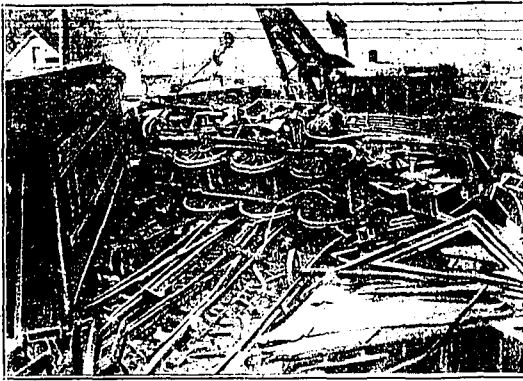

ANOTHER RELIC OF 2000
YEAR OLD RACE IS FOUND
TALLAHASSEE, Fla., May 31 (AP)—Remains of a race believed to have existed in Florida 2,000 years ago, have been dug up in Broward county.

Near a burial mound was discovered an idol, five feet tall, made of raw mangrove, or "cottonwood," as it is called by those who consider it non-descript. The features, surprisingly those of a female, were carved from white, "they were made of the Mangrove tree. The lady was fashioned from wood."

Scientists found the burial mound about 200 yards from the Atlantic ocean. It is one of the highest spots of the country and the site of the first white settlers who came to Florida.

Composers See New American Music Of Melody and Rhythm in Offing

NEW YORK, May 31 (AP)—American composers and lyricists here believe that out of the blues, jazz and rag of recent years is coming a new American music of melody and rhythm.

The development has been gradual, but from now on it may be expected to become pronounced. "For composers are devoting themselves more and more to music of a serious vein."

"Jazz," in the opinion of George Gershwin, who wrote "Symphony in Blue," has attracted wide attention, "all things be with us, even though it may change its form and color. Any music typical of America will feed and express its influence."

Jazz has been looked upon, until by many people, and rightly so, because in a majority of instances it has been incorrectly played. Properly played, it is very hard to play. The real jazz compositions of today can hardly be recognized as related to those of the past.

On the other hand, Jerome Kern who wrote "Show Boat," "Sally" and "Stepping Stones," looks upon jazz as merely a treatment of music. Since it is generally recognized that classical music, as well as popular music, may be jazzed, he believes composers not be turning to the writing of more serious compositions.

Significant numbers of famous composers are turning to the writing of more serious compositions. "The Student Prince" and "Princess Thyra," is convinced the new type jazz is dying out and the trend is toward something more serious and beautiful. The jazz that remains, he said, is of a higher and better type than the old.

"For the last five or six years, our composers have been interested in finding new rhythms," said Otto Harbach, who wrote the lyrics for "Sunset," "Rose Marie" and "Band of the Future," the last two especially noted for their approach toward the grand opera type of music.

"They have developed a lot of three-measure measures and beautiful, but in this concentration, they neglected melody. Now the trend is back toward melody. It seems to me that we are to have many beautiful melodies of the kind which appear to come spontaneously from the author's mind. The kind which run smoothly and are free from the taint of having been manufactured."

"The new American music, I believe, will be found in these melodies, through which will run the charming rhythms we have found and developed."

DESERT STATES HOLD
VAST TIMBER AREAS

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., May 31 (AP)—Minerals of New Mexico and Arizona as forest states would get a high out of the average person, because the popular fancy is that this section is part of the "Great American Desert," sprinkled with cacti and yucca.

Yet figures of the logging division of the U. S. forestry service disclose the fact that one-fifth of the total area of these states is timber. Chiefly redwood, pine, the total timbered area comprises 20,000,000 acres, estimated to contain 300,000,000 feet of saw timber and 1,000,000,000 cubic feet of wood.

An unbroken stretch of yellow pine extends from the country west of the Elephant Butte dam in New Mexico to the rim of the Grand Canyon and across into the Kaibab National forest.

ANAHIM, Cal., May 31 (AP)—Milton McMillan, geologist, was at the scene of the wall of a canyon near where a small cave was discovered. He set off a dynamite charge expecting to uncover a honey comb. BRITAIN'S LONELY ISLAND
SUFFERS OVER-POPULATION.
LONDON, May 31 (AP)—Britain's loneliest possession, the island of Tristan da Cunha, is suffering from over-population.

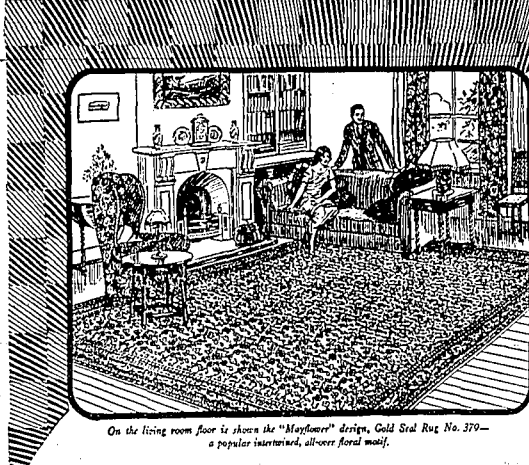
There are 140 persons on the island, which is nearly double the population of 20 years ago, and the food supply has run short. The island is located in the middle of the Atlantic on a line between the Cape of Good Hope and Buenos Aires. It is only two miles long and contains two or three other smaller volcanic islands.

Most of the population consists of shipwrecked sailors and wives who were brought from St. Helena. Potatoes are the chief crop, but they were a failure this year.

GOODYEAR IN IS VICTORIOUS. American Balloons Is Winner of Bennett Trophy in Dangerous Race.

BRUNSWICK, May 31. (AP)—The balloon Goodyear III, manned by Wade T. Van Orman with Walter W. Morgan assisting, won what is considered here one of the most difficult and dangerous races for the Gordon Bennett trophy in 29 years. The Goodyear landed safely, having covered 528 miles under exceptionally arduous conditions, assisted in part by wind, rain and squalls. The balloons took off late yesterday afternoon from the aviation field near Antwerp.

The admission of aeronauts climbed the splendid achievement is marked by the anxiety over the fate of John A. Hottel, head of the other American balloon, the Akron N. A. A., of whom Hottel has been heard since his companion, H. W. Maxson, was bumped out of the balloon almost at the start, in a violent disintegration.

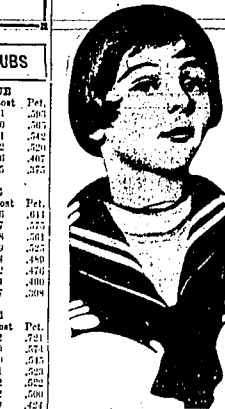
The Belgian Aero club has asked the British, Swedish and Danish authorities to be broadcast that Hottel is missing and to request shipping to keep a sharp lookout.

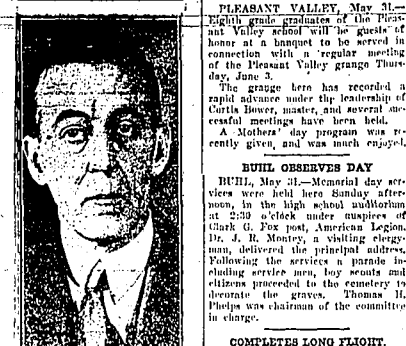
