NO TAX BOOST REQUIRED FOR BOND PAYMENT

Elimination of Warrant Redemption Fund Levy
Makes Room for \$37,000
Item for Waterworks.

Twin Falls will raise \$37,000 this year to meet the first of 10 equal annual payments to retire an issue of \$375,000 worth of waterworks improvement bonds without material increase in the municipal tax levy as compared with last year, according to a resolution made Monday evening by J. L. Noyes, city clerk.

Results of Commission.
The municipal tax levy for bond interest and sinking funds this year, according to the clerk's computation, will be approximately \$2,000, or an increase of 15.3 mills last year. This year's tax levies this year, the clerk will be about 33.5 mills as against 24 mills last year. Saving will be made in the elimination of the warrant redemption fund levy and in reduction of the general expense fund levy made possible by anticipated collection of approximately \$20,000 on account of warrant redemption fund levies previously made.

WOMEN'S PART IN FIELD OF POLITICS DISCUSSED

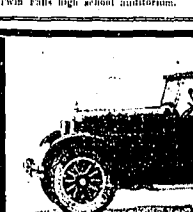

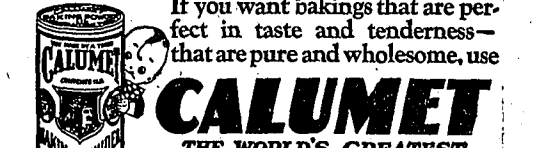
