# WHEAT PRICES MOVE HIGHER

Adverse Crop Reports Sends Breadstuff Up; Corn and Oats Reach Season's Low.

CHICAGO, June 30. (AP)—Wheat holding a temporary setback due to lack of farm legislation at Washington, prices today scored gains. Corn and oats also made a new price record for the season. Barley, feed and durum wheat reported northward had much to do with rallying the market. Closing quotations on wheat were similar to the same as yesterday's close to 14.60, while corn rose to 2.35 cents, oats, 4.45 cents off and provision showing 12 to 25 advance.

Wheat, which was on a large scale chiefly in connection with the spring wheat outlook. For at least the time being, the news concerning winter wheat was generally assumed to have been dictated fully the fact that most of the grain was limited tomorrow were expected to be buffered into spring wheat tended to moderate buying and so likewise did one advance forecast that the yield of four principal northwestern states would not exceed 77,700,000 bushels this season, and probably would be less.

**Offerings Increase.**  
Increased country offerings of wheat and barley were reflected in something of a reaction in the market dealings. On the other hand, considerable notice was taken of reports of a tendency developing among farmers in Kansas to hold when faced with the prospect of bad weather for the harvest in the southwest continued and Liverpool quotations were lower than had been looked for. Wheat at Liverpool was accepted at 14.60 cents, an auspicious showing of harvest in India. Figures on export shipments from Northwest were widely of variance.

Corn and oats were depressed but only by news from Washington but by indications of heavy deliveries of corn here tomorrow on truck lots. Provisions were responsive to trucking buying and to an upward trend in oil values.

**STAGE SERVICE  
TO BE EXTENDED  
BY NEW OWNER**

W. I. Colclough of Hoquiam, Washington, Operator of Many Passenger Busses, Buys Blue Line.

The Blue Line motor stage line, plying passenger buses on daily schedule between Twin Falls and Jerome, has been purchased by W. I. Colclough of Hoquiam, Washington, operator of a number of passenger busses on the Pacific Northwest. It was sold last Wednesday evening by E. E. Smith, who, with H. G. Munson, has owned and operated the Blue Line for three years past. Ownership of the Blue Line will now rest with W. I. Colclough. The transaction is regarded as a step toward linking the Twin Falls bus line with the truck line system of motor stage lines from Salt Lake to Portland.

Plans Through Service—It is the reported purpose of the new owner to establish motor stage service from Twin Falls to Portland and from connection with other motor stage lines to include the entire Pacific coast from Canada to Mexico. Motor stage lines owned by Mr. Colclough include those now in operation between Weiser, Idaho, and Baker, Oregon, between Pendleton and Portland.

Drivers in the employ of the Blue Line will be retained under the new ownership, it was stated.
