## ADJOURNMENT PLANNED FOR END OF WEEK

### House and Senate Leaders Arrange to Bring Present Session of Congress to Close Saturday, July 3.

(By The Associated Press.)  
WASHINGTON, June 30.—Adjournment of congress today is planned by house and senate leaders. The chief stumbling block in a general adjournment is the bill to remove by amendment the agreement, reached by the senate, to take that measure up on December 11, under Hamilton of Idaho, that would make a final vote before the Christmas adjournment.

Unhappily, the house, whose relations to the senate are strained, is virtually in a deadlock, began yesterday to take up the bill. The senate committee ordered a resolution reported Friday at 2 o'clock Saturday a vote hour of adjournment.

It will be reported to the house tomorrow with indications that it will pass without serious objections. It will then be sent to the senate, where leaders predict it also will be accepted without material opposition.

The bill to provide a committee for railroads, was taken up today by the senate with its managers, hoping that it can be passed by the senate and agreed to by the house before adjournment. The second deficiency bill which must be passed before adjournment was taken up by the senate today, but will be taken up tomorrow and leaders hope it will be passed before the adjournment on Friday night.

**Battle for Place.**  
With the house disposing of bills and with the senate in a deadlock, a battle for place is expected to follow the adjournment of the senate. 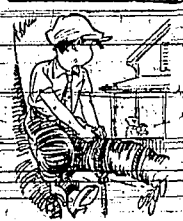

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# WHEAT PRICES MOVE HIGHER

Adverse Crop Reports—Sends  
Broadstuff Up; Corn and Oats  
Reach Season's Low.

CHICAGO, June 30. (AP)—Notwithstanding a temporary setback due to defeat of farm legislation at Washington, wheat values today moved higher, and were largely due to a new low price record for the season. Drought, heat and adverse crop reports north-west had much to do with raising the wheat market. Closing settlement wheat was unsettled, at the same as yesterday's, 1.18 1/2 higher, from 1.16 to 1.18 1/2 down, 1.16 to 1.18 1/2 off and provisions showing 12 to 25 advance.

Trading in wheat was on a large scale, chiefly in connection with upward developments regarding the spring wheat outlook. For at least the time being, the news concerning winter wheat was generally assumed to have been discounted in full. The fact that small-milled-middling wheat was sold at 1.18 1/2, and that the price of the same was 1.16 1/2, was an advance forecast that the yield in the four principal northwestern states would not exceed 175,000,000 bushels this season, and probably would be less.

Offerings increase.  
Increased country offerings of wheat in western from Illinois northward led to something of a reaction in the final dealings. On the other hand, corn and oats were more active, and a tendency developed among farmers in Kansas to hold wheat back for higher prices. Meanwhile favorable weather for the harvest of the wheat was continued and Liverpool quotations were lower than had been looked for. Weakness at Liverpool was ascribed more or less to a premature beginning of harvest in Italy. Figures on export business from North America were widely active.

Corn and oats were depressed not only by news from Washington but also by indications of heavy deliveries of corn here tomorrow on July 1. Provisions were responsive to packers buying and to an upward trend in hog values.

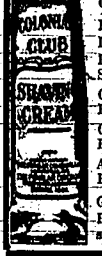

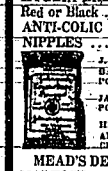
