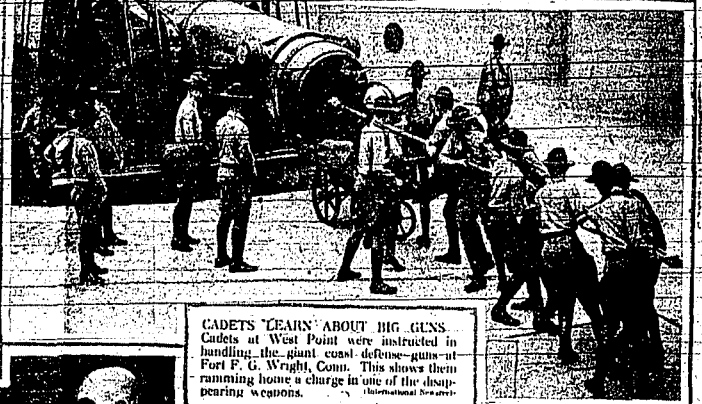

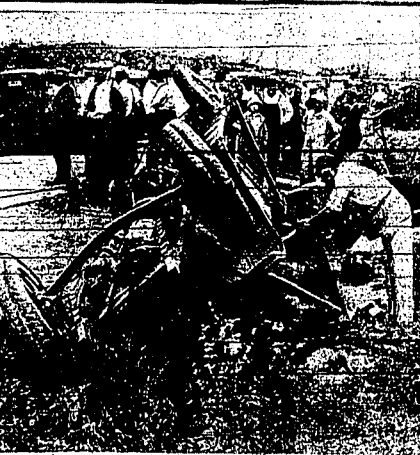

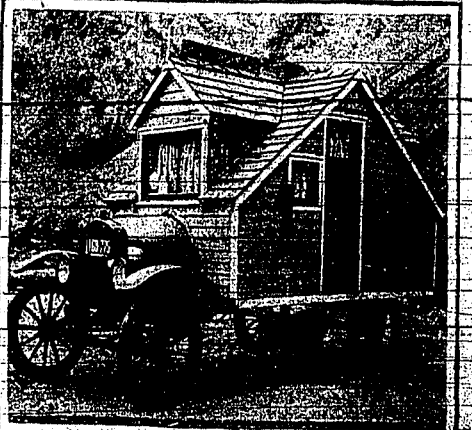

NOTED STATISTICIAN SYMPATHETIC WITH FARMERS OF THE NORTHWEST

Roger W. Babson Makes Study of Agricultural Conditions; Comments on Political Situation and Its Effect on Business and Investments.

BABSON PARK, July 10. (Special to The News.)—In view of the crop reports coming from the Central West, Roger W. Babson has been making a special study of the conditions of crops and the farmers, in connection with his conditions. Mr. Babson conducted the political situation and its effect on business and investments.

Farmers Very Unhappy. First, let me say that the crop situation is not nearly as bad as the headlines in the papers would make it out to be. It is true that the spring wheat is below the ten year average, but when you look at the larger average planted, may exceed last year's production. The crops differ, some showing an improvement over last year, and others showing a decline. It is too early to make any definite forecasts regarding crops, but most other fruits, grapes and most other fruits should have a good year. So much for the general crop situation as a whole. Not only will there probably be fairly good production, but, owing to favorable conditions, the total value of the crops for 1926 should compare favorably with 1925.

When one studies definite localities, however, he finds the country very quiet. Certain sections are doing well, while other sections are doing poorly. South Dakota and adjoining sections, which had considerable improvement in conditions a year ago, is again in trouble. I believe that the farmers of South Dakota are in a very difficult position today. Their position is not as good as it was a few years ago at the height

of their production. Although then suffering from poor crops, yet the latter were hopeful that certain socialist experiments would bring them safety through. They started state grain elevators, farmers' banks and other experiments, but these failed. Hence the northwestern farmers today are not only against a bad agricultural situation, but have no remedy in mind to stimulate them for the years to come.

This same situation is spreading to Iowa, Nebraska, Oklahoma, and other states. Although we may see no immediate economic solution for the farmers' troubles, these troubles nevertheless are very real, and we must face them as such. The average western farmer would be inclined to say:

High Expenses Trouble. The farmers have not been bothered with droughts and pests as in the old days. Crop failures, such as occurred in the thirties, have not been the cause of their troubles. The good work of agricultural departments, both federal and state, and that of agricultural colleges, agricultural journals, etc., have caused the farmers to diversify their crops and to farm more intelligently. Moreover, the prices which they receive for the crops are fairly good. Of course, the prices of some today, with all the crop raising, do not compare with the prices of crops when all the people of Europe were fighting. If, however, you eliminate the five years of war, you will find that prices today compare very well with a ten or twenty year average of other cereals or other commodities such as wool, copper, lead, etc. The

farmers' troubles are not due to either crop failures or low prices. The farmers' troubles are due to the fact that their expenses have increased more in the past ten years than their income. During the war the farmers' cost of production was suddenly raised to a much higher level. Since the war the income has dropped off, but the cost of production has "stuck up." There is no question but that today the farmers have very little net income and many are operating at a loss. The difficulty, however, is not with the quality of the crop or the price received, but the trouble is due to increased operating expenses. These increased expenses apply not only to the business end of the farm, but to the personal end of the farmer's life. The farmer's wife and children will not use themselves, work as they did before the war; they require better homes, more conveniences, newer clothes and many other things about which they know nothing before. The automobile has taken the family about and thus added to the difficulty for most farmers and families like other people. In even this, our sympathies must be with the wives and children who raise one food and who should have just as good things as we who eat their food.

East Against West. These western farmers would feel very much better if we western people were suffering at the same time from industrial troubles. The fact is, that while the western farmer has been working hard and running in debt, his eastern friends have been living in ease and comfort. This is due to the fact that the price of manufacturing materials has automatically increased as the cost of

production increased. Although the manufacturing costs and the personal expenditures of eastern people have increased just as much as in the case of the western farmer, yet the easterners have been able to provide for these increased costs by securing increased prices for their products. Not being trained in world economics, the western farmer thinks there is some magic power in the fact of the east rather than the west.

This unfortunate situation is aggravated by what has happened in land values. If farmers had been obliged to keep books the same as business men, they would probably have found that they have made money on the actual production of crops. Even in the good days farmers made their money by having all the family at work without wages, and by enjoying the sensation of constant increasing land values. If, however, the farmer looked more at the worst, the farmer looked more at the price of the land than he did at his business profits. As long as he could get on without getting into debt and the price of his farm was constantly increasing in value, he was happy. In respect of whether or not he made money in the operation of the farm, the farmer who bought land at \$3 to \$5 an acre, now it is constantly increasing in value to \$100 or \$200 per acre. When I used to argue with them as to whether or not they were making money, they would reply: "We care nothing for your statistics, as long as the price of our farm is increasing in value. This tells the real story. This was especially encouraging to

the farmer in those days because the price of eastern property was not then increasing. Property in the east showed a much greater increase in value as property in the west.

Love-mast Situation. During the past few years this situation has entirely changed. Western farm values have been steadily declining in price since 1918, while property in the East has been steadily increasing. The psychological effect of this upon the western farmer has been very bad. If land in Pennsylvania, the Carolinas, and Florida, had been going down in price as had the price of land in Iowa, the Iowa farmer would be much happier today.

Let us have the price of the Iowa land go down while the price of the land in these other sections has gone up, and the farmer's situation would be much improved. The difficulty, which troubles President Coolidge is that the farmers' troubles are not fundamentally economic, but are of a political nature. The price of crops or poor prices, but to high operating costs and to the dissatisfaction which comes from living with poorer neighbors. No one is more interested in the farmers of the West than President Coolidge, but he must be honest with the farmer and with himself. For a temporary political advantage he is not going to do what two plain men make fire. Every farmer should respect him for his rugged honesty.

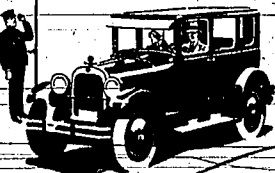
What the ultimate result of this unfortunate situation will be, no one can tell. It, however, is certain that the present inequalities between the

East and the West cannot continue. Lincoln said that a country cannot live on half fire and on half slavery. I say that a country cannot live on half prosperity and on half despair. A leveling up process is inevitable. Land cannot continue to go up in the east and down in the west. Labor cannot continue to go up in the east without the price of food products going up likewise. I believe that the solution to the problem will come about through a general business readjustment throughout the country as a whole rather than through the quick readjustment which Hoover and others suggest. Of course, such a readjustment would be harsh upon securities and might also be harsh on the republican party. Presidents and political about through a general business readjustment, but business conditions do make readjustment and political parties. For this reason it will probably be wise for both politicians and business men to get out and carry good books around. There may be storms ahead and it is wise to be prepared. 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CROW CHIEFTAIN WAITS SUNDAYS

Plenty Coos, Picturesque Leader of Tribe, Begins to Contemplate Call of Great Spirit.

HELENA, Mont., July 10. (AP)—His right shoulder with gray hair, Plenty Coos, picturesque and venerable chief of the Crow nation, has begun to contemplate the summons of the Great Spirit.

Although almost seventy years of age, the Crow chief believes that the "Great Spirit" will call him to his people's side.

Plenty Coos has acquired more than local fame. He is known to the thousands of Indians who live in the Crow reservation at the Little Bighorn. He will make at least one more public appearance as head of the Crow nation at the annual observance of the battle of the Little Bighorn, June 25, 1926.

When completed, the Brooklyn bridge across the East river was one of the wonders of the world. Its span is 1,595 feet and its cables are 15 3/4 inches in diameter. The Delaware river bridge cables are 30 inches in diameter.

Asked why she left the opera stage at the zenith of her success, the singer said: "It is better that I leave now, when everyone is asking why, than to leave later when my ability might be less."

Mme. Sembrich often speaks of Caruso. She sang opposite him eight years.

Warned at Tenor's Voice. "Well do I recall his debut. He was then a polished artist and his voice was the same golden voice that in later years was to make him famous; that was more the lyric than the heroic tenor."

"I never at any time, when singing with Caruso, entertained the slightest doubt as to perfect co-operation on his part. His voice was unique. I was impressed the first time I heard it, with its warmth, its big body. And then he knew how to manage it. Oh, how he could manage it!"

"There were times when he was suffering from a cold, when he would sing to me. Unless the cold was very severe, he would sing to me. A pressure of the hand will let you know I am feeling fine."

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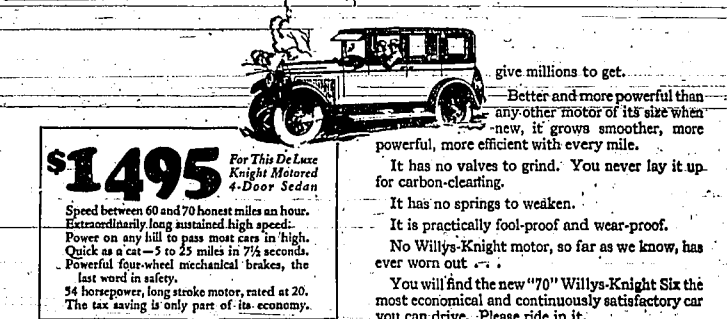

BRIDGE OPENED TO PUBLIC USE

Century-Old Dream Comes True When Greatest Suspension Structure Is Dedicated.

PHILADELPHIA, July 10. (AP)—A dream of one hundred years came true on July 1, when Pennsylvania and New Jersey joined hands in dedicating and formally opening to traffic the greatest suspension bridge in the world.

Since the early days of the nineteenth century the inhabitants of southern New Jersey and of Philadelphia urged a bridge across the historic Delaware, but a disinclination to go to the great expense always blocked the project.

As it stands, the bridge cost \$37,000. Thirteen workers lost their lives during its construction.

It is the only public bridge over the Delaware between Philadelphia and the sea, 100 miles distant. The span between the main piers is 1,200 feet, the longest of its kind in the world, and the length of the whole structure, from sixth and third streets, Philadelphia, to sixth and fourth streets, Camden, is 2,720 feet, or one and three-quarters miles.

When completed, the Brooklyn bridge across the East river was one of the wonders of the world. Its span is 1,595 feet and its cables are 15 3/4 inches in diameter. The Delaware river bridge cables are 30 inches in diameter.
