SMELT-BACKED REGION FACES NEWER DANGER

Smoldering Flames Flare Anew With Shifting of Wind at Scene of Disastrous Blast; Secretary Wilbur on Job.

(By the Associated Press.) DOVER, N. J., July 12. (AP)—Newly smoldering flames were feared for the threat of another disastrous blast which tonight.

Secretary of the Navy Wilbur, who was on the scene, ordered the searching parties from the devastated area with the view of turning the flames toward the magazines as yet unexploded and the most blasts as silent as those of Saturday.

Naval officers said that the bodies were so badly mangled that they would be impossible until duplicate records containing finger-prints and dental records, arrived at the hospital here in Washington.

Identification of one body as that of private Morris Hancock, of the Marines and another as that of Harry Christian, Brown, platoon leader, 3rd Marine Battalion, Poughkeepsie, N. Y., brought the number of identified dead to four.

Funeral services, the first for a victim of the disaster, were held tonight at the home of Sgt. William Weeks, his brother-in-law.

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

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# TWIN FALLS BOY FATAALLY HURT IN AUTO MISHAP

### Robert Simpson, 19, Son of R. E. Simpson, Dies From Effects of Injuries When Car Overturns in Colorado.

Robert Simpson, 19-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Simpson, of Twin Falls, died early Sunday morning as a result of injuries sustained when the automobile in which he and L. E. Barrett, Jr., of Colorado Springs, were riding overturned on the street as they were leaving Starbuoy evening on Thursday.

The hour will be brought here by Charles Tracy of the Simpson family, a local company, who left here Sunday evening for Colorado Springs, and a local service will be held here and general on Thursday or Friday.

William, manager of the vehicle, was at home alone when word of the fatal accident was received. ### FRANCE LITS NEW LOW

PARIS, July 12 (AP)—At the very hour Mr. Cullinan was signing the Anglo-French loan agreement, the franc sank in Paris to the lowest level ever reached; the dollar selling at 40.

### POSTPONE CRISIS IN N. Y. SUBWAY STRIKE

NEW YORK, July 12 (AP)—The crisis in the subway strike was postponed for 24 hours today.

The Interborough Rapid Transit company announced that strikers would have until noon tomorrow to return to work or be permanently removed from the payroll. The "new" hour had been set for noon today, but company officials announced they had received reports that men who wanted to return to work were being intimidated by strike pickets. They said that police would be applied to prevent intimidation.

The principal development today in the strike was the report of impending victory by strike leaders and company officials, who reported that the first serious talking since the strike began.

## CHARGES DEATH TO MOONSHINE

### County Physician Attributes Passing of Traveling Sales- man to Liqueur.

Moonside, Idaho, according to Dr. J. B. Langewieser, county physician, claimed another victim when J. J. Bauer, Spokane, salesman for a health concern, died early Sunday in a hospital here without regaining consciousness from the time he was discovered at about noon Saturday in a room in a local lodging house. A sister in Oshkosh, Wis., was communicated with and arrangements were made for transportation of the body to Oshkosh for burial.

Bauer, who greatly emaciated, and there were indications of chronic disease. There were no marks of violence. He was found in a room that had been rented Friday evening to H. S. Thompson, L. S. Johnson, Kenneth H. W. Parker, and a man named Harry Stewart. Thompson and Bauer told their officers that Bauer had retired and that they had not seen him since.

Later, Bauer left the room early next morning, while Thompson did not wake until about noon to find Bauer in a critical condition.

Identification of the dead man was made by means of business cards, a badge card and memorandum bearing the name of his sister who was notified in case of accident or death.

## GETS 24-YEAR SENTENCE

## PLAN DRASTIC REFORMS

DENVER, Colo., July 12 (AP)—Drastic reforms in criminal procedure are contained in a code proposed by the national crime commission and first here of the opening of the session of the National Association of Attorney Generals preliminary to the convention of the American bar association which opens Wednesday.

## KELLOGG DENIES RUMOR

WASHINGTON, July 12 (AP)—The state department today made formal denial of a widely published report that Secretary Kellogg had advised President Coolidge that so far as the United States and Great Britain are concerned the preparatory work connected with the evacuation of German troops in Geneva has collapsed.

"The secretary of state declared that no report of this nature had been received from the American delegates at Geneva," said the department's statement. "Nor has he sent to the president at White House any report dealing with this subject."

## CONFLICTING CLAIMS MADE BY CONGRESSMEN

WASHINGTON, July 12 (AP)—Conflicting claims as to the financial necessities of the recent session of congress were set forth in statements today by the members of the house appropriations committee and Representative Bryan of Missouri, the ranking democratic member.

Mr. Madden asserted the record for the session and the "traditional capacity of the republican party for a businesslike conduct of the government commented sharply to every thoughtful republican member of the house. The light of the facts ought to be rendered that the republican administration has kept faith with the principal and fulfilled its promise of economy."

Senator Warren of Wyoming, chairman of the senate finance committee, also issued a statement taking a position similar to Madden and asserting that "no session has ever made a greater record than the republican administration and faithful effort for economy in public expenditures."

## BANDITS MAKE BIG HAUL IN NOON-HOUR HOLDUPS

LOS ANGELES, July 12 (AP)—Bandits in a series of daring holdups, totaling three banks here and in Pasadena within an hour's time today, and escaped with loot estimated in excess of \$250,000.

The first haul was reported by officials of the Pacific National bank when Hollywood branch was robbed of approximately \$100,000.

While police were being dispatched to the scene, a second call came in headquarters from the Human bank branch in an opposite section of the city, where two bandits heavily armed held up two employees and escaped with \$25,000.

Simultaneously, bandits held up a branch of the Bankers National bank at Pasadena, obtaining an undetermined amount of money.



# EIGHTH AVENUE PROJECT COST GIVEN COUNCIL

## Continuing Irrigation Stream to Under-ground Channel and Graveling of Thoroughfare Claims Attention.

Building of an underground conduit to carry waters away from an open ditch known as the Eighth avenue ditch and graveling and widening of Eighth avenue from the bridge to the city limits will involve an expense of approximately \$100,000 as a maximum of \$250,000 for each foot of the length of the thoroughfare, according to estimates submitted by E. V. Penick, city engineer, to Twin Falls city council at a regular meeting Monday evening.

Members of the council expressed the opinion that the expense to be incurred would be reduced materially by contribution to the project by the Twin Falls Canal company, which, they asserted, is responsible for maintenance of the ditch.

### Petition for Improvement

A petition well developed plans for the proposed improvement of a local improvement district will be formed for the purpose of including the stream and graveling the street, and opening the city against owners of property abutting on the thoroughfare. Information on the petition is being distributed by the city engineer, who is advised, however, that the council will not advise him of the project unless signed by many of the property owners affected.

# WAREHOUSE MEN FOR REGULATION

## Southern Idaho Operators Call for State Appropriation to Continue Work.

Appropriation of adequate funds to maintain the work of state and federal authorities in charge of warehouse regulations will be urged upon the next session of the Idaho legislature by warehousemen of southern Idaho who, at a meeting here Monday, adopted resolutions desiring legislation to the state lawmakers for such an appropriation.

More than 50 warehouse owners and operators representing territory from Aberdeen to Gooding attended the meeting. A. W. B. Kistner, state commissioner of agriculture, presided. Warehouse regulations and the work of warehouse authorities were explained by H. L. Stangler, in charge of the administration of the state bonded warehouse law, Jesse W. Walter, supervisor of the federal bonded warehouse law in Idaho, and Hubert Roberts, warehouse inspector.

The meeting declared in favor of adoption by warehousemen of a warehouse receipt that would be uniform in its terms and content. It deemed necessary a suggested regulation providing for printing of warehouse receipts by a central printer under the supervision of the department of agriculture. Warehousemen at the meeting expressed the opinion that the existing warehouse laws should be extended to include for issuance of warehouse receipts for cotton and wool other than those of legitimate origin, as well as for potatoes, grain, leguminous beans, hay, fruit and wheat.

# Season for Final Spraying at Hand

Warms are beginning to enter up in the Twin Falls area and the second spray for worms should be applied immediately to gain the best results. The spraying is now in progress.

A thorough job of spraying should be done at this time, since this, the inspector stated, undoubtedly is the best spray that will be recommended this season. Later spraying will be discouraged on account of trouble caused by increased resistance to which various objects have been raised on some markets.

The formula recommended for this spray is six pounds of arsenic in a barrel of 100 gallons of water.
