British Chancellor of Exchequer Presents Text of Agreement Between France and England to Commons Body.

(By The Associated Press.)
LONDON, July 13.—The text of the Anglo-French agreement signed yesterday by the chancellor of the exchequer, Charles Montagu, and the French minister of finance, Raymond Poincaré, is virtually identical with the version presented today to the house of commons by the British chancellor.

(1) The first article sets forth the amount that France has agreed to pay in French sterling treasury bills which Great Britain holds to the amount of 653,127,000 pounds (three hundred and fifty-three million one hundred and twenty-seven thousand pounds), rising to 12,000,000 pounds annually, the term of payment being reached in 1930. From 1930 to 1935, the payment would be 12,000,000 pounds annually rising to 14,000,000 pounds by 1935.

(2) Under clause two, France will deliver to the British treasury, on or before September 15, 1926, a bond for each installment provided for in article one.

(3) Payments due under all bonds issued in accordance with the agreement, shall be made without deduction for, and shall be exempt from any and all taxes and other public dues, present or future, imposed by any government of France or any political authority having jurisdiction over the same.

(4) France at her own option, and not less than 60 days' notice to Great Britain, may postpone payment of a part not exceeding one-half of the yearly installment in any subsequent year, provided that the total of the three years' installments in any such year shall not exceed the total of the three years' installments in any other year. This is only on condition that in case France exercises this option, the installment falling due in the year succeeding year can not be postponed more than all previous installments have been paid in full. In such event, payments shall bear interest of five per cent payable semi-annually.

(5) Article five provides that in the event that the aggregate payments to Great Britain under the bill—

Forty-Ninth Annual Convention of American Bar Association Gets Under Way.

DENVER, Colo., July 13. (AP)—Headquarters were opened here today in behalf of George W. Wickham, former attorney general of the United States and now resident of the American Institute, Dean Roscoe Johnson of the Harvard law school and Jefferson P. Chandler, Los Angeles attorney. The three candidates for the office of president of the American Bar association, which will open its forty-ninth annual convention tomorrow.

On the evening of the meeting Denver was host to 1000 of the leading barristers of the nation. The day opened with a special train from every part of the country poured new delegates into the city and the delegates of the convention expect that 2500 lawyers and members of their families will be present when the president of the association, opens the general sessions tomorrow.

Chief of these in importance was the conference of the bar association delegates, the national branch of the American Bar association. The convention is attended by three delegates from each state in the country and two delegates from each bar association (local) within the state.

Captain George Wilkins Outlines to Have Done More Actual Exploring Than Byrd.

REAR, July 13. (AP)—The Detroit Arctic expedition did more actual exploration than did Lieutenant Commander Byrd on his polar flight, and covered three times the distance, according to Captain George Wilkins, leader of the Detroit Arctic expedition, here today to Detroit on the ship's return from the Arctic.

"I am not discounting his wonderful feat, but I wish to point out what we accomplished," he said.

On March 31, Wilkins and Lieutenant Carl H. Ellsaw flew 150 miles north of Barrow into the unexplored region between Barrow and the pole. They went 70 miles farther into that territory than any other human being, Lieutenant Commander Byrd.

Mother of Los Angeles Evangelist Appears Before Grand Jury in Probe of Disappearance of Her Daughter

Mrs. Minnie Kennedy Stocks to Original Tale in Regard to Ransom Letter; Denies Rumors of Family Quarrels.

LOS ANGELES, July 13. (AP)—Minnie Kennedy Stocks, mother of the missing daughter of the Los Angeles evangelist, appeared before the grand jury today to give testimony in the case of the disappearance of her daughter, Allice Temple Kennedy.

Mrs. Kennedy remained in the grand jury room approximately one hour.

Dwells on Finance

Her testimony was said to have dwelt upon the financial affairs of the Temple family, her daughter's disappearance. She also was questioned concerning the now famous "avenger's" letter in which her daughter's alleged kidnappers demanded \$200,000 for her return.

Mrs. Kennedy is understood to have stuck to her denial that the letter containing proof that her daughter was alive and not drowned, reached her hands on the day before memorial services for the woman pastor were held at the tabernacle.

Mrs. Kennedy was reported to have replied firmly in the negative when asked whether she had quarreled with her daughter over the management of the temple a short time before the disappearance.

Secret Conference

As the result of protests lodged with the district attorney's office over the announcement by superior justice Arthur Keetch that the grand jury would not be permitted to report its conclusions unless an indictment was returned, Foreman William A. Carter and District Attorney A. A. Keza held a secret conference with the justice today.

The conference was closed in Judge Keetch's chambers about two hours.

No announcement was made of the conclusion of the conference. Harry C. Delaney, Santa Monica real estate man, and identified as the "mystery witness" which the district attorney promised to produce, put in his appearance at the hall of justice today.

He was accompanied by Attorney Joe Ryan and was quoted as saying he had evidence in the kidnapping case which would "dynamite the story out of the water."

Hundred Additional—Fighters Dispatched to Fight Flames

Near Glacier Playground.

MISSOULA, Mont., July 13. Lightning Starts Fires.

Lightning started more than 40 fires in western Montana and northern Idaho yesterday, district foresters reported. Two scores of these were in the Kanabok forest where additional forces are being hurried.

Supervisors of eastern Montana forests here called to assist. Four of these Kanabok fires have started over a wide area.

On Carlson creek in the Teton national forest, the blaze is spreading slowly. It has now covered 600 acres.

In the case of a forest fire of northern Idaho, the blaze is moving into the Teton forest.

New Jersey Refugees Returning to
Homes After Great Explosion That
Left Many Dwellings Total Wrecks

Every Sort of Conveyance Used to Bring Homeless—Back to Communities Near Scene of Terrible Blast.

CHICAGO, July 13. (AP)—Robert Scott, who yesterday pleaded guilty to murder today declared he would rather hang than testify in his own behalf and against his brother, Russell, sentenced to death for the same crime.

Scott, pleaded guilty to the murder of Joseph Manning, a drug clerk for which his brother Russell is under sentence to hang October 15.

Attorney William Scott, Stewart, informed Judge William N. Grant today that Robert would not take the witness stand in his own behalf in a hearing to decide punishment.

The attorney's announcement threw the court and prosecutors in an uproar, the state's attorney charging that a plot to save both Russell and Robert from the gallows was behind Stewart's procedure.

Many Houses in Ruins.

They knew that in nearly every case all windows in their homes had been shattered with the first warning blast.

Many knew that walls of their houses had caved in, that sheds had collapsed, and floors dropped in places.

A few had made exploratory visits in search of possessions and realized the ruin to which they were returning.

But like the peasant population of the great war, the destruction of their homes was not enough to keep them away, and this afternoon with the coming of General Burn's official declaration that it was now safe to permit the passage of civilians into the national sections a few miles around the arsenal, in every case the refugees sought anxiously to be taken home.

Red Cross Workers busy.

All afternoon the Red Cross workers relief headquarters in Morristown, under United States hotel, were kept busy loading their three day boarders into the old and varied conveyances.

The first of these were the temporary shelter in the rectory of the Reformed church, from the American Legion rooms, from the Market street mission and from the Women's community club, loads of women, children and babies went out. The task at Dover was added battle in the day.

The last few days of shelter at Morristown had been a dire record of exhaustion for the workers at the Red Cross and the American Legion.

The American Legion was crowded with which all the community had come to the rescue of a people who touched their hearts.

Even since the first climactic established headquarters in the army, which Saturday night's frightened arrivals turned into bedlam, people of every class and nationality have come to the rescue of a people who touched their hearts.

In this town the refugees were all equally well cared for.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 13. (AP)—Fortune of San Francisco's wealthiest citizens, according to a new plan of a foundation under which millions of dollars would be distributed to the city's poor, was announced today.

The plan, advanced at the meeting, each of the members of the new organization will make specific gifts for charitable, scientific and educational purposes, and a self-sustaining fund of trustees will be formed to handle bequests after a donor's death.

Charles W. Merrill was appointed chairman with instruction to name a committee authorized to make a study of the plan, which would be presented to the city's board of supervisors.

Nothing but Most Urgent Government Business Will Be Permitted to Interfere With President's Rest.

PAUL, N. Y., July 13. (AP)—President Coolidge has definitely put aside politics and is now on vacation at his home in Paul, N. Y.

This was made clear today when Mr. Coolidge was seen in the summer White House that only urgent government business would be permitted to interfere with his rest.

Mr. Coolidge has no plan to present for participating in any republican primary campaign, it was stated, and expects fewer visitors at White House than he has received at Barnstable, Mass., since his arrival.

FIVE MEN HELD FOR OIL THEFT AT ROGERSON

Travelers on Road From California in Deceitful Motor Car Confess to Breaking Into Warehouse.

Five young men who have been arrested here by deputy sheriff during the past 48 hours have confessed, according to the officers, that they committed burglary Sunday evening at the Continental Oil company warehouse at Rogerson to obtain 20 gallons of motor oil in four gallons' cans. Charges of second degree burglary probably will be preferred against the accused men, it was stated. Most of the missing oil has been recovered.

The accused men gave the names of Ward Witt, 29; James Hysman Legg, 18; John Newman, 19; Leo Sherman, 20; Walter Wagers, 21.

Travel Under Difficulties
Legg and Witt, according to their story, had started from Los Angeles in Legg's Mitchell car. Newman, who has his home in South Bend, Indiana, was taken aboard at Reno, and Sherman and Wagers, who say they were bound for Walla Walla, were picked up on the road north of Wells. None of the men had any money. The car was in bad order. It had been run, Legg said, nearly 500 miles without oil. Frequent stops being made to get the motor, when it became overheated. A piece of rubber hose was used for a gas line, and was carried to obtain gasoline out of cars in towns through which they passed. A female who said the officers had been taken off a car at Coonlake.

The accused men carried in the car a rifle and a pair of pistols. Legg, according to the officers, said they had taken out of a cabin in Nevada. The life was rescued by a second hand car which the accused men were overhauling with view of obtaining their travel.

Tax Off Shown Iron
Legg and Witt, according to the officers' account of the accused men's statements, tore a section of sheet iron off the rear of the warehouse at Rogerson after breaking a lock and falling to gain entrance through a door that led to a passage through the floor.

Investigation was made at the warehouse Sunday evening by Deputy Sheriff Charles E. Jones and E. P. Brainer, who discovered tire marks and foot prints. Legg and Newman were arrested at a tourist park in South Park Monday evening. Sherman and Wagers were arrested on the street at Rogerson. Witt was found by the officers Tuesday afternoon at a residence on Eighth avenue north.

The Continental company's warehouse at Rogerson, which is situated about a quarter of a mile west of the town, has been burglarized four times within the past two years, according to the officers.

SPAN BUILDERS ASK NEW TERMS

Union Bridge Company Would Modify Franchise to Meet Bond-Buyers Objections.

The Union Bridge company of Portland, Oregon, with H. M. Murray of Spokane, engineer in the firm, Twin Falls county toll bridge project, is endeavoring to obtain modification of terms of the franchise to meet objections raised by prospective purchasers of the bonds to be issued to finance construction of the span.

This was made known here Tuesday by Charles G. Hueber, president of the Union Bridge company, who arrived in Twin Falls last Friday and who, with representatives of the prospective bond buyers, appeared Monday before Twin Falls county commissioners to urge the modification.

Twin Falls county commissioners, Hueber said, have approved the request for modification of the franchise terms. Similar request will be filed before Jerome county commissioners in session at Jerome today.

Construction of the bridge will begin within a few days after the franchise terms have been modified to suit the bond buyers. Hueber said here last Saturday. The first step, he indicated, would be rock excavation for abutments for the span and beginning of work on the road leading from the north end of the bridge.

Extends Fees Term

Under the modified franchise terms, the bridge builders at operating, inclosure would operate the bridge for 10 years without alteration by the commissioners in the proposed schedule of fees. The original franchise which was granted last December to Mr. Murray provided that the schedule of fees might be altered each year by the commissioners. Attorneys for the county and engineer Hueber, however, stated that the matter of fees, in any event, would come within jurisdiction of the state public utilities commission and would be subject to revision by that body at any time.

Another amendment to the franchise terms provides that the cost of the road on the north side shall be added to the cost of the bridge in determining the fee of the project in the event of purchase by the county.
