

STEEL ATTAINS NEW HIGH MARK

Industrial Leader Reaches
Highest Level Since 1911;
Business Conditions Improve.

NEW YORK, July 17. (AP)—Improvement in business and agricultural conditions last week provided a firm foundation for the upward movement of stock prices which made good headway despite occasional technical setbacks and several adverse news developments.

Outstanding features of the week were the attainment of new high records by United States Steel and General Motors, the two recognized leaders and the establishment of the railroad price averages at the highest level since 1911. The earlier stocks later were depressed by the failure of western roads to obtain the long sought increase in freight rates, but the Van Swearingen issue continued to reflect progress on the revised Nickel Plate mortgage plan.

Marine—Sharon—Drop.

Ashle from the recession attributed to profit taking, exceptional weakness was shown by International Mercantile Marine preferred stock due to the unexpected breaking off of negotiations for the sale of the White Star line to British interests.

The most significant change in the commodity market was the advance of 7 to 8 1/2 cents a bushel in wheat futures, based on the lowered Canadian crop estimate. With prospects of a large domestic yield, the higher prices were especially welcome to farmers. Corn, unmarketable since cotton prices about 42¢ a bushel during the week.

French and Belgian francs both touched recent low levels last week but the Belgian exchange subsequently recovered in response to the establishment of a financial trusteeship.

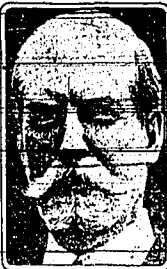

TURKISH WOMEN ARE STILL WITHOUT POLITICAL PARTIES

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 17. (AP)—In spite of all that has been written about feminine emancipation and intellectual advancement in Turkey, Muslim women still are refused admission to political parties and play a very minor role in the social, political and intellectual life of the new republic.

They do not yet enjoy the right to vote nor to hold political office. Halide Edib Humam, wife of the former mayor of Constantinople, who was educated at the American Girls' college in Constantinople, is the only exception to this. She now holds a post in the ministry of education under Mustafa Kemal Pasha. All other Turkish women remain in political obscurity.

Nazika Moushield Humam, president of the Turkish Women's union, insists that women in Turkey be given the same rights as men.

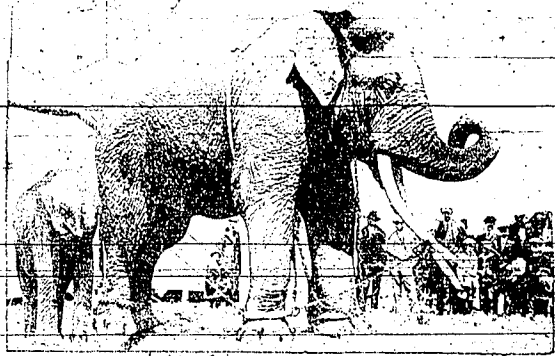

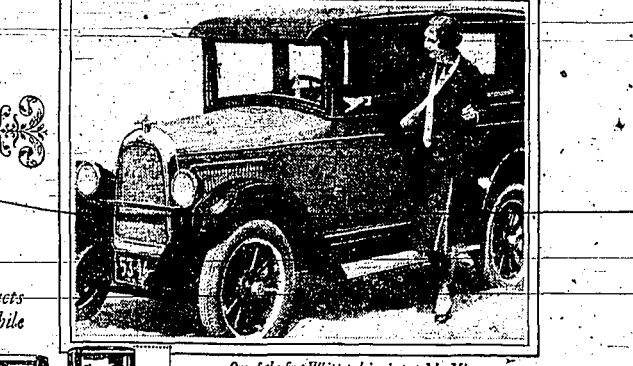

AWARDS MEDAL; OMITS KISS IN OLD CEREMONY

French Minister of Navy, in Decorating Mrs. Harry Payne Whitney, Yields to Urging of Ambassador Herriek.

(By The Associated Press)
PARIS, July 17.—The kiss that accompanies a medal in France was temporarily omitted recently when M. Georges Leygues, Minister of the Navy, decorated Mrs. Harry Payne Whitney, at St. Nazaire, on the day that her husband's transportation to the first arrival of American troops in France during the war was being made.
"Why not?" the minister was asked afterwards by Ambassador Herriek, who has become sufficiently acquainted with the medals without kissing.
"Well, you see," explained M. Leygues, who has been prober and held substantial office in the government, "I didn't feel worthy and I myself don't rank in the Legion of Honor at all. And besides, the hand was a bit cold."
"It's gone now," said the ambassador.
And as Mrs. Whitney happened to be still, she was gallantly complimented the ceremony of investiture in accordance with traditional custom.

Playing French exchange has taken a stronger hold on Americans touring the historical landmarks near Paris, even Versailles and Fontainebleau are being neglected in favor of the offices of American banks, where some tourists spend hours watching the fluctuation of the franc in order to make a favorable moment to reach a profit from its ups and downs.

IDAHO TO LEAD HAMPSHIRE LIST

Reputation of Gem State Will Be Upheld at Annual Ram Sale in Salt Lake.

SALT LAKE CITY, July 17.—As has been the case every year of the annual ram sale, sponsored at Salt Lake each August by the National Woolgrowers association, Idaho again will uphold this fall its reputation as one of the country's foremost breeders of outstanding Hampshire sheep.

In former years the Hampshire class at the show and sale has looked almost like a registry of names of the leading Idaho Hampshire breeders. The show (this fall is August 30, 31 and September 1) and officials of the association anticipate it will be one of the most successful ever held. The event is held at the Union stockyards at Salt Lake and is part of the association's general program of encouraging the sheepman to think of the possibility of deriving more money from his flock by breeding up to standard where a limited flock will yield more wool and mutton per unit.

A preliminary tabulation of entries for the eleventh annual show shows that 3000 of the country's finest rams will be exhibited and offered for sale. Prizes are expected to be high.

For the demand for range breeding stock continues excellent. One of the incidental matters to be handled at the sale is the election of the next convention city for the National Woolgrowers' association. Last year the convention was held at Boise and both Salt Lake and Butte, Montanan, have entered invitations for the 1927 gathering. President Frank J. Hinchey has called the executive committee of the association to meet at Salt Lake during the sale time and name the next convention city.

The entry tabulation shows that 31 Hampshire breeders will have 75 single stud rams, 200 registered rams, in pens of five head and 1000 range rams, in pens of 25 head. Twenty-two Hampshire breeders will have 60 stud rams; 60 registered rams, in pens of five head; 700 ranging range hams, in pens of 25 head; 400 range hams, in pens of 25 head, and 100 registered ewes.

WAY CLEAR FOR BUILDERS' WORK ON BIG BRIDGE

C. G. Hueber, Spokesman for Construction Interests, Says Preliminary Work for Blue Lakes Span is Finished.

Work on the Jerome-Twin Falls county \$250,000 toll bridge, to span Snake river canyon at Blue lakes, will begin as soon as it is possible for the construction interests to persuade the state and federal governments to finance the project. In a letter of transmittal of the franchise agreement, the state and federal governments have agreed to finance the project. The bridge will be built on the site of the old bridge, which was destroyed by fire in 1914.

This bond as well as a new bond in the sum of \$25,000 to replace the original bond in that sum that was furnished to assure fulfillment of franchise terms, is to be filed with the commissioners within 10 days.

Assists in Launching.

Mr. Hueber stated that he expects to return to Twin Falls within a few days to assist in launching of the bridge construction program. The Twin Falls county commissioners in session Saturday renewed the measure which they had adopted last Monday approving the franchise agreement, and adopted a resolution to conform to the action of the Jerome board in requiring the new and additional bonds.

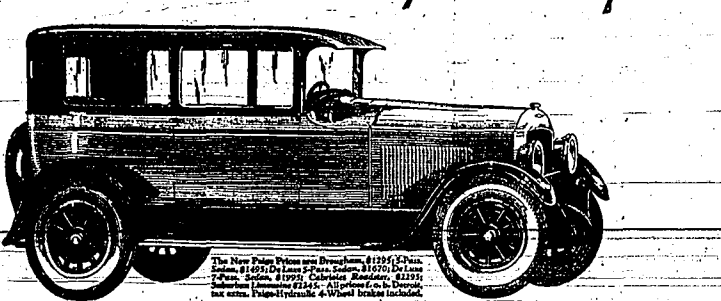

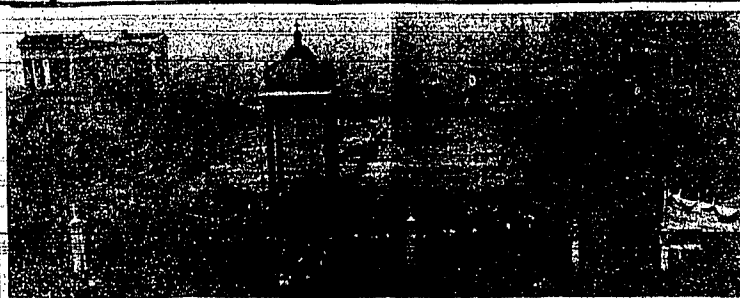

John D. Rockefeller at 87 years old "not" be described exactly by the old formula of "bale and hearty," but he does seem to be just about the same as he was 20 years ago. His physician says he expects to live to the age of 100, and temperamentally he seems suited to such an achievement. His mind has more to do with it than his body.

The most remarkable thing about Rockefeller is that he has a light burden of billions. The tradition that wealth brings ease is false. Most very wealthy men are crushed by their wealth. Rockefeller, giving away much, yet retaining far more than Carnegie did, gives the impression of a man who hasn't a care in the world. Thus he sets a good example to a lot of people, big and little, who worry more about their money after getting more than they did about making it in the first place.

New Type of Car Being Exhibited By Local Dealers

Overland "Whippet" Now Occupies Showrooms of Conoco-Parker Company; Is Innovation in Auto Field.

An entirely new type of car, different to anything ever before seen in Twin Falls, is the new Overland "Whippet," which arrived in Twin Falls yesterday, and was on exhibition at the showrooms of the Conoco-Parker company, local Overland and Willys Knight dealers.

This new car looks different and is said to be different. Mechanically it is an adaptation of the best that Europe has to offer in the way of practical, economical, engines, with a wide speed range, more power for climbing than has characterized even the best of the European productions, and with a flexibility, silence and smoothness of running which is new in lighter cars.

The sedan will travel 38 miles an hour, as easily and comfortably as the great majority of our present day "runners" and yet it is equipped with a four cylinder motor.

It will accelerate from 5 to 25 miles an hour in 10 seconds, or in just half a second more time than any of our largest and most flexible cars, and it will cover 28 to 30 miles on a gallon of fuel.

It will stop in a little over twice its own length from an average driving speed, and it is equipped with shock absorbers, having a drum diameter of 11 inches which is larger than those on many of our large cars.

The motor develops 22 per cent more power, per cubic inch of piston displacement, than any other light four cylinder motor built in America; this is one of the results of utilizing the European type of high speed motor design.

It develops greater torque horsepower than any other light four cylinder car in this country and yet it weighs just a little over 2000 pounds less than the average sedan.

Has Very Low Body. The roof of this new type car is only 5 feet 8 inches from the ground yet the room inside the body is greater than in any other light car on the market.

The first appearance is striking in the extreme. A man of average height can stand alongside it at the curb and rest his arms on the top and look over it. The side fender curbs it to it will all the more he wants "in this respect it is thoroughly American and begs no relationship to its diminutive ally, the small European coupé."

To give room for stretching out in the front seat, the motor dash is curved forward several inches and there is as much leg room in this compartment as there is in the rear. The front seat is 10 1/2 inches wide and the rear seat is 15 1/2 inches wide, the conventional width for these two seats. The doors are wide and swing on four hinges so that it is extremely easy to get in or out.

And the body lines are unobtrusive in every way. A prominent feature is the contour of the sunvisor which is formed by continuing the roof forward in a graceful down swinging curve. This is solely tailoring for even the best of care and is a hallmark of quality in this Overland Whippet.

The motor is completely high and narrow, and is housed in a deep nickel shell. The body lines sweep gracefully back with one break, all the car giving an appearance which is intriguing in the extreme.

The bullet headlamps have nickel-plated shells and are strongly supported with a steel arm from the front.

New Size Tires
The sizes prohibit anything but a tire new, being 27 inches in diameter with a 4.40 inch wide section, and are of the balloon type. These are the smallest tires ever used on a stock equipped car, but the size makes already anticipated a huge demand for this Overland Whippet and dealers are stocking these sizes at the present time.

It is the claim of the engineers that this size of tire on the Whippet will result in a proportionally long tire service and foregoes of as high as 20,000 miles to the set have been made.
