

STEEL ATTAINS NEW HIGH MARK

Industrial Leader Reaches
Highest Level Since 1911;
Business Conditions Improve.

NEW YORK, July 17. (O.P.)—Improved business and agricultural conditions have been the main factor for the upward movement of stock prices which made good headway despite occasional technical setbacks and other adverse news developments.

The most significant were the attainment of new high records by United States Steel and General Motors, the two recognized leaders in the establishment of record price gains at the highest level since 1911. The earlier stocks later were depressed by the failure of western roads to obtain the long sought increase in freight rates, but the Van Beek group was continued to reflect progress on the revised Nickel Plate merger plan.

Marine Share Drop.

TURKISH WOMEN ARE STILL WITHOUT POLITICAL PARTIES

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 17. (O.P.)—In spite of all that has been written about feminine emancipation and intellectual advancement in Turkey, Moslem women still are refused admission to political parties, play a very minor role in the social, political and intellectual life of the new state.

They do not yet enjoy the right to vote, nor do they have the right to be candidates. Fatma Hanum, wife of the former mayor of Constantinople, who was educated at the American Girls' College in Constantinople, is the only woman in the country who holds a position in the ministry of education under Mustapha Kemal Pasha. All other Turkish women remain in political obscurity.

Moustafa Hanum, president of the Turkish Women's Union, insists that women in Turkey be given the same rights as men.





STATISTICIAN DISCUSSES EFFECTS OF CIVIL LAWSUITS ON BUSINESS

Roger W. Babson Asks if Lawyers Are Hurting Trade Structure; Thinks Court Procedure Has Dampening Effect on General Situation.

BABSON PAINS. Mass., July 16—played by business men when they get into trouble, but the rest of us, the lawyers, should be to keep the business man from getting into trouble. This can be done only by taking a high moral stand, and I think that is the main point of the law as well as the letter. Business men should consult lawyers more often before doing things, rather than after. It is very important, however, that the lawyers concerned should be men of the right grade character and men satisfied with reasonable fees.

New England Conditions

The business situation in New England has been very peculiar for the past two or three years. First, the Bank Charter Committee has been investigating, and many have indicated that New England should be prosperous, but this prosperity has not been evident. The manufacturing leaders in New England have had to take action which they find it hard to understand. Personally, I believe that certain law suits play a large role in the cause of New England's present depression. I refer to the "National Bank Case," another against prominent bankers and business men. The assets of New England have never been material, but rather intangible. New England has been built like the people of the West, or bright sunlight like the Pacific coast, or minerals and forests like other sections of the country. New England's assets have been held in integrity, but New England's natural resources—which built the railroads of the West; but rather her birth and enterprise which was directed by a few prominent men, have been taken away through greed and growth of encroachment upon them. When their borders are seized or under indictment, their pep is sapped, and gone and New England goes with it. What is true of New England is also true of every section and every industry.

Cannot be Forbidden

"This, of course, does not mean that law suits should be suppressed and judges should not convict simply because law suits hurt business. Justice comes before everything else, and the public welfare must be considered. One should command the respect of the whole community whether or not such decisions temporarily hurt business. I personally feel that all the judges appointed to the bench in New England, especially Judge Anderson, have rendered a distinct service. The basis of all prosperity is justice and this we must have above all else."

...and simply making the point that lawsuits hurt business and do not contribute to it—hurt business by taking men's mind off their real work and directing them to efforts which are not constructive. What is true today is also true tomorrow. Today men spend time in their consulting engineers and scientists, and less time consulting lawyers and doctors. Law suits hurt business by undermining the morale of employees. This is especially true when one's employer is an employee's competitor, is involved in the suit. Law suits hurt business by disengaging initiative. Most successful business men are not afraid of the "business lawyer" they get out of the "business lawyer" to do his work. If this enjoyment of the work is killed, they either retire or take another, usually different, from which inactively the community as a whole suffers.

Causes of Depression

"There are many causes of depression; but these causes are largely the result of the number of business (such as bank clearing, railroad earnings and foreign trade, etc.) are purely barometers and have nothing to do with the cause of market change. The cause of financial depression is not just physical and psychological. The inefficiency (physically and mechanically) of the machine, the untriedness of a period of prosperity, causes the depression that follows; while the right kind of industry and the right kind of administration during a period of depression prepares the foundation for the next period of prosperity. The fact that the number of law suits come in the latter part of periods of prosperity is very significant. In this case, it is the "business lawyer" that Judge Anderson or his associates are called upon in the early part of a period of prosperity to make such a decision as they did."

All of this, however, that intent of business men blaming the courts for administering justice, they should not conduct themselves that law suits will not be brought against them. However, should a law suit be brought against them, they should not let it stand. The business should then put them in a position where they will not lose their cases. When a man is innocent a law suit does not interfere with his business. Therefore, law suits should not be brought. Businessmen should not business men make a great effort to so conduct themselves that there will be fewer such law suits in the future? This brings me to the question of lawyers."

Lawyers in Business

"Should lawyers be employed so much as they are at the present time in connection with the making of money? The commercialization of law may be very detrimental to this country, surely the operating economy of the Oldsmobile is responsible for a great many troubles which are now experienced. Many are the lawyers and lawyers who are really fine bankers or promoters. Some of the great law firms are not offices, but are really banking houses. I repeat that the professional part of the legal profession may be responsible for a great deal of financial trouble today. Too many lawyers may be engaged in telling business men how they can do wrong and get by."

Lawyers, of course, must be am-

petent. Some day, I hope, law suits will figure in the compilation of the Babsonite.
