SPECIAL TEXAS VOTE TO DECIDE PARTIAL RECALL

Democratic State Executive Committee Certifies Names of Moody and Ferguson for Run-off Primary August 28.

(By Associated Press.) DALLAS, Texas, Aug. 9.—The battle for the democratic nomination for governor of Texas is to be fought all over again between Governor Miriam A. Ferguson and Attorney General Dan Moody.

In the midst of threats of civil action to disqualify Moody, followed by a heated speech by Moody, the democratic state executive committee today certified the names of Mrs. Ferguson and Moody to go on the ballot for the run-off primary August 28.

The committee action followed shortly after an effort to secure a primary vote by a sub-committee, which showed that Moody lacked 1720 votes of the 100,000 needed to qualify.

Moody's role mentioned. No mention was made in the committee proceedings of Mrs. Ferguson's promise to effect the resignation of her office at the close of the special legislative session she has called for September 15.

The official canvass showed that Moody had 41,292 votes and that the total of all other democratic gubernatorial candidates was 41,292. No official returns were received from two counties in the total canvass.

Petition to Disqualify Falls. An attempt to have the committee consider a petition asking that Moody be disqualified as a candidate on the ground of alleged irregularities in campaign contributions failed when the committee chairman, Arthur Eklund of Hamilton, Texas, ruled that the matter should be referred to the state supreme court.

It recited that Moody's campaign expense statement, filed with the secretary of state, showed that he had received \$2500 from the law prohibiting candidates to contribute to the campaign funds of other candidates.

Evidence Missing In Jury Probe of Woman Evangelist. Two Grocery Slips Found in Caramel Cottage Said to Have Been Destroyed by Throwing Down Drain Pipe.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 9 (AP)—The two grocery slips held as evidence in the investigation of the Alice Hamilton case were destroyed by being thrown down a drain pipe in a room adjoining the grand jury. It was learned today.

Information is said to be in the hands of the attorney general as to the disposition made of the evidence. Following a conference held today by Judge Keith and the grand jury, it was said that criminal action may be taken in connection with the loss of the grocery slips, which had been found by officers in a cottage at Carmel-by-the-sea, which had been rented by Kenneth O. Ormiston, former cooperator of Angus Temple.

The day following the disappearance of Mrs. McPherson, Ormiston appeared at the cottage in a room adjoining the one named only as "Miss X."

Investigation officials said they were told the woman resembled Mrs. McPherson, who was described as being about 35 years of age, with dark hair and eyes, and stated to be that of Ormiston's companion.

SALEM, Ky., Aug. 9 (AP)—Little progress was made today in the attempt to release the men trapped in the shaft of the Hudson mine of the Zinc and Spar company here, since last Thursday by a cave-in.

William H. Carter, foreman of the giant pump, refused to consent today to the grand jury, but reports from Keweenaw indicated that Carter will give the charges.

The big pump will probably be in commission again tomorrow and workers will be permitted to resume work to begin tunneling through the rock and mud that seals the shaft.

Earlier in the day, it was reported that the men were still alive, but had been located, but this was later denied.

LATEST DECREE HALTS ENTRY TO SEVEN FORESTS

United States Forestry Service Officials Take Drastic Step in Effort to Cope With Threatening Fire Situation.

(By the Associated Press.) MISSOULA, Mont., Aug. 9.—Seven national forests in the western mountains today were closed to entry without permit by district forester Fred M. Smith in issuing the order announced "that the forest fire situation has reached such a serious stage that it is necessary to take such drastic steps as the preservation of the forests and the safety of the public."

Progress in Curing of Aches. Good progress in curing the flames in the Kootenai and Coeur d'Alene districts where the most serious conditions were reported today, was reported by the district forester.

Ten Carloads of Various Species of Trout to be Planted in Southern Idaho Streams During Coming Month.

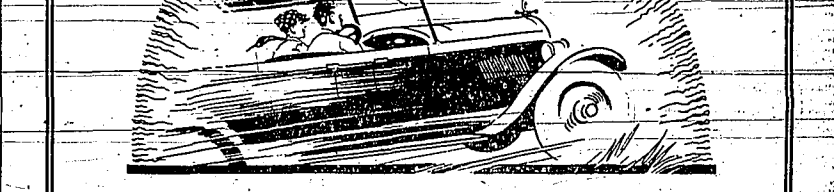

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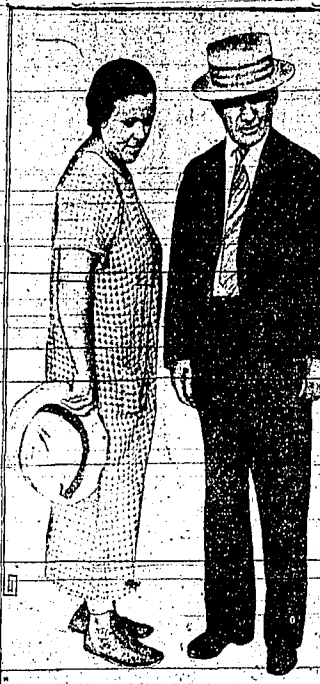
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JUDGE BARBOCK RUNS SECOND IN G. O. P. PRIMARY

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TREE-SPRAYING DISTRICT PLAN MAKES HEADWAY

Commissioners Call for Draft of Ordinance Under Which City Would Take Care of Parkings; Traffic Problem Up.

Movement for establishment of a tree-spraying district in Twin Falls made an advance at a regular meeting of the city council Monday evening at which the matter of a regular tree-spraying district for the city was discussed.

The proposed tree-spraying district would be established by ordinance, the procedure being similar to that of establishment of the street sprinkling district. Under terms of the proposed ordinance which Frank L. Stophan, city attorney, was directed Monday evening to draft for consideration by the council at its meeting next week, the city would undertake to care for the trees on parkings throughout the residence districts. The boundaries of the district would be established by the council.

Would Buy Sprayer

Trees on the parkings would be sprayed for emerald ash borer and other insects. The cost of the sprayer would be charged against the district. The city would purchase a power sprayer which has been used by the city for spraying fruit trees on both private and public grounds throughout the city.

Turning to discussion of the traffic regulation problem, Commissioner Kroll presented a resolution which would control the stream of traffic at the intersection and it was given as the order of the day. The resolution could be obtained only by installation of automatic stop signal at the intersection.

Street Meetings Get Attention

Members of the council agreed with Commissioner T. J. Douglas' suggestion that street meetings should be moved back from the corners at the intersection of Main and Shoshone for a distance of about a half-block in each direction. Danger resulting from congregation of crowds at the corners in close proximity to heavy traffic was pointed out, and council members agreed that there was strong probability serious accidents might occur unless the street meetings were moved back.
