HARVEST SEASON COMING TO FORE

Government Statistician Sets
Forth Crop and Weather
Conditions of Idaho.

Weekly summary of weather and crop conditions in Idaho for the week ending Tuesday, August 17, set forth in a report, released today by the United States department of agriculture weather bureau, which headquarters are in Boise.

The text of the report follows: In north Idaho the weather continues dry and the temperatures moderate throughout the week. The weather conditions are about completed in most sections. Head lettuce is coming up well and the work of thinning is under way. The harvest of peaches, plums, and pears is in full swing. Apples are being picked and marketed in quantity. Corn is suffering for moisture, particularly in the lower valleys, and other growing crops are badly in need of rain. 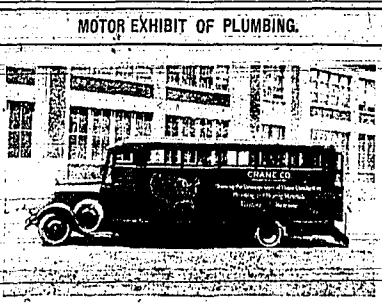

IDAHO NEAR TOP IN WOOL GROWTH

Federal Livestock Statistician Places Gem State in Fifth Place as Fleece Producer.

Idaho ranks fifth in the United States in the production of wool for 1926, according to statistics compiled by George A. Pratt, federal livestock statistician, which are contained in the last edition of the Wool Growers' Bulletin, the official organ of the Idaho Wool Growers' association.

Texas makes first in production, having produced 25,000,000 pounds of wool during the year of 1926. Wyoming is second with 24,125,000 pounds, Montana third with 22,100,000 pounds, Utah fourth with 20,225,000 pounds, Idaho fifth with 19,445,000.

The report states that the western states showed 1,300,000 more sheep in 1926 than in 1925, and adds that the increase was due to the dry, cold, and other climatic conditions.

Figures compiled for the week ending August 17, showed that the state had shipped 200 carloads of lamb and sheep to the market. Oregon had shipped 102, Montana 27, Wyoming 26, and Washington did not ship during the week.

Officers Find Liquor Cache

Harvey Williamson Taken Into Custody for Violation of Dry Laws; Second Offense.

Harvey Williamson was arrested Thursday night at 11:30 o'clock at his residence a short distance from the Five Points filling station on the state highway, by members of the sheriff's office and Twin Falls city police department. Officers discovered two quarts, one pint and a quarter pint of moonshine whiskey hidden under a false bottom in a cabinet. Williamson was taken into custody and lodged in the county jail, charged with his second offense against the prohibition laws, a felony in Idaho. If convicted, the law prescribes a term of four years imprisonment in the state penitentiary.

Deputy sheriffs E. F. Prater, H. B. Davis and C. E. Jones and chief of police H. E. Leighton searched the Williamson residence for more than an hour, but failed to find other evidence of violation of the prohibition laws. Williamson was convicted nearly three years ago on a similar charge.

SMITH REVIEWS INVESTIGATION OF PARK LINES

Congressman Returns From Trip With Senatorial Investigating Committee; Favors Boundary Changes.

Congressman Addison T. Smith returned Thursday from a trip through the eastern part of the state and the southwest corner of the Yellowstone park with the senatorial committee authorized by the United States senate to consider the advisability of modifying the boundary lines of the park so as to exclude about 12,000 acres upon which it is proposed to construct a reservoir to furnish a supplemental water supply for land in Madison and Jefferson counties, aggregating over 120,000 acres.

Because of an insufficient water supply in drought years the farmers in Madison and Jefferson counties lost about \$7,000,000 in 1919, over \$2,000,000 in 1924 and the loss this year would amount to about \$3,000,000, Mr. Smith stated. The text of the report made by Mr. Smith follows:

"The farmers have been endeavoring to secure authority to construct a reservoir at their own expense in which to store the flood waters of the Becher river in the southwest corner of the park, and I have initiated legislation to transfer the jurisdiction of the reservoir site from the park to the national forest in order that they may secure a permit from the government to build the reservoir. It will cost the farmers about \$5 per acre, which with the water right they now have will furnish them with ample water to mature their crops, even in drought years.

"The lands for which the supplemental supply of water is required were visited on Monday in the vicinity of Ashton, St. Anthony and Rexburg. In many instances large fields of grain, peas, sugar beets and potatoes had been abandoned. Some of the corn was dry as early as the fourth of June, and there was evidence of a shortage of crops on every farm we visited.

"On Tuesday an early start brought us to the corner of the park about 10 miles where we abandoned the automobiles and made the trip to the reservoir site in wagons. The remainder of the

Inspection was made on horseback.

"The reservoir will cover about 5,570 acres of low swampy land which until about August 1 cannot be driven over. It is covered with a dense growth of saw grass unfit for travel, and during the winter is covered with snow on an average of six feet in depth, and of course has no scenic value. The outer rim is covered with medium sized pine trees, which probably have no marketable value. We went up the Becher river to the Colonnade and Iris falls, which will in no manner be disturbed, as they are at least 150 feet higher than the water line of the reservoir and a mile or more in stream.

"The entire day on Wednesday was devoted to a hearing at St. Anthony as to the necessity of the park for additional water, and at least 400 farmers were present, many of whom made pathetic pleas to the committee for relief in order that their farms might be made productive. When a vote was taken of supporting the plan to transfer jurisdiction to enable them to build a reservoir every one in the vast audience rose as an evidence of their anxiety to secure relief.

"I am an ardent supporter of the national park policy, and recognize that the parks are a great asset to the western country. I would not support any plan to commercialize the parks, or to detract in any manner their beauty and popularity; but as there is a desperate need for the water which is now going to waste, and the land which it is proposed to eliminate has no scenic value, is low and of a swampy character, I have urged the enactment of legislation to eliminate the extreme southwest corner of the park and place it in the national forest. The necessity of saving this water

and the urgent need of the farmers for a supplemental supply, which cannot be secured elsewhere, impels me to exert my best efforts to secure the legislation which will permit its use.

"I cannot understand how anyone can justify opposition to the legislation in view of the great economic loss which will inure to say nothing of the suffering endured by several thousand human beings, as well as livestock on these lands.

"The problem has been in continuing for over six years and I am pleased that those who are to determine the matter, so far as the committee on public lands of the senate is concerned, have visited these farms and the reservoir site, and can now speak from observation rather than hearsay when congress convenes in December."

The investigating committee consisted of Senator Stanford, chairman of the committee on public lands; Senators Norbeck of South Dakota, Kendrick of Wyoming, Ashurst of Arizona, Senator Gooding, Congressman Slinnot of Oregon; chairman of the house committee on public lands, Winterrowd of Wyoming; and Warren G. Swenden, commissioner of reclamation, represented the state and the chief engineer of the Twin Falls project when it was being constructed, represented the irrigation companies who desire the water. Representatives of the chambers of commerce in that locality and the fish and game associations of eastern Idaho also accompanied the committee.

HANSEN BOYS PAROLED DURING GOOD BEHAVIOR

Loren McFarland and Dean Denton, of Hansen who are charged with the burglary of the Zuck grocery of Hansen, who desire the water, were sentenced to 60 days in jail by Judge J. L. Hodge here Thursday afternoon. Sentence was suspended during good behavior, and the boys were paroled because of their youth and past record. The sentence arose as the result of a writ from the till of the Hansen store.

Filmdom's Canine Star Is Visitor Here With Master

White Fang, outstanding dog actor of movieland, who has carried the lion's role in many of the films that have been filmed on the silver screen, which have had as their settings the rugged regions of British Columbia, visited Twin Falls Thursday afternoon with his master, California Jack, another star of the screen.

White Fang and his master called into the Magic city shortly after noon yesterday by motor from Ogden. The famous dog was the hope to appear in the back seat of his master's powerful machine.

The canine celebrity, who has been an everlasting place in the hearts of the boys and girls who have witnessed his work in the "silver screen" is on his way to Death Valley, California, where he is to begin work in a few weeks under the swinging toys of a sand droid.

White Fang, who has just passed his second birthday, is one of the most handsome specimens of the police dog family.

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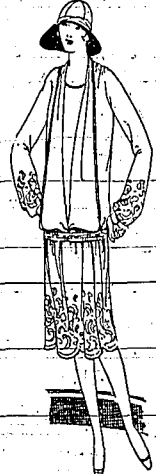
