## Malad Man Shows Strength as Party Nominee for Toga

**Delegates From Southeast

**SUMMIT, Aug. 23. (P)**—Delegates from the southeast, arriving for the state progressive convention Tuesday, brought with them a well defined line of support for Senator Davis, the party's choice for United States senator. Colonel Davis, formerly federal district attorney for Idaho, was most connected with government interests in Washington.

Colonel Davis, who was chosen to represent the Canyon county delegation of 13 votes, the largest single block in the convention, has found Colonel Davis acceptable on condition that the candidate look with favor on the nomination of Senator Elbridge, his attorney for governor.

**Attempt to Smooth Way**

Conferees this afternoon had the object of smoothing the road so that Colonel Davis may be nominated on the first ballot. By this time, however, the progressive committee, two progressive nominees for governor, was approached in an effort to sway the delegates from the senatorial race. Davis men would like to have Mr. Davis out of the way, so as to keep the fight out of the convention.

For governor, southwest Idaho is supporting Mr. Elbridge, and he is assured, delegates from Canyon's entire delegation, namely the 13 votes, also expressed a desire to see Mr. Elbridge, as well as in return for Senator's support of the Davis candidacy.

**French Government  
Inaugurates Plan to

**Demand Exceeds Supply at  
Markets of Paris as Whole-  
sale Prices Go in Effect.**

PARIS, Aug. 23. (P)—The beginning day of the new fiscal year in the central markets of Paris—the wholesale bazaar of wholesale prices caused a number of quarrels but little depreciation of the high cost-of-living index.

The only exception was the cheap brand of cigarette known as ordinary "epoport," the workingman's smoke. American cigarettes selling for 15 cents at home will sell from 3 to 9 francs or about 25 cents.

## CITY OFFICERS ADOPT PLAN TO HELP TRAFFIC

Main Avenue and Shoshone Street Soon to Become Designated Arterial Highways; Signals Are Ordered.

Most of the Twin Falls city commissioners' three-hour session Monday evening, in the city hall, was devoted to adoption of action that will take steps to remedy the serious traffic problem that has been under study here for several months. The commissioners voted to point to the adoption of an ordinance at the next regular session, Aug. 29, which will designate Shoshone street and Main avenue as arterial highways, and will require that all drivers of vehicles who desire to enter Shoshone street or Main avenue shall come to a complete stop immediately before entering. Orders were placed for an electric traffic signal to be located at the intersection of the two main thoroughfares. Orders were also placed for stop signs which are to be situated at points at which traffic will be standard.

### Standard Signs

The electric signal at the intersection of the two main streets will be the same as is used in the larger cities. It will be operated from power house located in the same place as the officers deemed it necessary.

Commissioners have voting also approved and ordered filed at the county courthouse the assessment rolls for school property, and also the application for district election set for Oct. 10. The recently proposed tree spraying assessment was also adopted and ordered filed. The remainder of the session was devoted to an outstanding indebtedness, an also retirement of regular one-tenth of the city bonded indebtedness. In the latter action it was discovered that for the first time in several years the tax for the past year was sufficient to permit the specified annual retirement, which is one-tenth of the total sum of bonds. More than the specified amount of bonds were retired last evening.
