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IDENTIFICATION IN CASE FAILS

Name of Bomber Who Blew Up Pittsburgh Bank Remains a Mystery; Recover Note.

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 25. (AP)—The name of the perpetrator of the fatal bomb explosion in the Farmer's Deposit Savings bank remained a mystery tonight after two possible identifications had proven erroneous.

The most important development of the day was the revelation of the name in which the bomber yesterday afternoon made his demand for \$200 and the threat to blow up the bank if he did not get it. The note revealed that the man carried 50 sticks of dynamite in a little satchel. "It will discharge," it was written, "when the handle is out of my hands, if you or anyone else forces a gun on me there will be an explosion. I will kill you."

The note was handed to a fellow and the explosion occurred when the man checked the satchel as a policeman approached.

The bomber's finger prints were taken and police will compare them with available records.

Four in Serious Condition

Seven of the men, three of whom were injured, remained at hospital, four in a serious condition, while Mrs. George Ortman, wife of the policeman who was killed with the bomber, was reported seriously ill as a result of shock.

The bank did business as usual, however, and workmen were busy repairing the damage. Bank officials announced that no money was lost following the explosion.

MEDICAL STUDENT FACES MANSLAUGHTER CHARGE

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Aug. 25. (AP)—Police announced tonight that criminal charges will be laid against Ernest "Frenchy" Balaban, 21, medical student, whose sweetheart, Dorothy Elizabeth Kirk, pretty 22-year-old stenographer, died mysteriously in a hospital Sunday.

If the coroner's report definitely finds that Miss Kirk died from the effects of drugs and poisons which her youthful lover is alleged to have given her, manslaughter probably will be filed against Balaban, detective Chief Connelley said.

If, however, it is found that the girl died from other causes, Balaban will have to answer charges of administering drugs in violation of the state pharmacy act, today declared.

Installation of the new \$14,000 Hope-Grove unit orchestra organ was completed by the Grange at the Grange hall, Tuesday evening, August 24. The organ, a veteran of the world war, who disappeared from his boarding place at Arlington avenue, New Orange, N. J., on June 8, 1918, was employed by the Travelers Insurance company's branch office in Newark, N. J., and was loaned to the Grange at the time of his disappearance.
