

**HURRICANE TOLL
MOUNTS WITH 4**

New Orleans Apprehensive
Awaits Further News From
Outlying Districts as Storm
From Gulf Rages Inland.

(By the Associated Press.)
NEW ORLEANS, La., Aug. 2.
With four persons known dead,
others missing and property damaged
to the extent of two million dol-
lars, at midnight tonight apprehen-
sion awaited further news from Gulf
districts of the passage of the trop-
ical storm which swept in from the Gulf
Mexico last night.

Morgans City near the mouth of
Mississippi appeared to have borne
brunt of the storm as it raged in.
Virtually every house in the town
damaged, boats were carried away
ferry-boats sunk from the passage
cracked into many bridges. The
storm was estimated at a million dol-
lars. Two watchmen on the ferry boat
were missing tonight.

Two Electrified.

One man was electrocuted in Orleans while attempting to repair a high voltage line, and a sailor was killed at Gulfport when he came in contact with a live wire. Another man drowned at Freeier, 14 miles south of Pontchartrou, when his store was inundated by flood waters. A woman drowned in the Mississippi river at Cocent. The body had not been identified late today.

By far the greater property damage was done to the rice, sugarcane, and corn crops. The New Orleans Herald placed this damage at approximately \$1,000,000. Houma, Morgan City, Thibodaux and Hammond property damage was believed around the half million mark, but no definite estimate could be made.

Sugar Cane Planted.
Graphic reports of the sweeping of the storm were related as news into New Orleans—from outlying districts from which no mail had been received—many. Plate windows were blown out, awnings and many more unroofed, miles of tinted sugar cane and miles of spluttered telephone and graph poles gave vigorous testimony to the ferocity of the storm.

Seventy passengers who spent the night aboard ferry barges in the Mississippi river when they were caught in a mud bank as two tugs lost control of them in the storm reached shore today when the ferry tugs loosened the barges from them and brought them to the east bank of the river.

100-Mile Wind.

Victims of Auto Accident Return

Mr. Newman's vision, however, was obstructed by the approaching machine's lights, and before he was able to bring his car to a stop it had crashed into the rear end of the automobile parked on the highway, without a rear light.

The two men suffering from glass cuts were taken to the Idaho hospital by a passing motorist, where they received surgical treatment. The car in which the two local men were riding was damaged extensively.

WEATHER FAVORS CROP CONDITION

Government Report Shows Harvest Well Under Way in Gem State; Grain and Fruit Fine.

Under weather was recorded for Twin Falls and surrounding territory for the week ending August 24; real climate, however, for each acre was better than the cut potatoes and fruit of all kinds are in excellent condition; the peaches and apple pickers are at work in the canyons, according to the report on weather and crop conditions issued by the United States department of agriculture for the Twin Falls country.

The summary of weather and crop conditions in Idaho for the week ending August 24, follows:
In Northern Idaho, light to moderate rains on the first four days of the week effectively broke the long drought and was of much benefit to the crops. The local atmosphere of smoke and haze, threatening the harvest of spring wheat in the later districts were delayed a few days, but are well ahead of the average time and will be about completed in the next few days. Peach harvest is on in full blast. The local crop is exceptional, in part because of blight. Corn and beans are fair and are being benefited slightly by the rains. Head lettuce is up to a good stand and is being thinned.

In Southwestern Idaho, temperatures were much lower most of the week, but the last two days were exceptionally warm. Showers fell in all parts of the district and were sufficient to bring benefit to crops that were becoming dry on account of insufficient irrigation. Grain harvest is practically completed and threshing is making rapid progress. Peach and pear harvest is in full swing with heavy crops of excellent quality. Prune harvest is beginning in the Emmet district. Apples are coloring nicely. Beans are mostly dry though improved in some sections by the showers.

In Southeastern Idaho temperatures were moderate with warm days and cool nights. Light showers fell over most of the district Thursday; but were too light to be of material benefit to growing crops. Harvest and threshing are progressing rapidly in all but the later sections. The second crop of alfalfa is mostly in the stack and the third is making good growth. Early potatoes are being dug and shipped and the later varieties are being thinned. Red peas are being threshed. Feed corn is in good condition.

SCHOOL CHANGES ARE ANNOUNCED

Senior High School Students To Register One Week Before Formal Opening.

Twin Falls high school seniors will report to the high school auditorium for registration next Monday after school at 1:30 o'clock according to an announcement made Thursday morning by Mary Ruth Fisher, principal of the school. Juniors will report at the same time on Tuesday, and Sophomores will report on Wednesday.
