# WORK IN TWIN FALLS SCHOOLS TO START SOON

Monday, September 6, Designated as Opening Day in Announcement by Superintendent Ernest D. Bloom.

Following are the announcements effective in the Twin Falls schools during the next year, as made by Ernest D. Bloom, superintendent. Information, relative to the opening of the city school, Monday, September 6.

**Mr. Bloom says:** "It is planned that all the building and equipment for operating the new schools will be paid for and that all employees of the school district will arrive at a few days previously in ample time to receive all necessary instructions for accomplishing the work of enrollment and organization of the schools.

In the senior high school and junior high school, the roll will be taken at 8:50 o'clock, and in the grade buildings at 8:50 o'clock. The High school students will be given an afternoon class at 1:00 o'clock. In the senior high school, for the present, some classes will be held at 8:10 a.m. in divisions A, B, C, D, and E. These classes will consolidate the ninth grade pupils in junior high school who enter on the first track. All first track pupils in both senior and junior high schools, not enrolled in a class this period, will report in a supervisor's office.

**Born Monday Morning**

On Monday, at 3:30 a.m., to birth a child, will enroll in the various Grade buildings Monday morning. September 6. Students of the senior high school will assemble in the auditorium at the high school for a short period Monday morning at 8:00 o'clock. All students of the senior high school are expected to be present. Students of the junior high school will assemble in the gymnasium at 8:10 a.m. Monday morning at 8:00 o'clock. Please be on hand.

**"Beginners" start Tuesday, September 7.** Those children entering school for the first time will begin in the "beginner" 1st grade, should not come until Tuesday morning. September 7. This will enable the principals and teachers to give a larger degree of attention to the incoming children than would be possible if they came at the beginning of the month. Similarly, a greater amount of attention to the smaller children when they start on Tuesday.

All pupils who enroll in grades one to six will enter the schools at their respective school buildings. Pupils in grades seven and eight will report to the junior high school. Pupils in grades nine, ten, eleven and twelve will report to the senior high school. After the first week of school, pupils entering the school-in-grade-one to six will be enrolled in the office of the supervisor of elementary grades in the health office of the junior high school, and will remain there until their work in the eighth grade has been entirely completed. They may have the privilege of enrolling in some subjects in the ninth grade, while the remaining grades, nine, ten, eleven and twelve, will constitute the senior high school. Pupils who enter the school for the purpose of attending institutes in the schools will be retained until their work in the eighth grade has been entirely completed.

The organization of the public schools of this city will be the same type and on the same plan as that of last year. The first six grades making up the elementary school; grades seven and eight constituting the junior high school, while the remaining

grades, nine, ten, eleven and twelve, will participate in high school athletics or other high school activities.

Those pupils who will be required to enter school must be at least six years of age on or before November 30, 1920. Also it is deemed inadvisable to enter pupils in the first 12th grade after the first three years of school. It is felt however, that as the child entering will not only be seriously handicapped in starting his first school year, but will also work a hardship on the child who cannot understand why he is not rightly entitled to these children.

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## EXPLAINS PLANS FOR HUGE PLANT

**Judge James R. Bothwell Addresses City Council Regarding Proposed Contract.**

Members of the Twin Falls city council spent most of their regular Monday evening session at the hall listening to an explanation of the proposed power plant contract.

Bothwell, electrical engineer for the construction of a \$1,000,000 multiple-pitch power plant on the Clear Lake site, North of Buell, explained the contract was signed by Judge James R. Bothwell, attorney for the contractors represented by Mr. Bibble.

### Favor Ordinance.

### Important Announcement

**LONG DISTANCE TELEPHONE SERVICE CHANGES**

**Effective October 1, 1926**

On all calls from points in the territory of the Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Company and to points in the territory of any other associated company

### Reductions in Long Distance Rates

To points 100 miles or more distant the rates will be substantially reduced. The standard rates, from Boise to San Francisco—the basic station-to-station rate will be \$3.35 instead of \$4.30; to Los Angeles \$3.15 instead of \$4.30; to Kansas City \$3.35 instead of \$7.35; to Chicago \$3.35 instead of \$9.35; to New York \$3.35 instead of \$14.50. The distances between 24 and 110 miles will be adjusted to make the schedule consistent throughout, but in these cases the increase of the basic station-to-station rate will be only five cents.

### Reversed Charges on Station-to-Station Calls

Notwithstanding the reversal of charges has been available only on person-to-person calls. As a further convenience to the public this privilege will be extended to station-to-station calls, where the rate is 25 cents or more.

### Longer Reduced Rate Period

Reduced rates for station-to-station calls will begin at 8:30 P. M. instead of 8:00 P. M. as formerly. Between 7 and 8:30 P. M. the discount will be approximately 45 per cent of the day station-to-station rates; from 8:30 P. M. to 4:30 A. M. the discount will be 45 per cent of the night rates. These discounts will apply where the day station-to-station rate is 40 cents or more, with a minimum reduced rate of 25 cents. Because of the existing midnight discount will be discontinued.

The same sort of these rate changes will be a saving to the telephone users of the United States of approximately \$1,000,000 a year. The service charges are made in the public convenience, to relieve the burden now imposed by the cost of business at midnight and to furnish still better long distance service.
