BRIDGE BUILDER TELLS OF PLANS

Charles G. Huber—Says Road Work on This Side Will Start at Once.

Assignment of the franchise grant of last September to R. M. Murray by the county commissioners of Twin Falls and Jerome counties for the building of a bridge over the Snake river was yesterday made to the Union Bridge company of Portland by Mr. Murray, and the assignment duly filed with the county recorder. A similar assignment was filed in Jerome county.

Charles G. Huber, president of the company since the death of its former president, George Sears, is now in Twin Falls, and yesterday gave out the following statement:

"I am here to arrange for the beginning of work on the bridge. Contractors have been asked for bids for the construction of the road through the Howe and Howe farms to the bridge. On the side of the river, options will be asked for at once looking to the purchase of the necessary right of way. The highway district will build this road."

To Build Piers
"As soon as it is completed, or as soon as it is so far completed as to permit building, the concrete piers on this side will be put in, but for this side can be done quite a large amount of work and hauling rock to the top of the canyon will have to be done, as well as cable ways and portable electric power on both sides of the canyon."

There is approximately half a mile of road work on this side, and three and eight-tenths miles on the north side, will be commenced on both sides at once, and we hope to get the concrete piers in on both sides before cold weather sets in. Steel work will commence as soon as possible next spring."

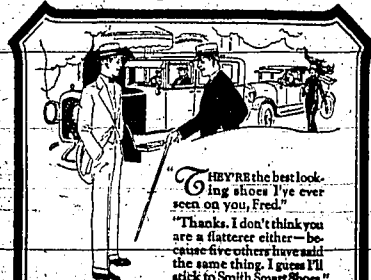

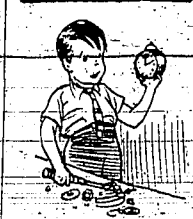

City Council Unanimous in Agreement To Probe Legality and Feasibility of Proposed Barry Dibble Power Contract

City Experts to Investigate Proposition for Municipal Electric Plant; J. S. Keel Offers Important Motion.

Members of the city council assembled in special session here Thursday evening signed an agreement which calls for a thorough investigation into the legality and feasibility of the contract proposed by Barry Dibble, hydroelectric engineer, for the construction of a municipal power plant on the Clear Lake site, north of Idaho. Should the opinion of the city's attorney and engineers confirm the legality of the contract and practicality of the specification, the agreement further provides that the power city officials shall sign the contract and the town shall be placed before the electorate of Twin Falls for final settlement.

The question as to the legality of the contract will be in the hands of the city attorney, Frank L. Stephens, whose final opinion will be based upon an investigation made by the attorneys for Mr. Dibble, attorneys for the Idaho Power company and a personal investigation.

Feasibility of the project will be checked by E. V. Berg, city engineer.

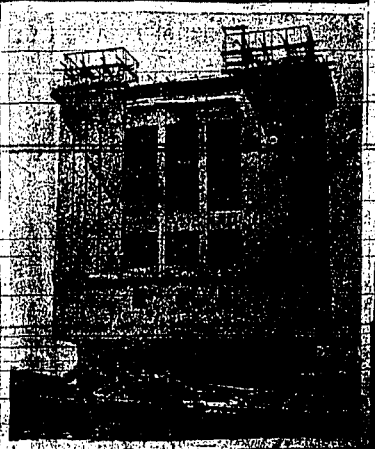

FRONTIER RELICS DOT SOUTHWEST

Carefully Preserved Mem-
tos of Pioneer Days Fleck
State's Modern Fronts.

KANSAS CITY, Sept. 7. (AP)—The southwestern states—where half a century ago still were frontiers of the west, now show modern fronts flecked with carefully preserved mementoes of the past.

Kansas extends to the automobile tourist the Santa Fe trail, 250 of the original buildings that still stand, with some windows and doors from prehistoric times. This old trail, used by the Indians, was marked in 1825 by order of President Monroe.

"Historic Kansas Spots"
Have been marked without cost or effort, now stand in Fort Riley in memory of a government that found the authors of the pioneer. This building was the seat of Territorial authority from 1853 until Kansas was admitted as a state in 1861. Melcher Lodge, built in the seat where the streets with the Kansas Indians was signed in 1860, also contains the home of Carrie Nation, prohibition leader.

In southern and western Missouri the "Old Trails" in this western life are the "Arkansas" in the Ozarks. The Arkansas river registers 58 degrees this year.

The Springs are the best known of the old Arkansas Springs, their popularity dating from 1832 when Hot Springs National park was created.

Indiana and Ohio
Oklahoma now is devoted to farming, with oil fields scattered here and there, and Indian reservations at frequent intervals. These reservations in the northern part of the state include those of the five civilized tribes.

Travelling south into Texas the tourist passes great cattle ranges and approaches numerous areas made famous by the Mexican wars.

Mexican War Reminders
San Antonio contains the Alamo, where Santa Anna's soldiers massacred an American force in the old church. Other missions with more peaceful histories and which antedate those in California still stand in this district. Near San Antonio also is the largest army post in the United States, and at Kelly and Brooks field the air training of the army is done.

A later chapter in the Mexican war was written at San Jacinto battlefield near Houston, where Santa Anna was routed and captured in 1835 by

General Sam Houston with 750 men. Told Santa Anna to leave the state. Appearing unexpectedly in the battle, he routed the army of 1,000 men.
