

BENDS EFFORTS TO SHOW METAL CLAIMS INVALID

Government Temporarily Abandons Attempt to Prove Conspiracy Involving High Officials: Merion Questioned

(By The Associated Press.)

NEW YORK, Sept. 14.—The government today formally abandoned its attempt to prove that Harry Campbell and Thomas J. Merriam conspired to defraud the United States and heard its efforts toward proving that the \$7,000,000 claim they paid to Clifford Merritt, German agent of the United States, was fraudulent.

The United States Attorney General had said he would prove a conspiracy whereby the claim was valid or merit.

The government's key witnesses were "bought"—with money—during the entire day—the fifth has again been the witness box—in an attempt by Mr. Buckner to prove that he knew the claims were false. Mr. Merritt also sought to show that Merriam was coached by W. L. Miller, first assistant to Miller, alien property custodian, to construct his claims in a manner that would cause them to appear legitimate.

Specific Charge.

The specific charge on which Daugherty and Miller are on trial, is "conspiring to defraud the United States of their unbiased, unprejudiced, honest and intelligent services." Testimony was adduced to show that Merion paid the late John T. King, republican national committeeman from Connecticut, fees amounting to \$44,000 for "rushing," his claims through the alien property custodian's office and having it passed by Daugherty then attorney general.

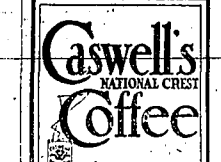

SPORTSMEN TO SHOW TROUT IN BEARING PONDS

Southern Idaho Fish and Game Association, at Meeting Marked by Many Important Measures; Issues Invitation.

Trout bearing ponds built here by the Southern Idaho Fish and Game Association, at which nearly 2000 little rainbow trout are approaching maturity, will be open for public inspection, next Monday, September 19. It was decided at the public meeting of the association held Tuesday evening in the Elks' club house and attended by nearly 100 persons, including delegates from Piler, Kimberly and other towns of the district.

Members of the association will be on hand to welcome visitors at the bearing ponds on this occasion, and to explain methods of raising trout and the feeding of the young trout. The ponds are situated in Black Creek canyon at the outlet of a drainage tunnel about a mile southwest from the town of Twin Falls.

Association members at their meeting Tuesday evening went on record in favor of a number of changes in the date of opening season for shooting and fishing in this region.

A. Bailey who argued that the change would provide for beginning hunting after most crops had been harvested, the association voted to recommend that the open season on pheasants begin October 15 instead of on October 1 as now does, and continue until December 15.

Members recommended also that the quail hunting season open November 1 and continue to November 15. As a measure for protection young trout released into Black Creek from the bearing ponds here, it was recommended that Black Creek and all its tributaries from the Elks' club to Snake river be closed to fishing from December 1 to April 1.

Suggestion was made by J. W. Hawkins, deputy state game warden, that the association recommend that permit be given for use of snags boats at the canal bridges at Silver and two miles up the Snake river at Lower Salmon falls for taking of mullet and herring. This suggestion was referred to the association's legislative committee.

The association voted indorsement of the suggestion that the state fish and game department be petitioned to close to fishermen from December 1 to June 1 all of the streams in the Wood river district including Black Wood river, Little Wood river and Silver creek.

Announcement was authorized by vote of the members that the association will supply fish from its bearing ponds here for planting in Snake river above Twin Falls and in Salmon river canyon, if sportsmen in these districts are willing to furnish transportation for the fish.

Three members, Shont, Stump and Hawkins, volunteered to give their time and attention to extermination of mulesquats frequenting the Twin Falls dam grounds.

Partridges Thawing.
Hungarian partridges, brought to this region a few years ago by the association, have increased so that there are now several coveys of the birds in this vicinity. It was reported to the meeting. The partridges are hunted by the game laws and there is no open season for shooting them. Request was made that all sportsmen lend their assistance in protecting the partridges.

Resolution setting forth a code of ethics for guidance of sportsmen in the field and on the stream was adopted by the meeting by unanimous vote on motion of J. G. Shont.

The meeting was presided over by Alvin Harbort, president of the association, who at the opening of the session outlined the association's work in connection with the handling of trout bearing ponds here, and in carrying on work in connection with this undertaking.

SPORTSMEN ADOPT CODE AS GUIDE TO CONDUCT ON FIELD AND STREAM

Observance of the personal and property rights of others is one of the clearest in the sportsman's code adopted Tuesday evening by the Southern Idaho Fish and Game association as a guide to the conduct of true sportsmen in the field and on the stream.

It is the complete text of the code:

Whereas, one of the principal objects of the Southern Idaho Fish and Game association is the promotion of good sportsmanship and whereas, the members of this organization firmly believe that the due observance of the laws of this state pertaining to fish and game, and of the rights of others, both personal and property, constitute the primary ethics of such sportsmanship, and with the idea that certain fundamental ethics may be brought to the attention, and into the minds of the members of this organization, that by observance thereof may have a tendency to create and stimulate better sportsmanship both within and without the ranks of the organization, therefore, be it resolved, that we, the members of this association adopt the following code as a guide to our conduct:

1. That I will not go upon the lands of any person or persons for the purpose of hunting, either with dog or gun, without first having obtained the consent of the occupant thereof.

2. That I will respect the rights of such owner or occupant by closing all gates through which I may enter, and that I will not go upon any land upon which there may be any growing or unharvested crops, whereby damage to such crops may result.

3. That I will not shoot towards or in line with, any stock or buildings within the extreme range of such fire arms as I may have in my possession, and that I will not in any manner injure or destroy any fence, building or other improvement located upon the premises of another.

4. That I will not exceed the bag limit as prescribed by the laws of this state.

GRANDMA'S PROUD.

5. That I will not carry a loaded gun in a car or other conveyance.
