Miami Destroyed by Great Tropical Storm; Human Toll 70 Known Dead

Hundred-Mile Gale Wrecks Havoc Along Southern Coast; \$100,000,000 Damage to Property; All Boats in Harbor Sunk and Docks Destroyed.

(By The Associated Press).

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 19.—The following message was received here early this morning by the Tropical Radio station from Miami:

"Miami is in ruins after worst hurricane in history of country, 70 known dead. Property damage \$100,000,000. More than 2000 buildings destroyed, including bank building and

"City docks completely destroyed and all boats in harbor sunk including steamship Nohub, formerly owned by ex-kaiser of Germany. Food, medical supplies and troops needed."

The message was sent from a makeshift radio station in Miami after the six 160-foot towers of the Tropical Radio Station there were destroyed.

KEEPS LIQUOR OUT OF COURT

R. L. Kidd of Milner Escapes Prosecution When Magistrate Rules Against Admission.

Charges of illegal possession of liquor against R. L. Kidd of Milner were dropped on motion of prosecuting attorney J. W. LIQUOR TRIAL FIRST OF TERM

Jury to Pass on Charges Against Harvey Williamson, Accused of Second Offense Possession.

The first jury of the September term of district court here under argument by Judge William H. PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 18. (AP)—Jack Dempsey, world's heavy-weight champion, has scored forty-seven knockouts in the battles fought since he started to punch his way to a world's title. He won thirteen contests on decisions, lost two decisions, fought a quartet of draws, and was knocked out once in his career—the veteran Jim Flynn stopping him in a round early in his career.

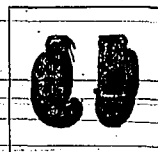

Gene Tunney—Contender For The Heavyweight Title

Growth of Cities Raises Problem of Civil Government

Metropolitan Communities May
Be Separate States in Future;
Many Overlap From One
State to Another.

CHICAGO, Sept. 18 (AP)—Through hundreds of years from the days of ancient Greece and Rome down to the time of more modern times the city-state has made its mark in political history.

Now a few advanced political economists are discussing the possibility of some leading American cities having political entities or city-states, Chicago and New York particularly.

These spheres of influence and control have crossed the borders of their own states, are prominently mentioned.

Tax Question.

The continued warfare between the urban and country districts of such states as Illinois and New York is even to another reason why a separation of a city from the rest of the state is within the range of possibilities. The anti-tax spirit in "no taxation without representation," has been raised in both Illinois and New York. The two largest cities in the country both have complained that they are not equitably represented in the state legislatures in proportion to their population, wealth, influence and the size of the tax bill. In Illinois, for instance, a dovetailed majority has balked every attempt of Chicago representatives to get through a Chicago reapportionment program, which it is claimed, is provided in the state constitution.

Propose New State.

The metropolitan district of New York is in three states, New York, New Jersey, and Connecticut. Chicago has overrun northern Illinois and its suburbs reach into Wisconsin and Indiana. A city, however, cannot push its limits across the border into any other state, so that in the case of New York and Chicago artificial barriers break up what is really a unified metropolitan district.

Some Chicagoans, feeling that their city is not fairly treated in state affairs, have proposed a new state of Northern Illinois and adjacent territory of which Chicago is the center. A Chicago legislator recently asked the census bureau to include in the metropolitan census, all persons in a five-mile radius from the city's center.

The government could only reply that it could not include citizens of another state. The Chicago city limits parallel the Indiana border for several miles. Across the line are the great steel centers of Hammond, Milledgeville City and Gary, allied to the industrial agencies of South Chicago.

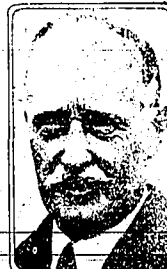

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Sept. 18

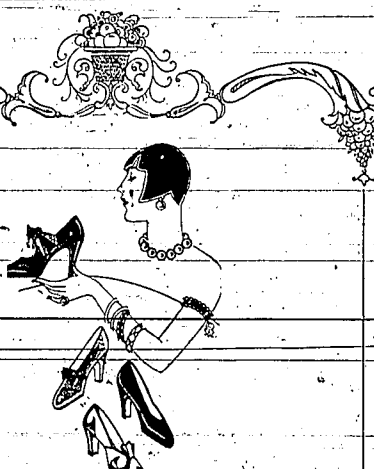

BUNGALOW IDEA INVADES FRANCE

Modern "Pavilions" Rapidly
Gaining Popularity in Nation
of Uncomfortable Villages.

PARIS, Sept. 18. (AP)—The bungalow idea is spreading rapidly in France. Scores of little houses are being constructed in every suburb about Paris for people who a few years ago thought it would be beneath their dignity to live in anything less than a large and comfortable villa, with several servants to keep things in order.

The French middle classes took to the "pavilions" as they were called at first, as part of the post-war barter, but now finding them compact, comfortable and of light upkeep, are accepting them gladly as a regime from the drudgery and expense of the old-fashioned house.

Ten thousand invalids from Italy, Germany, Austria and England will have made the trip to Lourdes during the month if the present flow continues. An Italian delegation, numbering 500, is expected on Monday. It will be headed by Cardinal Lucini and 10 bishops and archbishops.

CHICAGO STREET HONORS ANCIENT SCOTCH CASTLE

CHICAGO, Sept. 18. (AP)—Eighteen story apartments are now being erected where the great Chicago fire reached its limit in what was then almost open country along the lake. By chance, the building of this latest new skyscraper has arrived in time to light one of the most curious incidents connected with the history of Chicago and yet reaching back centuries ago across the Atlantic.

Right in the middle of what is now known as the "burning" of the city, at the edge of Lincoln Park, within a few feet of Chicago's Italian quarter, stands the "castle" of which the great fire burned itself out. PRESIDENT'S LETTERS IN CONGRESS LIBRARY

WASHINGTON, Sept. 18 (AP)—The vaults of the Library of Congress yesterday revealed valuable collections of presidential papers located in the library's vaults, which are to be made public after 25 years under the will of the late President.

Linked in steel compartments of the library's manuscript department are the presidential papers of Cleveland, Roosevelt and Taft. They are kept in pigeon holes, but until further orders are given by those having them in charge, the papers of President Cleveland and Roosevelt may have the right of access to these collections, and this permission has been given occasionally for biographical or scientific research.

Chief Justice Taft placed his communications as president in the library's vaults, some years ago. No further order may be necessary to remove them from him in writing. The collection of Charles A. Bonaparte, attorney-general under Roosevelt, also is held pending further instructions.

These statements belong to the present generation, or were a show to it that they or their executors felt that publication should be delayed until political animosities had faded and personal misunderstandings been forgotten. Custodians of the papers say there is little or nothing in them that would cause diplomatic embarrassment, but matters which might reopen old wounds or revive slanders, contrived with the years, and there will be no reason to withhold publicity.

SCIENTIST ADVANCES NEW THEORY FOR FINDING ORE

MINNEAPOLIS, Sept. 18 (AP)—A University of Minnesota scientist has advanced the theory of the way metal ore is deposited in the ground and the places where they may be found, which has been accepted as law in geologic science. He is Dr. W. H. Benson, head of the department of geology.

The theories which Dr. Benson has worked out during 20 years of research, have attracted so much attention that he has been asked to explain them before the American Institute of Mining and Metallurgical Engineers and the Society of Economic Geology, both meeting in New York next winter.

"Complete mineral veins are slightly formed," Dr. Benson said, "by hot water building up from inside the earth along the face of underground masses of magma, pushing toward the surface. These hot springs contain various metals in solution which are deposited along the course of the stream of water in the lower areas of their solubility."

"Thus the metal that is at least mile will be deposited first and will be found near the bottom of a vein."

DRAIN ZUYDER ZEE TO MAKE GRAZING LANDS

VOLENDAAM, Holland, Sept. 18 (AP)—Holland is draining the Zuyder Zee in order to make more grazing land for the fat cattle who supply the world with Dutch cheese.

When the feat is accomplished this town, long one of the show spots of the Netherlands will be a leeward town without a harbor. The harbor, which is now a lake, will be left high and dry and the pink creaked Dutch girls who parade the dykes on Sunday when the fleet is in port will no longer have any reason for parading.

Other towns of the Zuyder Zee will share Volendam's fate. The villages which have always been connected with the sea must turn to agriculture or become extinct. Tourists who go to Zuyder Zee towns to see the traditional costumes and hearty fishermen must go elsewhere when the bed of the Zuyder Zee has been annexed to the little Zuyder Zee dykes.

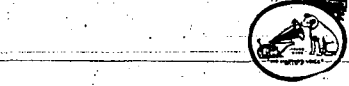

Persons of Short Limbs

Not Hard to Classify

If accidents and disease could be eliminated, it would be quite easy to classify mankind into "long-limbs" and those who will live to seventy years and upwards—and those whose span of life will be in the neighborhood of the fifties.

Scientific men and scientists are in agreement in stating that a long trunk and short limbs are infallible indications of longevity. The long trunk means that the organs of the body—heart, lungs, liver, and so on, are sound and fully developed, with plenty of room for functioning.

Trunk length, too, means longer organs, and investigation has proved that the smallest hearts and lungs are always long. Under normal conditions tuberculosis never attacks long lungs, nor does heart disease attack long hearts.

Smaller, but interesting, indications of longevity are long hands with short (but not stumpy) fingers, and wide nostrils. The latter may or may not accompany large noses, but the nostrils must be large and prominent.

"Brain longevity" is indicated by the position of the ear nostrils. The latter should be low. This always betokens a good quality, deep-seated brain.

WARNER WOULD DISCARD PASS

Stanford's Famous Football Coach Comes Out Flatly Against Aerial Attack

SPRINGFIELD, N. Y., Sept. 10. (AP) — Stanford's famous football coach, who would like to see the forward pass scrapped.

"The forward pass is all wrong," the veteran mentor and writer told the Associated Press shortly before leaving his old home here for Palo Alto, California, to take up his fall duties.

"It has changed football from a thoroughbred sport into a mongrel cross between basketball and the game of base."

Suggests New Kicking Rules.

"The kicking rule, properly changed, would give the same results the forward pass was supposed to produce. The latest effect of the rule committee shows the aerial game is not yet satisfactory, and I look for more drastic changes a year from now. My teams have made their share of touchdowns by the football method, and we will continue to use until the end. But I'd like to see it ruled out and go back to unadorned football."

During the year, in 1926, the rule makers realized that in order to open up the game, ball carrying would require something like the forward pass, but the forward pass was not a part of the game.

Respect Public Opinion.

"But as public opinion must be respected, I think it would be out of the question to change the rule, or to rule it out as a feature of the game that has become so popular."

The Stanford coach fired his verbal grenades at football as it is played today while reclining in the shade of the old apple tree on his farm here. The pleasant shade of the tree moved "You" to say something of climate and sport.

Best Football in West.

"I think the best football in the country is played out there," said Stanford.

"Not because of better coaching or because the boys know any more about the game. The first reason is meteorological. There are fewer colleges and therefore the high schools keep them well supplied with well trained players. The second reason goes back to climate. Western weather, and with comparatively little rain during the football season, a coach and team generally get good fields for their games."

Sierra Leone as Home for Liberated Slaves

The first attempt to found an African colony in western Africa was made 150 years ago, when Sierra Leone, on the west coast of Africa, was organized for that purpose. Doctor Bartholomew was author of the scheme, and Captain Thompson, in 1786, purchased the territory from "King Tom" of the Timmanees, and began the settlement with 400 negroes and 50 Europeans.

The hostility of the natives and the complete shiftlessness of the black colonists resulted in the complete failure of the first settlement. In 1810 the survivors were collected and a new one was started with a colony of 1,500 negroes from Nova Scotia and the Bahamas. The American negroes were more successful than the first, but the black colonists from England, Ireland, and India, and Sierra Leone, became a prosperous colony. The present republic of Liberia was started as a refuge for escaped slaves and freed blacks by the American Colonization society in 1820, but it was not until 1847 that it became an independent republic.

Effects of Emotions.

Alchemists of Middle Ages Not Charlatans

"The alchemists of three or four centuries ago were the chemists of their day," says Dr. E. F. F. Free, writing in the Forum. "They were honest, industrious, respected. It is always surprising to imagine that the great men of another age were either knaves or fools. We define gold, today, in a chemical fashion. We know of certain chemical tests to which the action of no element except gold will respond. We apply these tests. If they fail we say that the substance before us is not gold, no matter how gilt it may be nor how gold-like may be its properties."

"This is a new way to define gold. The alchemists had no acquaintance with atoms nor were they much concerned with chemical tests. When they wanted gold, what they wanted was something which would look like gold, would feel like gold, would behave like gold against the air and water and fire. Such tests constituted their definition of gold. If a metal met them, that was enough."

"It is distinctly possible that a number of the alchemical procedures really did produce just what the alchemists were seeking. It is possible that we define it as gold; something that was gold as the alchemists defined it. A number of them recorded that they had made gold; they tried directions for making it. Fifty or sixty were faithful liars or they had made something that suited them. And it is not very probable that they were liars. We know how to make today a number of things that look enough like gold to be fit to wear. Even jewelry have been fooled by some of these alloys. Probably this is the last what a few of our ancient fellow chemists did and what they considered, rightly enough, to be a considerable success."

CROP HARVEST IN FULL SWING

Weather Bureau Report Tells
of Activities on Twin Falls
County Farms.

Crop harvest is in full swing in Twin Falls county, according to a field report published in the summary of weather and crop conditions for the week ending last Tuesday issued by the United States weather bureau in Boise. The report says:

A clear, dry week, with a slight frost morning or evening, has been so far as crop conditions are concerned, but the report says that the weather was generally favorable for farm work and rapid progress was made. Frost damaged much of the early crop in the lower places in the Burley district, but most crops are matured and beyond frost danger. Early potatoes are being dug and processed. Potatoes are mostly picked, and apple picking is getting under way.

Regarding conditions generally the summary says: Seasonable temperatures were the rule during the week in southwest Idaho. No rain was reported and sunshine was ample. Weather conditions were favorable for farm work and rapid progress was made. Frost damaged much of the early crop in the lower places in the Burley district, but most crops are matured and beyond frost danger. Early potatoes are being dug and processed. Potatoes are mostly picked, and apple picking is getting under way.

In the southeast, temperatures were more normal during the week with the exception of the 10th, which was in the 70's above the normal. No rain fell in the district and sunshine was close to 100 per cent. Frost, severe enough to kill potato vines and corn, occurred locally in Blaine county. Corn is maturing rapidly in most sections, but the total average is generally in good condition, but feeding will begin soon if the frost range is not revised by a general rain.

Frost and rain weather during the first part of the week, checked farm operations in the north, but was of great benefit to late potatoes and head lettuce. Generally fair and cool weather has prevailed since Tuesday. Potatoes are being harvested in the Juliania section. Corn, which is under way in the Lapwai and Coldwater sections, has been harvested in full swing in the higher parts of the district. Head lettuce is being cultivated and apples are coloring rapidly. Potatoes and oranges are improving and stock is in good condition.

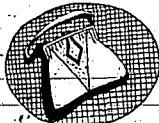

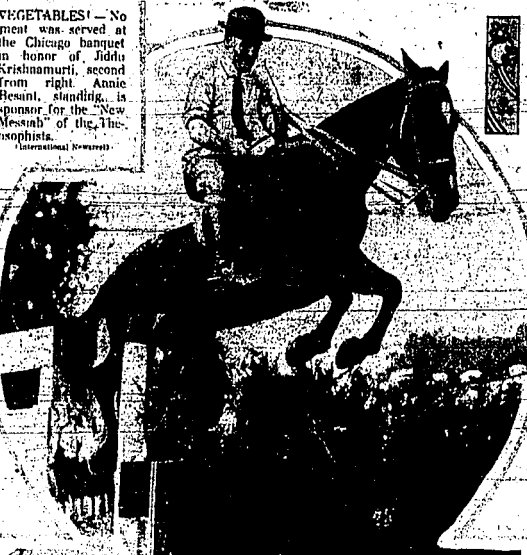

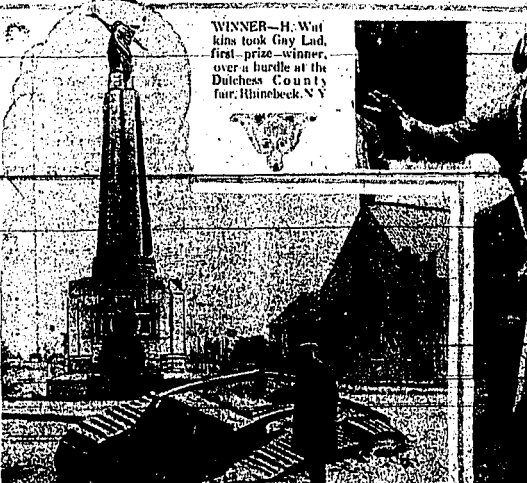

President A. H. Upham Asks Cooperation of Faculty Members in Making Best of Overcrowded School Conditions.

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, Sept. 18.—The problem of overcrowding, which is the result of the university's growth, was presented to the faculty by President A. H. Upham at the first meeting of the year held Tuesday morning. President Upham asked the cooperation of his staff in making the best of conditions which are unresolvable at present.

The situation has developed, the president stated, because of the rapid increase in enrollment during the last five years. In 1921 the university had 100 students. The "turnover" of the faculty is almost exactly 10 per cent, the president said. The appointment of 29 new members has successfully tried to maintain the 10 per cent level but has maintained only for the last three years.

ARMY OF WOMEN SCRUBS CHICAGO OFFICE FLOORS

CHICAGO, Sept. 18.—(AP)—Business men and building owners of Chicago's central business district, known as "the loop," pay \$3111 each night to have the office floors scrubbed. The work is done by women.

A rate of 12 cents an hour is paid each of 1375 women, who also receive the same pay for scrubbing, which is done from 10 to 12 hours a night. They do not have any union, and are among the few workers here who are not organized.

The cleaners are in charge of the building janitor who belongs to one of the strongest unions here, and who draws a "salary," check twice a month that makes the ordinary white collar worker envious of his weekly stipend.

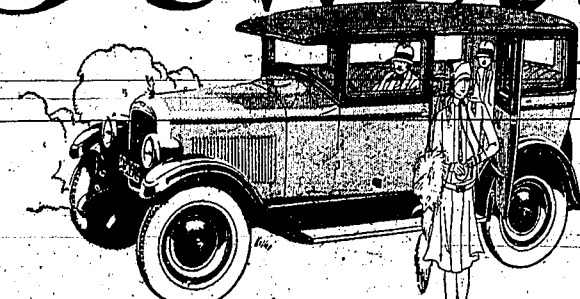

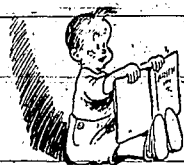
