

TOLL COUNTS AS
ABRIDGED STORM
DEMONSTRATES CHECK

Latest Count Reveals 400
Known Dead, 5000 Injured
and 50,000 Homeless in Wake
of Florida Hurricane.

(By the Associated Press.)
MIAMI, Fla., Sept. 21.—At least 400 dead and 5,000 injured, and 50,000 homeless—the known toll of human life and suffering since the hurricane struck Florida's southeastern coast in the tropical hurricane.

At Miami the death toll increased as the hurricane gave up more of its dead. Authorities said the toll probably would reach 500, although it was around 200 tonight. Hospitals and Red Cross stations here treated more than 1,000 injured during the day, many of them only slightly hurt.

Many killings.
At Hollywood the death toll was 32, with possibly eight others yet to be brought in and with 70 persons listed as missing. Reports here included names of the dead, and definitely dead and the toll had been announced in 15 known dead. It is believed that many of the missing listed in the interior when the first hurricane approached and who may be still missing, are probably dead. There were about 250 injured listed at Hollywood today and slightly over 200 of them were definitely located and treated. A score or more at Hollywood were listed as seriously injured.

Port Lauderdale.
Port Lauderdale's death toll remained at 13 during the day but the list of seriously injured increased to 300 as the interior sections were reached. The victims brought in. 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WHEAT VALUES SCARE ADVANCE

Scarcity of Supplies at Liverpool Together With Wintry Weather Boosts Prices.

CHICAGO, Sept. 21. (AP)—Wheat prices made a rapid advance today in response to bank general buying. Scarcity of supplies at Liverpool, together with more falls, delaying the anticipated movement, raised prices of the Canadian boundary, did much to stimulate demand. Chicago clearing south of wheat was strong, rising 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 cents higher, from 13 1/2 to 14 1/2 cents a bushel to 14 1/2 to 15 1/2 cents, and provisions advanced 1/4 to 1/2 cent.

Unexported live wheat in Liverpool wheat values served to focus attention on news that British stocks of wheat are declining at a faster rate than in August. Furthermore, the latest available estimate of European wheat production this season, 22,000,000 bushels, indicated a greater falling off than has been generally supposed of it. On the other hand, the world's available supply, increased 7,000,000 bushels for the week.

Wheat Export Outlook.
Apparent likelihood of a better outlet for export business in wheat by way of Gulf of Mexico has taken on an element of high interest, rates being asked \$100 a bushel. Export sales of 200,000 bushels from the Atlantic seaboard were reported today. Liverpool charterers bid for 80,000 bushels to 100,000 bushels, as well as 50,000 bushels to Buffalo. Notice was also taken of a fact of last summer's primary supplies of wheat being less than in the year, which is a factor in the advance.

STOCK MARKET REGISTERS RECOVERY FROM SLUMP

NEW YORK, Sept. 21. (AP)—A general recovery took place in today's stock market which overcame an early selling streak and bounded upward under the leadership of prominent issues such as United States Steel and Allied Chemical. Solidified rallies were suggested by a number of high grade rails, public utilities and industrials which net gains of 3 to 6 points were common.

A 1/2 per cent recovery rate for call loans, the highest since March 1, had a temporarily unsettling effect on the market. It was believed that the celebration would soon compel an advance in the federal reserve discount rate. This selling, however, was easily absorbed and prices headed upward, aided by the covering of short loans put out after the first reports of the Florida disaster yesterday.

Coincident with the heavy buying of United States Steel, Allied Chemical and the short interest in copper, reports were circulated in Wall street that the tax or undistributed income would be reduced half next year. The distribution was made to stockholders. Officers of these companies, however, denied that hints of any such action had been received.
