FIVE-DAY WEEK FOR FORD'S MEN

Automobile Manufacturer Announces Inauguration of New Standard for Laborers.

DETROIT. Sept. 25 (AP)—Henry Ford has another change in the conduct of his business. He will make his announcement of a \$3, eight-hour day sooner more than 10 years ago, official announcement came today that the five-day week is to be the standard for all Ford's men.

That should be so was his announced intention 10 years ago when some few departments of his automobile plants were put on such a basis. In fact, it took a number of shifts were given the five-day week and now as rapidly as possible the folly free Saturday as well as Sunday is to be granted to all men engaged in the half a hundred fields of labor controlled by Ford.

Eight-Hour Day.

The day is to continue at eight hours without overtime. Wages are to be held to the six hours of pay according to merit. It is hoped that all workers will repay the extra day of leisure with efforts warranting their being granted this extra standard.

The new plan may go into effect in every branch of Ford's industries immediately, but will be gradually introduced as it already has been in many departments.

There is a difference in machinery in almost every office given for the possibility of shortening the day. Six days' work can now be done in five with improved methods. It is said, so that the innovation entails no decrease in production.

Caste System of Old Japan Bars Way of Romance

TOKYO. Sept. 25 (AP)—Japanese pride of caste which caused a poor man to commit suicide over his love for a girl of the highest social order has created an unusual romance situation arousing much sympathy throughout Japan.

General Baron Tanaka is one of the world's most famous prominent Japanese. He is head of the powerful Seiyaku party and, at any time, may be the premier of Japan. Lieutenant Nakayuki Kozawa comes from a poor family, however, but a family of pride in its ancestry.

Grew Up With Daughter.

In his extreme youth he was put into service and became one of the servants of Baron Tanaka. There he met his future wife, Nakayuki, the sweet sixteen-year-old daughter of the general.

From the first Baron Tanaka conceived a liking for the boy and soon he was almost like one of the family.

The general, who had a young daughter, the liaison decided to give the youth an education, so put him through school and later, through his great influence in the army, obtained his commission as a second lieutenant.

In the meantime, it was apparent to all that Yutaka and Kozawa were madly in love with each other.

Baron Tanaka did not object, and he wanted his daughter to be happy. But there was a mother of family.

Bought Boy's Adoption.

SHIPPING BOARD TO SELL LINES

Makes New Effort to Attract
American Capital in Develop-
ment of Merchant Marine.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25.—(UPI)— Moved by the shipping board and the American Lines, who are associated with shipping during the next few months will do much to reveal the future of the American merchant marine.

Two factors are converging to aid in solving the problem and to feel public opinion—the possibility of retaining the merchant fleet to private ownership.

In an effort to attract American capital, the shipping board has thrown the United States into the American market, with the requirement that all bids be here at noon, November 8. The merchant marine planning committee, a group within the board, has before it the task of holding countrywide hearings in the fall to receive recommendations from the maritime industry. The senate, at the suggestion of Chairman Jones of the senate commerce committee, has requested this information by January 1, next year.

Many Ships Sold

In its efforts to place the various lines under private operation, the board has in the last four disposed of about 300 vessels. These included the sales of the Pan American line passenger and mail ship *Eric* between New York and Miami; the *Eric* to the Orient service; the *Eric* to the Puget Sound and the Orient to the Dutch interests.

The government is also disposing of its services, reaching the point where the United States lines have the freight services between the Gulf and the Atlantic coast to the east of that continent—the board has just decided to withdraw entirely from the South American trade.

With the United States lines and the American Merchant Lines sold, the shipping board will find itself almost of all its "crack" services, but with about a dozen important freight services reaching major parts of the world, among them the *Eric*.

Eric Far Ahead

The United States lines form a unit of the Emergency Fleet corporation and are operated directly by the government. As an evidence of the importance of the shipping board in the development of the north Atlantic trade, the board points to the sale of tickets as far as two years ahead. This service, which includes the liner Leviathan, operates an express passenger and freight service from New York to Europe.

The American Merchant Association, freight and passengers between American Atlantic and northern European ports, are now operated through an agent, J. H. Winchester & Company, Inc., of New York city.

NEGRO SLAVE MARRIAGES RECOGNIZED BY BUREAU

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25 (AP)—Slave marriages among the negroes of the south have been recognized by the pension bureau.

The Bureau was that of Clotie E. Brown, now living at St. Paul, Minnesota, the widow of Matthew Brown, a slave, who after he was freed enlisted with the Douglas independent battery, United States colored light artillery.

The slaves were married before freedom, according to slave custom. The widow wrote to Service Ships' Board, asking that her husband be granted pension act, on the theory that the wedding took place after Brown's service with the Union army.

After the letter explaining the earlier slave marriage, the increase was allowed.

Few Snakes Harmful

Most common snakes are beneficial. In their natural environment they are beneficial. NEW YORK, Sept. 25 (UPI)—The shrinkage of the world through the use of radio communication has permitted Buddies—two young men who maintain an intimate friendship for seven years, although their work often kept them actually "in world apart,"

The practice of the "buddies" came to light recently when they were so far separated that their messages, serious and joking, had to be relayed through their home office.

In Tropics and Arctic.

The two are now "buddies" now with the Johannesburg-Chrysler Expedition in Tanganyika Territory, East Africa, and Maurice Kellerman, with the George Palmer Putnam Expedition on the island of Morrissey off Greenland, near the Arctic Ocean, hunting the morse.

The most recent message sent from Johannesburg to Kellerman follows in punctuated form but otherwise as it was received:







Thirty Billion Toothpicks Are Made Annually in the United States for Markets Throughout Civilized World

WISCONSIN, Wis., Sept. 25 (AP)—Toothpicks, however lowly they may be, hold their place in the mouths of the people, and they are one of the few manufactured products that are in demand everywhere.

Thirty billion, the annual product of a specialized industry, are produced annually in the United States, E. E. Smith, official of a toothpick manufacturing firm here, estimated.

The toothpick, which consists of white birch, poplar and basswood, is then grafted and polished, and the world's standard, came into the market about 20 years ago, he explained.

Successor Gold-Ore

"There is another," he said, "there was the gold plated, everlasting toothpick of grandfather's day, as much a part of his personal equipment as the key to his watch; a little later we had the very sanitary, quite popular, toothpick of the Japanese, the military officer made in Japan."

"The bulk of the world's supply of toothpicks is produced in six principal factories in the United States: four of them in the Midwest, in the cities of Grand Rapids, Phillips and Winona, one is in Wisconsin, and one in Chippewa, Minnesota."

Toothpicks are not a by-product of some other industry, but many other commercial articles are by-products of toothpicks. The industry today is so very solid, multiplying the picks against each other until they acquire the satiny finish that is characteristic of the American toothpick."

Made in Winter

"The toothpicks are cut on only in the cold months of the year. The ideal season for making toothpicks is said to be from December 1 to April 15.



Johnson was so pleased with the gift that he invited Pepper to his home to thank him. Pepper accepted the invitation and went to the forge to make a coat of mail for the judge to use. He left the government's estate temporarily, selected the finest piece of steel available, and tailored Judge Pepper a coat.

On the same street a couple of blocks away is another great railroad terminus, that of the Chicago & Northwestern, built without a flaw.
