Cardinals' Victory Fitting Climax to Hard Race for Flag

NEW YORK, Sept. 25. (AP)—The penultimate victory of the St. Louis Cardinals, a "fitting climax" to the "most wonderful race in the history of our league," John A. Hoadley, National League president, told The Associated Press.

The league executive paid high tribute to the new champions, and especially praised the manner in which the four eastern teams, though in the second division, have fought their way to the top.

"Not a breath of suspicion or charge of partiality clouded the last stage of this great race," Mr. Hoadley declared. "The test of his statement follows:

In many ways it has been the most wonderful race in the history of our league. And it does seem a most fitting climax that St. Louis should win the first pennant in a year that excelled all others for thrills, epicness, closeness and unbrokenness. That the St. Louis victory is the most popular the country ever gave without saying."

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Expect to Pass Million Dollar Mark in Series

Huge Figure Apparently Well Established as Financial Goal for Baseball's Classic; Passes Three Times.

NEW YORK, Sept. 25. (AP)—The million-dollar world series apparently is well established as a financial goal for baseball's classic; passes three times.

Receipts for the last three major league classics have gone well beyond this mark and with the game's biggest draw, the Yankee Stadium, available for part of the coming struggle, there is every prospect that the high total of \$10,000,000 will be reached.

The fact that the championships of the past three seasons have run to six million dollars every time has helped swell the "figures," but the odds still favor the battle going close to the limit. Only one series in over a score of years has been divided into four straight games, that of 1911 when the Braves trounced the Athletics.

Record Set in 1925.

Last year's struggle between the Pittsburgh Pirates and Washington Senators set a new high mark in total receipts, although the attendance, \$2,500,000, fell a little below the record of the previous two years. This was set in 1923.

It was in Pittsburgh and Washington that the 1923 championship between the Yankees and Cardinals established an attendance mark of \$20,000,000 in six games.

It was made possible through the use of the game's biggest two cities, the Yankee Stadium and Polo Grounds, which last year broke this fall.

The same series also established a single game attendance record of 62,430, with crowd receipts of \$201,430.

New York Roars Its Welcome to World Champion

Tunney Escorted Through Cheering Lanes of People to City Hall to Receive Tribute of Home-Town Folk.

NEW YORK, Sept. 25. (AP)—Huge and festive crowds lined the streets of New York and roared a welcome home to the native son.

Arriving from Philadelphia, scene of his conquest at noon, the first New Yorker to be world's champion heavyweight, was escorted by police through cheering hordes of people to city hall where Mayor "Jimmy" Walker made him welcome home in the name of the city.

A lunch at an uptown hotel with "Big Tim" Mara as host, followed and then, with his public satisfied, the champion hurried away to his family. Before the autumn merges he will visit the north country for a vacation with his mother.

The public reception for the returning first hero was arranged on short notice, but the crowd made up in ardor what it lacked in numbers. About 12,000 cheered as the champion returned the scene of two companies of uniformed and cheered the city hall to hear Mayor Walker say:

"Well done."

The mayor paid tribute to Tunney the boxer, marine and man.

Tunney, responding to the mayor's welcome, thanked all who have helped him with him at his success, with particular emphasis on his old neighbors in Greenwich village, "who, adhered to me and led me in."

"I suffered a blow, or several blows on the throat the other night in Philadelphia," said the boxer in explaining a husky speaking voice.

Idaho Mentor Declares, However, Selection Is Only Tentative; Must Make Grade.

Sept. 21 (Special to The News).—The first faint inkling that Idaho football fans have had as to possible coach for this fall was given by Coach Charles Erb this week in the selection of tentative first and second squads. Erb made it plain it was not the division of his squads that the selections were merely tentative and that it would not be surprising to see "muds" either squad, still had a chance at a first string berth. Competition is so keen and so determined that it could not be surprising to see almost any of the aspirants land on the first eleven. At present, however, the best performer included in the two groups appear to be the cream of the material.

Owings Shows More Drive. The backfield of squad No. 1 has been showing up especially well in the first scrimmage. "Red" Jacoby and Frank Powers, both of whom were quarter backs last year, have been alternating at the pilot position. On the wings Erb has Herbert Custer, a senior, and Jim O'Hara, a freshman, and Byron Harris, junior, with one year's "giddy" experience. "Pop" Clark, a sophomore, is the team's forward wall, and Carl Hutchison, a sophomore, is at the tackle position. Charles Gartin, another back in the 1925 line, is a "veteran" and a "fighter" with a "veteran" experience, and Frankland, former Idaho Tech player, are doing duty at guard. At center is "Bud" Miles, reserve man last year.

A number of men on the second squad are making good college men showings, the line men especially. The two lines have been snapping mightily over every kick of ground in scrimmage. Like her other works, "The Chilkoot Maiden" is in English in furtherance of Mrs. Freer's lifelong effort to establish opera in this language.

The Chilkoot maiden was her English sweetheart of this Indian tradition in time to save the party of white men, as she ventured to join her native companions.

FRANCO-GERMAN TREATY
HOUSES MANY DEFECTS

PARIS, Sept. 25. (AP)—Twenty months of negotiations after interrupted but resumed at the last minute, have resulted in a Franco-German commercial treaty, which the French are now declaring to be a very small mouse indeed as the outcome of such momentous labors.

The defects found in it are that it only lasts six months and that it only deals with secondary products. With the exception of automobiles, the leading products of the contracting countries are not to be found in the treaty. There is no mention of German machinery, chemical, metallurgical goods and very little of French wines.

Allotted Territory

A "sphere of influence" may be described as an area wherein other powers undertake not to attempt to establish influence or territory by treaty or annexation. Such British spheres exist in the Persian gulf and in Arabia.

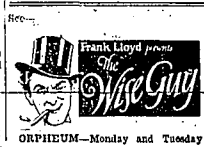

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STEPHAN LIKES TERM USED BY PARTY ENEMIES

Nominee for Attorney General Advises Republicans to Accept 'Style of Machine' for Organization.

Acceptance by Idaho republicans of the term "machine" as applied to political parties is the opinion of the republican party in Idaho was expressed by Frank L. Stephan, nominee for attorney general, at a meeting of about 20 members of the republican committee and republican candidates for legislative and county offices at dinner Saturday evening at the Club.

"Industrial leaders and business men," Mr. Stephan asserted, "are proud to have their organization described as machines. I am sure you can use the word machine to describe your party. It is a machine, and a big machine, and a big membership of honest, wide-awake and hard-working American citizens should accept the term of the term to their organization."

Over-confidence is the only real enemy that the republican party in Idaho has, Mr. Stephan declared. Candidates and committee members expressing concern on the proposition that the party organization in Twin Falls county should have an organization committee, with the idea of "being for all and all for one," as a means of support of the party's candidates, which the chairman's sentiments with respect to the prospect for victory.

The gathering included eight women who have been designated as leaders of the party in as many precincts, in accordance with a resolution adopted at the county convention, and appointment of other women precinct leaders was announced.

Miss Gladys Schuchman, chairman of the county committee, presided at the meeting, and the chairman's remarks were given in the campaign.

Each candidate and several of the committee members were invited to express individual views as to the manner in which the campaign should be conducted.

Emphasis was laid by several speakers on the importance of securing registration of voters and getting out the largest possible vote at the election.

Large Newspapers Little Affected By Trend Toward Modern Methods of Industrialization; Personal Affair

CHICAGO, Sept. 25. (AP)—The newspaper is one of the few enterprises of the modern life to escape the trend toward industrialization, or the substitution of outside financial control for the personal management of the enterprise.

Newspapers generally are and have been under the direction of one man, or one family, a personal rather than a public enterprise.

A recent series of deaths of powerful newspaper heads, most of them without families to hand down the tradition of individual control, has directed attention toward the possibility that newspapers some day may become public-owned enterprises, operating in their field the same way as the United States Steel corporation or General Motors in theirs.

Among recent deaths of leading publishers and editors might be noted those of Victor Lawson of the Chicago Daily News, John C. Eastman of the Chicago Tribune, and Frank A. Munsey of the New York Sun and W. B. Nelson of the Kansas City Star.

And not far distant occurred the death of "Boss" Joseph P. Watson of Louisville Courier-Journal, the last of his school of great personal journalists and editors of a Pulitzer prize for his editorial "To Hell with the Hohenzollerns and the Hapsburgs," just before the world war.

Lawson's Experiment.

In the case of some of these newspaper heads, it appeared at one time that industrialization might be accomplished, but all ultimately reached the personal or limited control.

Mr. Lawson, with only a brother surviving, left the News to a bank as trustee, with authority to dispose of it as he saw fit. Several groups were reported to have bid for the paper, with failure of refusing to furnish public sale of stock and bond issues. That would have been the diversification of the industrialization. The bank, however, did not believe that would have met with the dead publisher's approval.

Eventually the paper was sold to Mr. A. Strong, the business manager, who had as his financial associates a group of wealthy businessmen, the result being in the background, inside a

fact from a newspaper which is alive and growing.

"It will be too much to expect that even newspapers long can escape the trend toward industrialization and the substitution of financial control for the personal management."

Banks Buy From Them.

"There are few if any authentic instances to start of newspapers surviving an attempt to industrialize them. Banks usually get rid of newspapers, either on liquidation or in a shift of time that there was a kind of property, in which some of the cherished rules of finance and industrial efficiency would be fatal, if applied to all departments."

"For a long time to come any institution attempting newspaper survival in the competition of its personally conducted contemporaries or even under the competition of newspapers founded by multi-millionaires. But on the other hand, the rate of publishing are becoming so vast that the other type of ownership and the financing of extending out of profits will become impossible. One day and inheritance laws militate against the perpetuity of personal fortunes large enough to carry such enterprises."

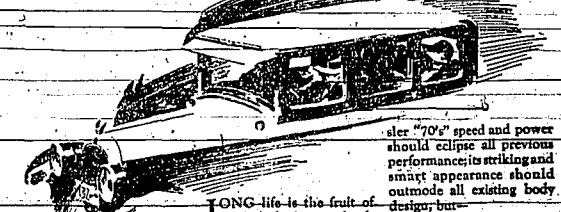

FRENCH PICK UP AMERICAN HABIT

Gum-Chewing Doughboy Is Held Responsible for Cultivating Taste for Product.

PARIS, Sept. 25. (AP)—The gum chewing American doughboy, as he is called, is the hero in the growing generation from St. Nazaire to the Rhine that an American company is building a new factory to meet the European demand for the favored article. It took some time for the tobacco shops to sell out the chewing gum sticks left by the American army in France, but the war was so successfully fostered by the popular that now every cigar store of consequence in Paris has a supply of American-made gum in airtight containers on their counters.

CHIARETTE TAX BUILDS UNIVERSITY BUILDINGS
PIERRE, S. D., Sept. 25. (AP)—Smoke from cigarettes may help to build air castles elsewhere had in South Dakota it provides actual, permanent buildings of stone and mortar.

CHICAGO LAYS PLANS FOR 'CITY BEAUTIFUL'

CHICAGO, Sept. 25. (AP)—Virtually every city in the land with a civic urge has a civic center planned or building.

Chicago, the sprawling midwestern metropolis, is no exception. Its civic center plan is linked with a city beautification movement, probably the most pronounced in the world.

Millions of dollars already have been expended in a beauty and utility program and the subject is now before the city council for an entire book devoted to it has been used in the schools here for years.

But while many features of the "Chicago plan" have been completed or are under way, the civic center is still a hazy dream of the future. In the original plan the civic center was planned about a huge open plaza west of the Chicago river, this center to be the focal point of all the related developments.

But while this civic center plan still looms in the office a new center of public and semi-public activity is building just west of the river. Chicago buildings usually associated with a civic center plan are now widely scattered. The combined city hall and county building, an imposing structure in the Roman style, is in the heart of the loop. The postoffice, which Chicago outgrew before it was finished, is a half mile away. The art institute is over on Michigan boulevard, and the new Field museum a mile distant in Grant park. The Cook county jail is beyond the north branch of the Chicago river.

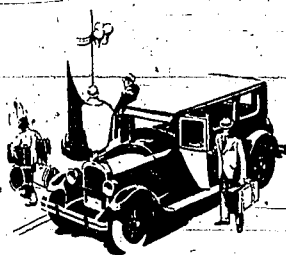

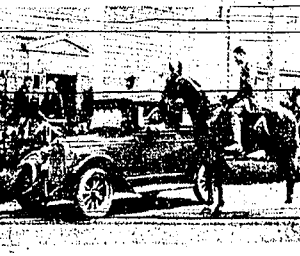
