MORE THAN 400
BOATS SUNK IN
RECENT STORM

Marine Unit of Citizens Committee at Miami Estimates Damage to Shipping Craft During Great Hurricane.

(By the Associated Press.) MIAMI, Florida, Sept. 28.—More than 400 craft were sunk or wrecked in the Miami area during the hurricane. The Marine unit of the citizens committee estimated today.

A survey of lifeline boats and the Miami river revealed that the loss of wrecks, exclusive of 200 other boats lying high and dry along the bay coast and in Royal Palm park. In the waters of the bay lie the remains of 56 craft, including three sloops, 20 barges, 20 yachts, two motor launches, one dredger, three lifeboats, one tug, one freighter, one schooner, two of which were full of cargo.

JOURNALS HITS VERA CRUZ.

VERA CRUZ, Sept. 28.—(AP)—Vera Cruz has been hit by a hurricane, the most devastating since 1888.

Several ships were sunk in the bay and the wind from Vera Cruz was partially wrecked.

With the great gale came heavy seas, which flooded the piers and drove out those living in that neighborhood, in fear of an inundation.

The hurricane raged for several hours but about midnight the wind began to fall and the storm swept onward.

The French delegation, however, maintained that expenditures for national defense should be reduced by 50 percent.

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FIND SKULL OF 'MISSING LINK'

Discovery Represents Earliest
Reach of Scientists' Into
Origin of Human Race.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28. (AP)—Interest and importance attached to the discovery near Peking in central China of a complete skull of the "Pithecanthropus Erectus" lies in the fact that it represents to scientists the farthest reach of the group known of which man is the only living representative, into an antiquity.

Scientists at the Smithsonian Institution, who were deeply interested in the reported discovery, explained today that Pithecanthropus lived approximately half a million years ago, was not man or a direct ancestor of man. They regarded him as a biological cousin of the human race, many degrees lower than any of the man-like ones of the present and frequently characterized as one of "nature's discarded experiments in making man."

CIRCUIT COURT REVERSES TEAPOT DOME DECISION

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Sept. 28. (AP)—The United States circuit court of appeals today reversed the decision of the circuit court of the district court at Cheyenne, Wyoming, upholding the Teapot Dome oil lease obtained by Harry F. Sinclair and associates from the government while Albert B. Fall was secretary of the interior.

The decision declared the Sinclair lease to have been fraudulent. The lower court is instructed to ask the Mammoth Oil company for an accounting of all oil and petroleum products taken from the government's naval oil reserve during its tenure.

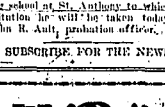
