## CHAMPION CLUBS READY FOR TEST IN BALL CLASSIC

Brilliant Contenders for World Title on Toes for Opening Contest; Promise of Fair Weather Encouraging.

(By the Associated Press.) NEW YORK, Oct. 1. (AP)—The New York Yankees and St. Louis Cardinals, leaders in two major leagues, tonight fought campaigns in major league history, came to grips tomorrow in the opening contest of their battle for baseball's world championship.

Seldom have two more brilliant or closely matched contenders faced each other in the season's climax and, if they have had a meeting as spectacular as this is waiting for this night's international event.

With fair weather promised, Yankee stadium, baseball's greatest amphitheater, is expected to hold a record-shattering crowd of close to 70,000 fans for the first net of the 1926 diamond drama. All reserve seat tickets for the event are sold, and an unprecedented rush of ticket buyers is anticipated early tomorrow morning for the gates leading to the unreserved sections of the stand, that accommodate some 35,000 spectators.

Speculators Reap Harvest. With the probable profit accrued by unusual influx of fans from all parts of the country, ticket speculators reaped a rich harvest with the supplies they were able to obtain. Prices were quoted as high as \$25 for single opening game seats and from \$50 to \$100 for three game seats covering the first, second and sixth contests scheduled here.

New York enthusiasm has been sharpened to an unusual degree, accentuated as the metropolitan scene has become a hand in the world's series, but the main determinants of excitement are anticipated in St. Louis, where the thrill of participation in the underdog chase for the first time will accompany the continuation of hostilities there on Tuesday.

Yanks Slight Favorites. The Yankees, starting the series on a familiar ground and before a home-town crowd, have been fettered a slight bit by their odds of being in the lead, most of the wagers reported to date, but among critical observers, the underdog is regarded as a toss-up.

Two outstanding stars of the rival contenders, Herb Pennock of the Yankees, and White Sheridan of the Cardinals are rated for the opening game, the distinctive pitching skill. Miller Huggins, dominating pilot of the Yankees, also showed his class.

Both teams have given up their respective home advantage in the decisive battle of attrition campaign that follows, but always possessing the winning punch at critical moments, they are placed upon the shoulders of one man, Bob O'Farrell, but his work throughout the present campaign has shown him a star of such magnitude that his manager singled him out as the team's most valuable performer.

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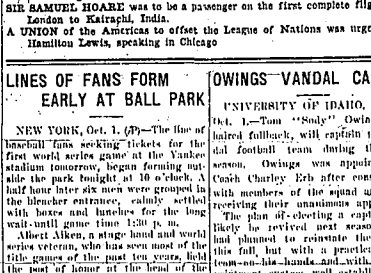

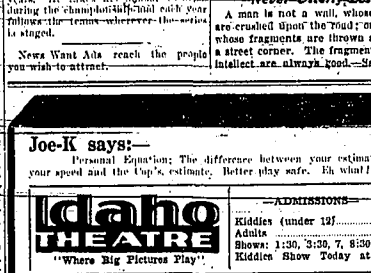

## ERB DISCLOSES VANDAL LINEUP

Idaho Mentor Makes Public Names of Players Likely to Start Against Montana.

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, Oct. 1. (AP)—The eve of the 1926 season opening, which will mark the first appearance of an Idaho eleven under his regime, head coach Charles Erb tonight made a tentative lineup giving Idaho fans their first authoritative information of the probable makeup of the team.

In four cases there is still considerable doubt as to which candidate for the position will receive the nod before the whistle at the first kick-off. Seven players, however, seem almost certain to take the field against the Bobcats at the opening of the game.

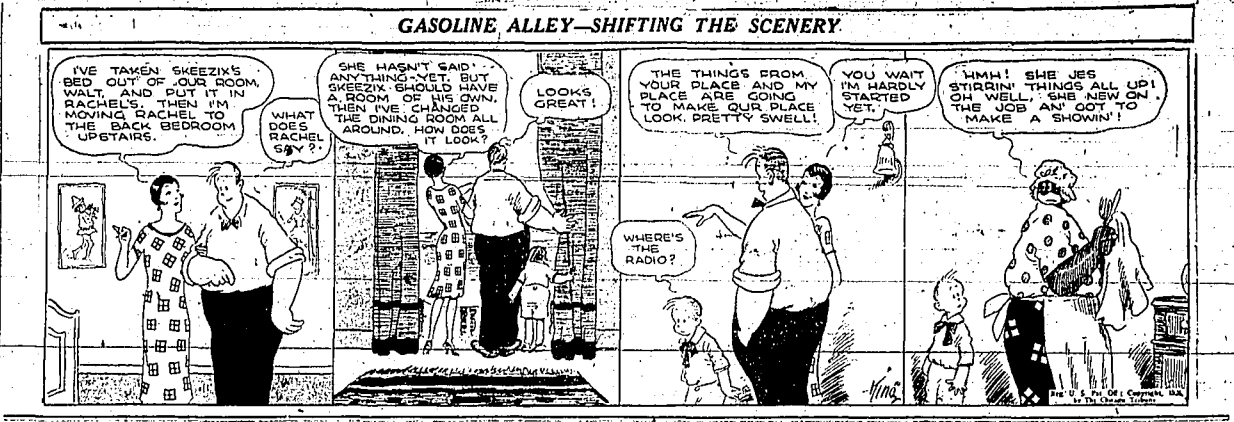

WHEAT RALLIES AFTER SETBACK

Early Decline in Price More Than Overcome in Late Trading; Market Closes Firm.

CHICAGO, Oct. 1. (AP)—Sharp rallies from an early decline took place in the wheat market today. Speculators bought on a liberal scale, influenced a good deal by reports that storms of late in Canada had caused a loss of as much as 50,000 bushels of wheat.

At first the market here was affected chiefly by indications of clearing weather in Canada and by consequent falling of the market for spreading up the movement and of wheat. What were taken as signs of a halt for the time being in view of the uncertainty that might be created also as a temporary rise in values, and so likewise did railroad advices that farmers would be unable to haul thousands of acres more wheat than last fall. After news from Canada did much, however, to alter prevailing trade sentiment.

Canadian Crop Damaged

According to news of the fall which went around, recent storm damage has been such that the Canadian wheat crop will have to be handled with great care, and will be a limited area in Saskatchewan. Enlargement of flour business at Minneapolis was also a factor which had a bearing on the movement of wheat and flour. Furthermore, reasons to purchase were found in news of rain in Argentina. Meanwhile weekly shipments of wheat and flour from North America were reported as totaling 1,000,000 bushels, as against only 900,000 bushels from all countries last week.

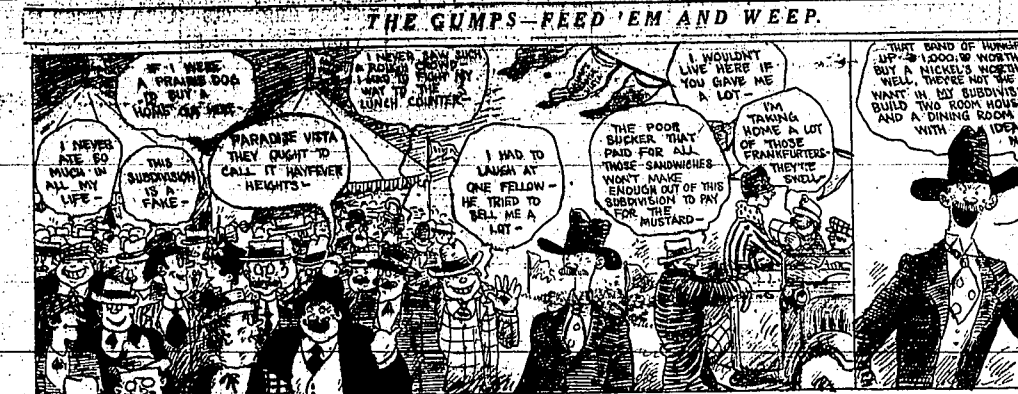
