SHORTER WORK DAY OBJECTIVE OF FEDERATION

National Labor Body to Launch Campaign for Change in Hours and Days Per Week; Convention Docket Clear.

(By the Associated Press.) DETROIT, Oct. 9. (AP)—Attacking with determination in an extensive three hour session, the American Federation of Labor today cleared its convention docket today of three important questions of policy.

It unanimously voted to launch a national campaign for the "progressive" shortening of hours of labor and the days per week; approved two constitutional amendments to augment the financial resources of the federation and associated with general unionists in the working world; and authorized with every intention to cap production resultant of advances in the mechanical arts.

Weeks Unchanged Into Industry. After the session adjourned, James O'Connell, president of the metal trades department, outlined a tentative program suggested by the executive council for the conduct of the campaign to organize the automobile industry. The organization of the campaign, approved by the convention Thursday.

A meeting of the principal craft unions in Detroit will be held in the direction of the executive council in Washington immediately after the November elections aimed at the purpose of organizing the workers in the automobile industry.

"Our plans in this undertaking," Mr. O'Connell said, "should be more fruitful than the outset than any similar campaign in the past. The appointment was made by President von Hindenburg, who accepted Heye's resignation of his post as chief of staff of the army.

OBSERVERS SEE CHANGE IN FORM OF GOVERNMENT

Colonel House Echoes Belief of Many Others Regarding Possibility of German Republic Reverting to Monarchy. (By the Associated Press.) NEW YORK, Oct. 9. (AP)—Colonel Edward M. House, floor adviser of President Wilson during the world war, thinks it is possible Germany may revert to a monarchism form of government, because of inefficiency in the present government methods of law-making of the Reich.

Will Answer Needs. "If Germany should revert to monarchy," it will come about from the work of stability of domestic affairs, and the need of continuity in foreign affairs. It might also come through unwise and inconsiderate treatments by France and the other allies.

Royal House Not Favored. "The only one of the Hohenzollerns who would seem to have any chance," he writes, "would be the son (Prince Wilhelm) of the former crown prince. He might be a possibility, but the one chosen would more likely be a prince of one of the smaller states. However, the recent reforms in Germany to determine whether the property of the royal families should be confiscated without compensation, it is fair judgment that the sentiment of the people is against the royal families."

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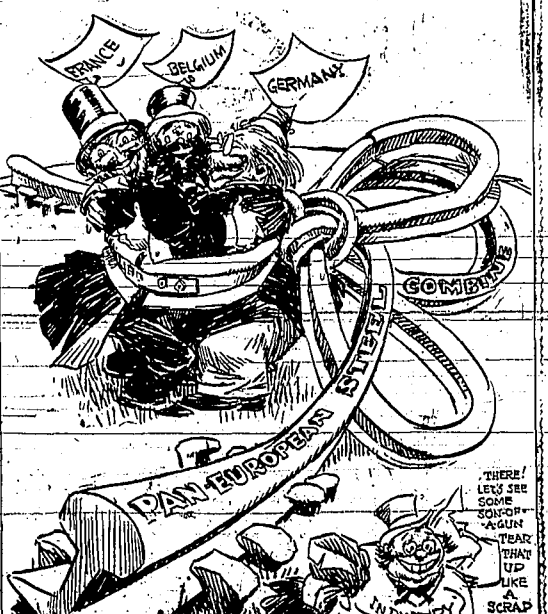

Mountain Marathon Tests Endurance of Red Men and White

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Oct. 9. (AP)—Physically bravest of the Hopi and Zuni Indians tribes will search their endurance with that of white men here tomorrow in the annual mountain marathon, one of the most unusual sporting events ever held.

The course will be over the new Cheyenne mountain highway from the toll gate to the summit, a distance of six and one quarter miles, with an average grade of 7 1/2 per cent that entails 250 acres and 500 steps. The start will be at an elevation of 4700 feet above sea level and the finish 9130 feet.

Six of the best runners from the two Indian tribes have been selected. The Indians have been training on the course for several weeks. Their competitors will be long distance runners who are prominent in the Rocky Mountain west. The event is open to all runners, but chief interest centers in the attempt of the red men to overtake their white brothers.

The mountain marathon is to be an annual event, sponsored by Seneca, Penna., Colorado Springs millinery and sportsman.

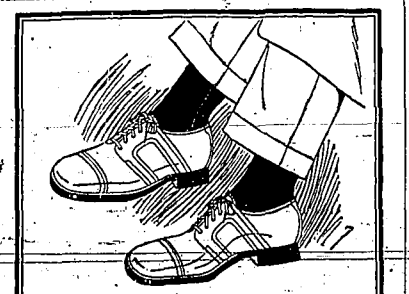

Government Purchases Oldroyd Collection, but Makes No Provision for Maintenance.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9. (AP)—The celebrated Oldroyd collection of Lincoln relics is now the property of the government, but just what will be done with it remains for congress to determine.

Assembled by Captain O. L. Oldroyd in the house where Lincoln died in Ford's theatre, the collection is regarded as one of the most comprehensive groups of Lincolniana in existence. It was purchased from Captain Oldroyd for \$50,000 under an act of congress.

Several suggestions for disposal of the collection are being considered. One is to leave it in the historic house, another is to place it in charge of the national museum.

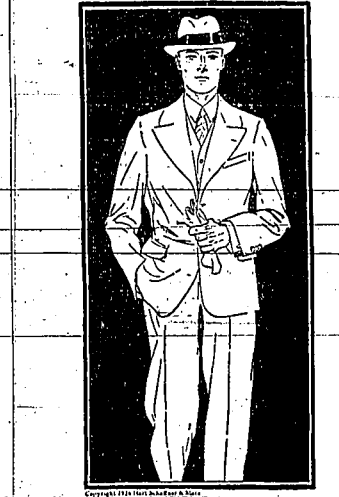

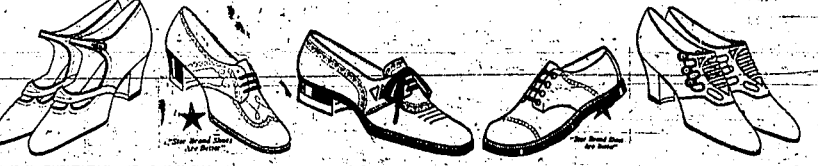

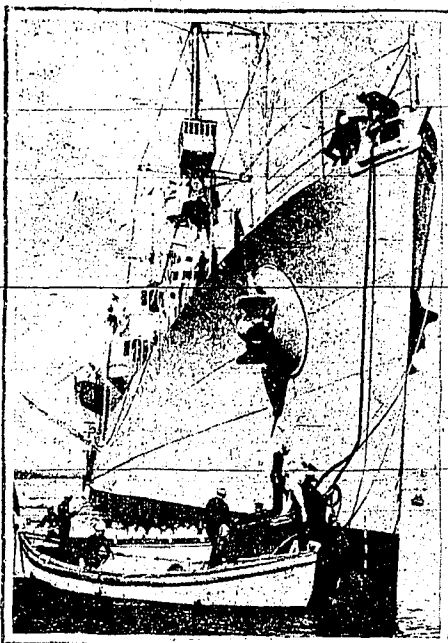

BABSON DECLARES PRESENT IS GOOD TIME TO DECREASE LOANS

Money Continues Easy and Banks Are Anxious to Loan, Says Statistical Authority; Advises People to Pay Off Indebtedness.

BABSON PARK, Mass., Oct. 9.—(Special to the News)—Roger W. Babson declares that the present situation is a good time to reduce loans. He says that the present situation is a good time to reduce loans. He says that the present situation is a good time to reduce loans.

Don't Borrow Now.
The present is a very good time to reduce loans. It is always a good time to take when in a period of prosperity as loans can be reduced with more ease during such a period than they can when money is tight. As in other things, there is a time when it is easy to reduce indebtedness and a time when it is hard to reduce indebtedness. The present is the time to get out of debt.

We are now passing through a period when it is easy to borrow money and the banks are anxious to loan. The temptation, therefore, is to expand and borrow more money. But easy money conditions cannot always last and when interest rates stiffen it is the hardest to pay up the old loans. Now, therefore, is the time to pay off existing money and get all loans paid up. Keep the mind fixed on the fact that the only safety is when it is easy to borrow and the time to increase indebtedness is when it is hard to borrow.

Pay Off Existing Notes.
Just how can we reduce indebtedness? The first thing to do is to get off all personal indebtedness. If you get all of my young friends to promise me that they will never endorse a note, I might be sure of the greatest thing that I could possibly do for these young people. They will never get anywhere by endorsing notes and it is certainly taking a terrible chance. We know that money will not always come easy and notes to be paid up when due. Therefore, my goal is of keeping out of trouble is to pay up all personal notes and determine never to endorse another. It is always easy to find some excuse for not paying on during a note. Therefore, unless you want to take the chance of being a heavy loser in the future you should get off all personal endorsements now while money is easy and when it will cause the least future trouble to the maker of the note. Hesitation may mean destruction later. About one in 10 years there comes a change to get off endorsements without hurting the other fellow. As this is the best means of getting off of them you should take the present opportunity to do so.

Collect All Possible.
The second thing to do is to get all that is owed to you, whether it be large or small sums. The present is a good time to collect all debts, for money came as easy as round as it will be for some time to come. Pay up by a note will now bring you to both sides of whom it is owed and to the man who owes because it eliminates the further financial obligation on the same. If, however, you leave the collection of it until you feel the need to do this, there will be a hard time to collect and disagreeable.

The third thing to do is to reduce personal indebtedness. This is the most satisfactory method of reducing personal indebtedness to pay it up. If, however, you cannot do this, there remains another method and this is by changing indebtedness from a personal indebtedness to a corporate

indebtedness. If you do this, you are through a corporation and the only way you had in the corporation, but if you are in business personally for yourself, and get into trouble you are apt to lose all you have.

Get Incorporated.
Twenty-five years ago it was the popular thing to incorporate your business. But it is thought that a man doing this was necessarily having trouble in his business affairs. Now there is no such ailment attached to incorporating. Today it is quite the popular thing to do and many small firms have done so. The point is that the banks are far more willing now to loan a personal endorser than they will be when the next period of depression comes. But we should remember that it is well to reduce corporate liabilities also and thus keep our business firms out of trouble.

In making these statements I am not necessarily holding up warnings or speaking for a pessimistic point of view, but I am speaking as a business statistician. My view of these things has been taken from many years of study of the subject and I feel quite strongly that all my statements will be found to be correct. This is a hard thing to say when it comes to the business of money. In a financial panic one person is about as confident of another as he would be in a sliding ship.

Prevent Your Turnover.
In reducing one's corporate liabilities it should be remembered that there are several methods of so doing. These methods are as follows:
(1) By getting in bills receivable and accounts receivable.
(2) By selling your capital and retiring interest bearing obligations. Now is the psychological time to do this successfully.
(3) By buying-inventory. It is surprising what every manufacturing concern could do in the way of getting rid of idle property.
(4) By increasing turnover and making your present capital do more work. This can be done by putting more money into the sale of one's goods.
(5) The number of turnovers each year differs, of course, in different lines of business, and in every line the turnover can be increased.

One of the greatest factors of the money situation of today is the great business which, just how much we cannot say, is entering into the money market. This money will very likely be a considerable factor in the next financial panic. The thing which everyone should do is to ref his bills and be in shape for the next when it hits.

Outlook for Money Rates.
Usually there is a strengthening of rates each fall and this fall need not be an exception. The money needed to move the crop always causes some tightness in rates. With a slightly smaller crop than usual this year, there should not be any radical increase in money rates. Therefore, the wiser bankers are looking forward to merely normal fall and winter rates. 2200 Enrolled at Idaho University

Figures Announced at End of First Week Show 1760 in Regular College Courses.

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, Oct. 9.—At the end of the first week of instruction for the fall semester, the University of Idaho had enrolled under 2200 students, according to figures announced by the registrar's office. Approximately 1760 are in regular college courses leading to a degree, and 440 were enrolled in the university summer sessions at Moscow, Idaho, and the remainder are students in correspondence and special music courses.

Present figures indicate a registration of more than 2000 for the current year in regular college courses, and a total enrollment for the year of more than 2200. Students are still registering daily in the various colleges, and the short courses in agriculture open on October 25.

The college of letters and science has by far the heaviest enrollment with its total of 612 students. The school of education comes next with 338 students. The largest gain in enrollment, however, was registered in the college of agriculture, which has 195 students, 35 of them freshmen.

The total enrollment was divided among the schools and colleges on September 25 as follows: College of letters and science, 612; college of agriculture, 195; school of education, 338; college of engineering, 108; college of law, 32; school of mines, 28; school of forestry, 88; school of business, 235. Twenty-six students are registered in special music courses and 113 are taking work by correspondence. The Missions summer session enrolled 217 and the Boise branch 90 students. This gives a grand total registration of 2180 students.

So hazardous do most production officials consider the task of selecting the subject matter of photoplays, that no one person is given exclusive responsibility. Opinions of a number of minds are desired.

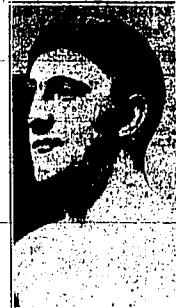
A novel for Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer, for example, is suggested to or recommended by a studio executive. It is then passed upon by Marion France, head of the scenario department, who in turn assigns it to one of her readers for further judgment.

Thereafter the novel is synopsis and commented upon by two or more readers and returned to the executive, who decides from their reports whether it contains picture material.

If the reports are favorable, the novel is purchased and assigned to a writer for adaptation. "This means that the most important and dramatic situations are enlarged upon and the unimportant details—those that cannot be shown on the screen—are deleted. Sometimes as many as four writers make adaptations or "straighten up" the same novel before one is found satisfactory.

TOKYO, Oct. 9. (AP)—All the fruits and vegetables for the dining tables of the Emperor and Empress, Prince Regent and Princess Nagako, are grown in the Shikoku Palace gardens by expert gardeners and carefully inspected in order that no plant may be permitted to reach the Imperial stomachs.

The gardens occupy several acres and include a number of large hot-houses. All varieties of vegetables are raised during the entire year. When the royal family is away on vacation, these special vegetables and hot-house flowers are sent to them daily in ice-packed private cars.

Frozen Algae

It seems a shocking thing to freeze fish alive to keep them fresh for the market at their journey's end, but it has been found that freshly impaled frozen fish are just as lively as before, and show no sign of injury or illness.

It was noticed that fish in Siberian rivers that are frozen solid in winter came out all right in the spring, and this gave the idea for experiments which have been going on for some time. The system is now being adopted in America as a regular thing.

The fish are put in a tub into which oxygen is forced, and after being kept three days just above freezing point they are frozen, and the blocks of frozen fish are wrapped up in strips of the fish, are wrapped up and put to cold storage.

PLAN OFFENSIVE AGAINST WORMS

Relentless Advance of European Corn Borer Moves Agricultural Leaders to Action.

CHICAGO, Oct. 9. (AP)—An army of worms moving relentlessly west and leaving in its wake devastated vegetation has aroused agricultural leaders in the country, and first defense lines have been formed.

The European corn borer, which lives through the winter in a dormant state, corn ears and other crop remains after falling through the ground during the summer, was the cause of a conference here of the international corn borer committee. Plans for financing a fight against the borer and closer cooperation between state and government agencies were arranged.

Makes Rapid Advance.

Advancing at the rate of about 25 miles a year toward Indiana, Illinois and other big corn producing states, the borer has covered parts of Ohio, Michigan, New York, Pennsylvania and the New England states.

The committee was headed at the recent international corn borer conference at Detroit by officials of the loss of the conference, one of its aims is to arouse the people of the country to the dangers of the pest, one of the greatest which ever faced American agriculture.

To Ask Appropriation.

An appropriation of \$2,000,000 is to be asked of the federal government and it is expected \$10,000,000 more will be obtained from individual states.

Members of the special committee which will sponsor legislation are: T. L. Christie of Indiana, C. V. Truesdell of Ohio, C. E. Morgan of New York, C. W. Williams of Pennsylvania, A. Z. Carter of Michigan and H. B. Curtis of Iowa.

One of the plans discussed by the committee for eradication of the borer was establishing of a 50-mile belt around the infested area. By concentrating on this belt it is hoped that the borer may be exterminated.

SKYSCRAPER HEIGHTS NOW CHANGING DAILY

NEW YORK, Oct. 9. (AP)—With the skyscrapers of each year being laid in the shadows of the taller ones erected in the next, the designer who wishes to plan a distinctive building no longer can rely upon superior height alone.

Most of the cities of the United States are seeing the "taller, taller" type of skyscraper, one after the other, as the result of a construction trend which has been gaining momentum for several years.

In the past, especially in the early part of the century, the erection of a building taller than any of its neighbors, at taller than any other in the

same town, was a guarantee that it would stand out prominently for a considerable time.

In New York city, several buildings, successively acquiring the title of "tallest," held it long enough to gain national reputation. The American Surety building, one of the first downtown skyscrapers, was followed by the Equitable building and then by the Singer building. The title of "world's tallest" was then captured by the Woolworth, which held it unchallenged until the planning of the 81 story United Nations building in Detroit.

Most of the cities of America today are witnessing similar processes of "outstripping." In Cleveland, the new Union Terminal tower will rise 71 feet, considerably higher than the previous tallest buildings, except the Woolworth building.

Reveal Itinerary Of Royal Visitor To United States

Queen Marie of Rumania Faces Strenuous Program Upon Her Arrival in New York; Mayor Walker to Welcome.

PARIS, Oct. 9. (AP)—The first week of Queen Marie's visit to the United States will be a strenuous one, it was revealed by a detailed itinerary made public Friday night.

Immediately after landing in New York the queen will go to the city hall where she will be welcomed by Mayor Walker, proceeding to Washington on the same day.

On the following day, October 19, she will visit the main of the Lincoln Soldier at Arlington, where will go to Mount Vernon, dining at the White House as a guest of President Coolidge that evening.

On October 20 she will go to Annapolis in the early morning, will have lunch in Baltimore and will leave for New York at 4 o'clock in the afternoon. That evening she will dine as a guest of William Nelson Cromwell, member of the organization, "The Friends of Rumania."

At noon on the 21st she will attend a luncheon given by the New York chamber of commerce and will then go to Philadelphia where she will visit the Sesqui-centennial exposition. That same night she will return to New York. On the 22nd the queen will dine at the home of Elbert Gary.

The Rumanian consul general will entertain the queen at luncheon on October 23, and the Sultan's justice will hold a dinner in her honor on the same day.

The 24th and 25th will be devoted to rest in preparation for her sailing in the west which will carry her to Pacific coast and return. The details of this latter trip have not yet been settled.

ORDER PRESIDENTIAL SALUTE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9. (AP)—A military touch will be given the arrival in this country of Queen Marie of Rumania, the war department having ordered Major General Charles D. Sumner, commanding the second corps area at New York, to join the official welcoming committee at quarantine and accompany the royal visitor to the train for Washington.

Part of the vicinity of New York harbor have been ordered to fire the presidential salute of 21 guns when the queen arrives, while Lieutenant Colonel Arthur Pullon, first United States Cavalry, and Rear Admiral Alexander Long have been detailed as military and naval aides to the party.

Yellow Fever Halted Revolution in 1793

John Adams wrote Thomas Jefferson that only the yellow fever in Philadelphia saved the nation from a revolution in 1793. Ten thousand people in the streets of Philadelphia after day threatened to drag Washington from his house. The coolest and finest mind, even among the Quakers of Philadelphia, have given their opinion that nothing but yellow fever could have saved the United States.

Philadelphia was the capital when that riot surged through Market street, ready to rend President Washington and Vice President Adams.

The very last sentence in any letter of a long correspondence between Adams and Jefferson was this penned by the former about two months before that Fourth of July, 1793, when both died:

"Our American civility is the worst in the world—it has no laws, no grounds, no definitions."—Detroit News.

WOOL MARKET FULLY SUSTAINED; DEALERS ARE STARTING TO BUY

BOSTON, Oct. 9. (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin said today:

The wool market has been fully sustained during the past week on the level of values recorded the week before and the tendency of prices is against the buyer. It is more distinctly a seller's market today than at any time for a year. Even the top makers have at length got into position to demand slightly more for their tops. Dealers, who have hitherto been busy selling wool, are now commencing to buy wool one more in the west.

The foreign markets are distinctly strong, as shown by the closing in London earlier in the week. The foreign primary markets are all steady.

Of chief interest to the local trade, of course, is the admittedly improved position in the goods market. The lamb-to-mouth buying of the past few days has had its logical result in reducing stocks to the minimum and even the laudist proponents of "buy only

what you need" have evidently found their heads very comfortable.

Merino is in a strong position, with prices fully maintained at the advance of a week ago.

The rail and water shipments of wool from Boston, according to the most authoritative figures, were 152,030,000 pounds against 135,261,000 pounds for the same period last year. The receipts from January 1, 1925, to October 7, 1926, inclusive, were 293,250,757 pounds against 236,684,700 pounds for the same period last year.
