FIRST STUDEBAKER IS SHIPPED TO LIBERIA

HARVEY FIRESTONE, Jr., son of the rubber magnate and director of the \$100,000,000 Liberia rubber plantation of the Firestone Tire and Rubber company, has purchased a new automobile, a Studebaker Big Six custom brougham.

Mr. Firestone had not even seen one of the Studebaker custom cars when he "signed on the dotted line," but, according to the manufacturer, he was thoroughly acquainted with the characteristic performance and standing and so, just before leaving for Liberia he ordered the brougham by telephone from Akron, specifying delivery at the plantation.

Every effort was made to hasten delivery on Mr. Firestone's car so that it might be waiting for him when he arrived. Three days after receipt of the order, the car was shipped to Liverpool, England, and cleared for Liberia.

Incidentally, Mr. Firestone's car will probably be the first of the Studebaker custom line to be seen in this little-known corner of the world.



DEMOCRACY

In the general questioning of all accepted beliefs and traditions which now seems to be agitating the public mind, democracy is coming in for a fair share of investigation. Is democracy work? Can it be made to work? Isn't a dictatorship really more efficient? No matter what we call our government, is it not an oligarchy which really rules?

William Frank, whose fore-father liberalism is favorably known in many, returned from Europe saying that men in many lands are seriously questioning the power of democracy for good,

Dre-Witt-Hamilton, author of the Survey of Philosophy, pleads in the interest of Harper's for definite training for government of young people as inclined as doctors are trained for medicine, lawyers for law. He says, "we've got to publicize more than we have done, thoroughly as men prepare for fat less tasks—that morally democratic is a failure, and it might be better for the world if America had never hired and deceived the hopes of men."

It is plain to every person who observes in any degree the class work of our political machinery, the futility of most of our efforts, the government, that the critics of democracy are right. It is not, so far, succeeding according to the great hope it has so long inspired."

But after an evening over any head dealing with the history of the past few thousand years, in any vital or picturesque manner, one accepts a different point of view.

"You, my countrymen, I say, but would we, any of us, voluntarily exchange our claim to the so-called Human Efficiency, if with it we had to take Ruth's intolerance and cruelty? Perhaps a great ruler here and there has given more encouragement to art and handicrafts in one reign than democracy in centuries. But would we exchange our slow cultural growth for medieval tortures? The glories that man's race was built upon a foundation of slavery, whose "inside story" people of today would allow no newspaper to print."

We make mistakes. We are stupid. True, all true. But we move. We stumble through. And ever more, show dragging though it be, is in the direction of greater comfort and growth for humanity as a whole.

When these criticisms are made upon democracy one is sometimes led to wonder if it is not democracy itself that brings them to pass. Is it not the higher level of education, the greater sense of leisure which permits, for a moment only, the straightening of the back and the lifting of the head—just as, in a word, the higher standards which through democracy we have required, that make us sensitive to clearly own democracy and demand of it so much more than it had already given?

SHOOTING TO KILL

The commissioning of police in Detroit is hastening on, better police, membership among men and a more aggressive policy towards criminals.

A criminal who is killed will never give us any more trouble," he says.

"Our 'judgments' have killed 31 men since the first of the year. That isn't bad enough. If the 63 who were wounded had also been killed it would have been 64," he adds.

These shooting incidents, the police say, got their start, during some of the last hard-boiled periods, when men refused to talk when ordered.

Shooting to kill was the proper procedure under the circumstances. Criminals have killed six policemen since the first of the year. They show no quarter and we should show them none."

Good marksmanship is desirable, too, many innocent bystanders have been killed by the poor shooting of

policemen. Killing a dangerous criminal in a fight in a hot attempt to escape is all right. But shooting out mere suspicion is another matter. A man who fails to hold when ordered to do so may be deaf, or may not understand, or may be a respectable citizen who, because of no wrong doing, deserves a blind order.

Shooting to kill, whether official or unofficial, is a thing to be indulged in with discrimination. And police are not also judges and juries.



BABSON DECLARES PRESENT IS GOOD TIME TO DECREASE LOANS

Money Continues Easy and Banks Are Anxious to Loan, Says Statistical Authority, Advises People to Pay Off Indebtedness.

TANSON PARK, Mo., Oct. 9.—(Special to The News)—Floyd W. Babson, deceased today the money authority, thinks that the present rate will continue to decline, but, in view thereof, he gives some very timely advice. His complete statement is as follows:

"Don't Borrow More."

"The present is a very good time to reduce loans. This is always a good step to take when in a period of pecuniary or loans can be reduced with much more ease during such periods than at other times. Money is tight. As in other things, there is a time when it is easy to reduce indebtedness and a time when it is hard to reduce indebtedness. The present is the time to get rid of debts."

"We are now passing through a period when it is easy to borrow money and the banks are anxious to loan. The temptation, therefore, to expand and borrow more money than you can afford cannot always last and when interest rates stiffen it will be hard to pay up the old loans. Now, therefore, is the time to get rid of your debts and get all loans paid off. Keep in mind that the time to reduce indebtedness is when it is easy to borrow and the time to increase indebtedness is when it is hard to borrow."

—*Editorial Note.*

"First, how can we reduce indebtedness? The first thing to do is to get off all personal indebtedness. If I could get all of my young friends to promise not to buy a car until they have saved enough to buy it, this would be one of the greatest things that I could possibly do for these young people. One will never get away when you endeavor notes and it is certainly better to have a note than to know that money will not always come easy and notes may be paid up when due. Therefore, one good way of getting out of trouble is to pay up what you owe and then do what you have to undo another."


"It is always easy to find some excuse so you can avoid considering a note. Therefore, unless you want to take the chance of being sued, you should not make any notes of all personal indebtedness now while money is easy and when it will cause the legal embarrassment to the maker of the note. Heation has now made it possible to get a home in 10 years there comes a chance to pay off indebtedness without hurting the other fellow. As this is the gentlemanly way of getting out of them you should take the present opportunity of doing so."

Collect All Pastdue.

"The second thing to do is to get all that is owing to you, whether it is large or small sums. This presents a good opportunity to collect for notes which have been long outstanding. If you have a financial obligation on the same, if, however, you leave the collection of it until you need the money, it will then be hard to collect and be both difficult and discreditable."

"The third thing to do is to reduce personal indebtedness. The quickest and most satisfactory method of reducing personal indebtedness is to pay off all notes you cannot do this, then remains another method and this is by changing indebtedness from a personal indebtedness to a corporate

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, Oct. 9.—At the end of the first week in session for the fall semester, the University of Idaho had enrolled nearly 2,200 students, according to figures announced by the registrar's office. Applications for admission were received in regular college courses leading to a degree; 300 were enrolled in the university summer sessions at Moscow, and Boise, and the remainder are students in correspondence and special studies.

Present figures indicate a registration of more than 2,000 for the current year in regular college classes, and a total enrollment of more than 2,200, more than 2,000. Students are still registering daily in the various colleges, and the short courses in agriculture open on October 21.

The number of letters and telegrams has by far the heaviest enrollment with a total of 111 students. The school of education comes next with 338 students. The largest number in enrollment, however, is reported in the college of agriculture, which has 300 students, 35 of them freshmen.





WHEAT VALUES MOVE UPWARD

Chicago Market Closes Unsettled to Slightly Higher After Day of Light Trading.

CHICAGO, Oct. 9.—(UPI)—With the government crop report due Monday and with weekend evening up of amounts in progress, the wheat market was unshaken, little change taking place. The wheat market was light, however, and the market easily influenced buying orders appearing in the locals whereas there were interest offers in the futures. Weather conditions in Canada were favorable and farm deliveries there are expected to continue on a liberal basis.

Wheat closed unsettled at the same market's level until the higher corn 18 1/2 cents, the oats 10 1/2 cents and provisions varying from 10 cents to an equal advance.

At first the wheat market reacted favorably to the latest daily data showing a large amount available for grain carrying and by lack of any large export buying of North American wheat. A number of grain stocks were held in the market, however, in this connection as significant, the total having reached 2,000,000 bushels.

With only a few longs holding and with foreign demand small, no relief for futures congestion next week was in prospect.

Prices Rally Later.

Price rallied, however, in the wheat trading market, with the market's reaction to the foreign buying of grain stocks very general, reflecting their position, notwithstanding the Canadian weather conditions were favorable on the whole and that farm deliveries in Canada expect to continue the era.

Frieds of higher prices for wheat held strong on assertions that regardless of high prices, the market must be more dependent on North American wheat until the south hemisphere is ready to ship more freely and that even then the Transatlantic importers may prefer to continue the era.

Improved weather made corn an out-and-away, and May crop established another new low price record for the season.

In line with cotton, the provided market was steady, the value declines very virtually ignored.

PLAN OFFENSIVE AGAINST WORMS

Relentless Advance of European Corn Borer Moves Agricultural Leaders to Action.

CHICAGO, Oct. 9. (AP)—An army of worms moving relentlessly west and leaving in its wake devastated vegetation and hundreds of agricultural leaders of the country and first defense lines have been formed.

The European corn borer, which lives through the winter months in the state of Ohio and moves rapidly eastward, having started here during the summer, was the cause of a conference here of the international corn borer committee. Plans for financing a fight against the insect, whose chief competitor between state and government agents were arranged.

Makes Rapid Advance.

SKYSCRAPER HEIGHTS NOW CHANGING DAILY

NEW YORK, Oct. 9. (AP)—With the exception of each year being held in the shadow of the taller ones erected in the next, the designer who wished to plan a distinctive building had better not rely upon superior height alone.

Most of the cities of the United States are seeing their "tallest" buildings reigned in after the first, in which has been gaining momentum for several years.

In the past, especially in the early part of the century, the erection of a building taller than any of its neighbors, or taller than any other in the

same town, was a guarantee that it would stand prominently for a considerable time.

In New York city, several buildings are successfully acquiring the title of "tallest," and long enough to gain national reputation. The 102-story skyscraper, one of the first downtown skyscrapers, was followed by the Flatiron building, and then by the Woolworth building, which held its undisputed position in the trade until the new Rock Tower in Detroit.

Most of the cities of America today are showing signs of a desire to "overtop." In Cleveland, the new Union Terminal tower will rise 711 feet, considerably higher than the previously tallest buildings, except the Wadsworth building.

On the following day, October 10, she will visit the tomb of the Unknown Soldier. After this she will go to Mount Vernon, dining at the White House as a guest of President Coolidge that evening.

On October 20 she will go to Annapolis in the early morning, will have lunch in Baltimore, and then leave for New York at 4 o'clock in the afternoon. That evening, she will dine as a guest of William Nelson Cromwell, member of the organization, "Friends of Bolton."

At noon on the 21st she will attend a luncheon given by the New York Chamber of Commerce and will then go to Philadelphia where she will visit the Sesquicentennial exposition. That same night she will return to New York, at which time the queen will dine at the home of Elbert Hubbard.

The Rumanian consul general will entertain the queen at luncheon on the 22d, and the Salvage institution will hold a dinner in her honor on the same day.

"The 24th and 25th will be devoted to rest in preparation for her swing to the west which will carry her to Pacific coast and return. The details
