Dead Man Entitled To Name Assumed

Circumstances surrounding the name of Ed Bademacher, who died suddenly of heart failure at the Waverly hotel during the evening of October 7, were revealed in a letter received Tuesday from Mrs. E. E. Time of 821 Lake, by J. J. Grossman, Twin Falls county coroner. Bademacher was the name thought to have been assumed by the principal in the hotel tragedy who was believed by friends to be Ed Thompson.

Mrs. Time's letter reveals the fact that Bademacher is the name of the father of the deceased who adopted him shortly after the death of his mother. The man's father, E. O. Thompson, is thought to reside in London, Scotland, but a reply from that point in answer to dispatch announcing the death has not yet been received.

A letter was received from Mrs. Time after she had in an account of the death in a Salt Lake newspaper.

Republican Rally To Open Campaign

J. Adam Bede, former congressman from Minnesota, and Governor C. C. Moore of Idaho will be speakers at a republican rally in Parisi hall here Saturday evening that will mark the formal opening of the republican campaign in Twin Falls county. It was announced Tuesday by John W. Grassman, chairman of the republican county central committee.

Mr. Bede is a noted speaker and writer, and has signed numerous editorials that have had wide circulation. He will discuss on this occasion the national issues involved in the campaign.

Governor Moore, who is running out his second term as Idaho's chief executive, will speak on state issues.

Basque Herder Is Heir to Fortune

Manuel Guiericholabarria, veteran sheep herder of Idaho, was awarded property valued conservatively at \$100,000, for many years of faithfulness by Frank A. Triguero, a local employer a few days before the latter gave up the struggle for life at the Twin Falls county general hospital the evening of October 7. Triguero, for 40 years, a prominent shepherd of southern Idaho, arranged through a list of safe, assignment and deed that his Basque friend should fall heir to an estate that lifts him from the ranks of poverty to a life of ease.

Guiericholabarria has been the owner of 2100 head of sheep; 500 acres of fertile land; 20,000 pounds of wool; 22 head of horses and mules and 17 head of cattle.

Triguero three years ago is reported to have willed his estate to the Catholic church of which he was a member for many years.

The deceased is survived by two brothers and one sister in California and one sister in Arizona. No mention of those was made by the executor, who was in his late 60s, of the disposal of his property at the time of his demise.

Mercury Sinks to 26 Degrees Here

Forecast for today—Generally cloudy. Probably rain in northern portion.

Minimum temperature here in Twin Falls during a day that preceded six a'clock Tuesday evening was 26 degrees, or the same as was registered here October 8 and 9. Maximum Tuesday was 66 degrees, the highest recorded here since last Saturday, when the mercury climbed to 78.

Shad L. Hudgins, former Twin Falls mayor, in the principal address of the evening, discussed the story of American government and constitutional rights. Other speakers included Grand Knight J. Leaky, Deputy Grand Knight John Koonin, Rev. Father Don S. Keyzer, Albert Knafel and Mrs. Smith, president of the Catholic Women's League. The musical program included a vocal solo by Mrs. H. St. Maguire with accompaniment played by Mrs. Sturgeon McGee, and a violin and piano duet by little daughters of Mrs. and Mr. C. A. Swearingen.

Speakers were introduced by Harry Hudgins, who presided over the meeting.

Freight Cars Leave Rails at Murtaugh

MURTAUGH, Oct. 12.—(Special to The News.)—Oregon Short Line trains at Murtaugh today passed over switch tracks, the main track having been blocked here for several days by the arrival of four cars of a westbound freight train of more than 10 cars. Unloading of the freight train was completed here yesterday by the arrival of the four cars at the end of the freight train. One of the freight cars was loaded with sheep, one with salt and another with automobiles.

One of the carloads of sheep was unloaded by the train crew, and the carload of salt was transferred to another car on the tracks. A special crew arrived early this afternoon from Pocatello to assist in the work of removing the freight cars from the tracks.


