

EDICT HAMMERS WEDDING FEAST

Newly-Weds of France Up in Arms Against Rule Limiting Meals to Two Dishes.

PARIS, Oct. 16 (AP)— Newlyweds are up in arms against the recent edict forbidding restaurant meals in two dishes, since a restaurant has been the essential part of most French celebration weddings. It generally costs about \$250 for a wedding reception. The new edict limits it to two courses.





BABSON POINTS OUT ECONOMIC LESSONS TO BE LEARNED FROM RECENT DISASTER IN FLORIDA

Noted Statistician Still Optimistic Over Outlook in South, but Issues Warning to Other States; Predicts Good Business for Future.

JAMES H. BABSON, Mason City, Iowa, Director of the Florida Hurricane, Roger W. Babson, has said his opinion on the situation. At that time he refused to make a general prediction, preferring to let each state decide for itself, in believing that sufficient facts are now available, he today states as follows:

Laws and Property.

"The latest statistics available indicate that there were about 1,000 houses destroyed last year in America and 1,200 houses lost in Florida. Of course, this is a terrible event from the standpoint of the individual home owner. Yet, it is a good omen for the future. In the mother city comes many more deaths than hurricanes caused, while a more extensive epidemic will tend to times as many people to the hospital. It is the dependability of the doctor, not the seriousness which will tell us all such a shock."

"The property damage is probably most striking. This amount indicates that the losses have been so great that which should never have been started. Although the shrinkage value of buildings is high, the dollar value of office space in the stock market in the course of a few weeks or even a few days, the real loss is to the immediate prestige of Miami, which may now be considered to be a dead city. Any additions to the capital of America, we say, however, that the ultimate future of Miami is very bright."

Florida Business Outlook. "I have been in the wholesale and retail trade in Florida during the coming winter. It will give the state a chance to use up the large surplus of building materials and other things which were left over from the hurricane. The losses will be great."

"Furthermore, I see no reason why the tourist trade will not increase and the tourist should be injured, and it may even be more increased, on account of the hurricane. Railroads, which had been planning a quiet season, and now are on the road, are doing both as to freight and to passengers. Not only should the tourist business be very heavy to Miami on account of the cold winter forecasted, but most likely owners of their vacation property have lost their vacation property has been affected by the hurricane."



**Pankhurst Family
Remarkable Trio**

Mother and Daughters Sit at Same Tea Table, but Aims and Ideals Are Far Apart.

LONDON, Oct. 16 (UPI)—Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst and her two daughters have been given the title of the world's most remarkably family trio. Mother and daughters all sit down at the same tea table, now and then, their interests in life, and their aims and ideals are so different, and their methods of bringing about their respective reforms designed to regenerate society, are as far apart as the poles.

Banned at Table

But they never discuss politics or religion over the tea cups.

Mrs. Pankhurst, long known as the militant suffrage leader, has taken up the cause of the communists, while her daughter Sylvia goes no more than half-baked than ever, attacking the teachings of Lenin.

Mrs. Christabel, the eldest of the two girls, is intensely interested in right-wing, patriotic policies.

Mother After Votes

Mrs. Pankhurst herself has joined the conservative party and for weeks has been addressing meetings in her old church in north British townships, and is continuing to do all the work. As one who did her share in the effort to win the right of suffrage for women, she is now "content" to defend what she has helped to bring about, leaving her citizenship in order to defeat the "idle machinations" of the revolutionaries.

Christabel's Religion

While Mrs. Pankhurst is now trying youth and seeking to save society by political propaganda, Christabel has soared into the atmosphere of religious prophecy.

Mrs. Christabel is preparing to start a new home in London, and the

proceeds under the auspices of the second advent movement. Miss Pankhurst will tell her audience that she sees nothing about communism, socialism, or political democracy which can be beaten by the second coming of Christ, which she sees to be at hand. She notes the signs in war and times of wars, earthquakes, and the like, as wise prophecy, but these things must be left to the Divine plan, she feels.

Soviet Precision Boatmen

Mrs. Sylvia has no use for the socialist program, but is a personal agent in her scheme for saving the world. She has separated herself from her mother and sister and allied herself with the Soviet precision boatmen. She is personal agent in Leningrad and Moscow. She considers Soviet rule is accomplishing all the reforms needed for the regeneration of society.

With her son, her living is an artist, she helps to spread the tends of her faith. Her movements are "swirl in mystery." Her old friends of the days when she edited "The Worker's Dreamer," in "Pict" street, know her no longer.

Aged and Destitute**

"Mother" Woods, Who Carried News of Alaskan Strike, Now Books Work as Washwoman.

GOLDTON, Calif., Oct. 16 (UPI)—"Mother" Woods, who carried the news across Alaska that a great gold strike had been made on the spot which soon became Nome, wants to take in washings so that she may eat.

Mrs. E. W. Chase, "Mother" Woods' daughter, left Nome last year with \$5,000 in her money belt. Adversity began with the loss of her fortune and was followed by the disappearance of her husband after an automobile accident.

Nome's First White Woman

Young Rex Beach, author and poet, died in Nome last month during the gold rush days. Mrs. Chase declares she runs as a great a washing as anyone in spite of her 70 years. She says she was the first white woman to settle in Nome and that she was "All Black" to Rex Beach's "The Squiller."

Mrs. Chase heard and believed the North in 1899 and lived in Alaska 20 years with only infrequent visits to the outside world. Mrs. Chase, born in Ireland in 1869, became known over all Alaska as "Mother" Woods, friend of the gold-diggers. She was while carrying letters to newspapermen, when she burst into the gold-diggers in the In-

terior that she spread the news from Mitchell to Dawson that gold had been struck on the Bering Strait coast.

Lost His Fortune

Two years ago, with money made and saved before the "Mother" Woods days, he started his life again, seemingly free from them. Mr. and Mrs. Chase left Alaska to make their home in Nevada. But the gold gained from the cold hills and sand of rushing streams was not enough to keep him away in the south, and fortune vanished.

Mrs. Chase came home in quest of a living. She placed a modest advertisement in a newspaper, asking for passage to do her small home on the outskirts of town.
