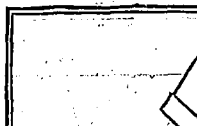

Last year's two state titles—first because Kellogg from the north and Pfler from south Idaho tied in the championship game at Kellogg, 6 to 6—have been definitely eliminated in the 1926 race as a result of games last week-end at October 8 and 9. Kellogg received a terrific beating from St. Maries 49 to 0, while the Pfler eleven fell before Twin Falls 27 to 0. These scores are definite enough to put the former champions out.

The two eleven which put these teams out of the race must be figured among the real contenders in the north and south districts.—Twin Falls showed a bit of power at the opening of the season in a 13 to 0 victory over Shoshone and a 0 to 0 win over the Allain normal. St. Maries played the strong club before meeting Kellogg, but meets another this week in Lewiston. If the Loggers get by Lewiston they may be considered the pick of the north, except for Cougar d'Alon. The lake city eleven has been overwhelmed in the north by the Loggers, but they 7 to 0 win over Moscow on October 9, and a 15 to 0 victory over Bonanza Peep the week before they met them in the twilight of potential champions. As far as the north is concerned it looks as if the bite has between St. Maries and Cougar d'Alon, with Lewiston a possibility. Lake Brown's Bonanza took a 10 to 0 beating at the hands of Spokane last week and will have to improve to make a showing against St. Maries.

Ten other teams head for Twin Falls in the south. Burley has the strongest aggregation in the southwest and Pocatello is the potential threat in the southwest. Pocatello took the leading eleven down the line in one fashion last week, 23 to 0, showing the same power or line attack it exhibited last year. The score was about the same as that by which Spokane defeated Gooding. Boise, of course, has not met any of the real contenders either in its own district or in other districts, but the scores by which good small schools have been trounced, show that Burley has a real shot at the capital city. 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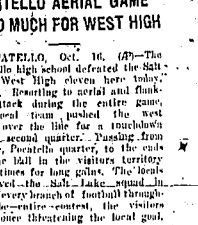
## POCATELLO AERIAL GAME TOO MUCH FOR WEST HIGH

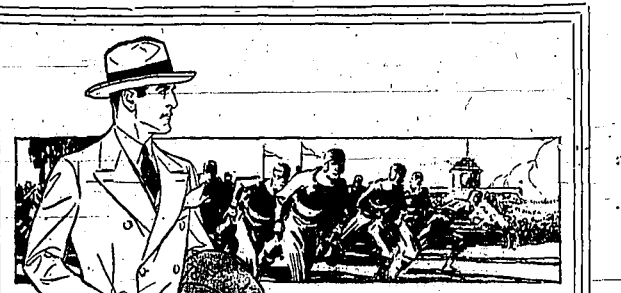

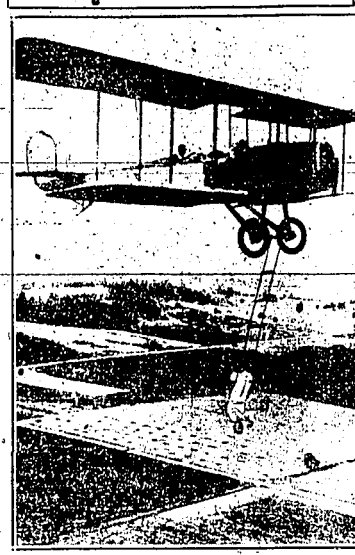

RED CROSS IS ALWAYS READY Organization Described as "Great National Phalanx of Preparedness" in Report.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16. (AP)—A great national phalanx of preparedness has been set up by the American Red Cross to grapple with relief work such as that recently necessitated by the southern Florida hurricane.

This organization, in its annual report, describes the numerous Red Cross chapters that have grown up over the country. The report states that it is today and covering the fiscal year ending last June 30, added: "Red Cross chapters generally have been busy in perfecting in perfecting strong, anti-disaster relief committees," and consequently "a very large portion of the United States is covered by this disaster preparedness plan. With unflinching accuracy and speed these disaster committees have struck their communities. Chapters are studying their local disaster hazards more carefully."

During the fiscal year, the Red Cross participated in 10 disasters, including 20 within the United States. The year was the first since the world war that the organization was not called upon to serve in some great disaster, the New York, Kentucky, and Florida storms all having occurred since July 26.

RED CROSS CONFERENCE FOR IDAHO SCHEDULED BOISE, Oct. 16.—Every Red Cross chapter and branch in Idaho is invited to attend a regional conference of the American National Red Cross which will be held in Boise, Thursday and Friday, October 21 and 22.

The main features of the present-day program of the Red Cross will be discussed in a series of talks by the chief executive of the government as efficient now as it was in time of war. Why chapters may not be disaster will receive special attention.

At least two persons of national note will appear on the conference program. One is Dr. Thomas L. Cronin of Washington, D. C., director of the Red Cross speaking service, and the other is William Eastman Burke, chief director of the Red Cross in San Francisco.

Home services, the Red Cross program of work for war veterans and their families, will be discussed by Miss Jeanette Newman, of the Pacific Branch office, San Francisco, and representatives from various chapters, community health work, nursing service, and the training of home health aides and nurses will be discussed by Miss Dorothy M. Ledyard, director of nursing service of the Pacific branch office.

At a session devoted to Junior Red Cross, a movement that has enlisted the interest of five million American youth, the county superintendent of Gooding and Lincoln counties will speak of the value of this work from an educational viewpoint.

The work being carried on by Red Cross volunteers in behalf of the victims of government housing will be discussed in foreign ports, impoverished families, blind persons, etc., will be presented by Miss Katherine Mott of the volunteer service for the Boise chapter.

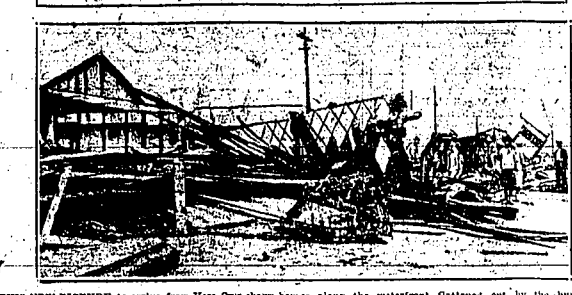

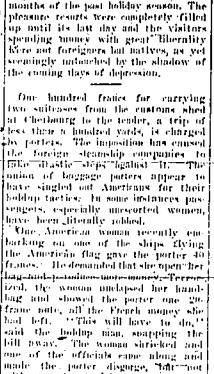

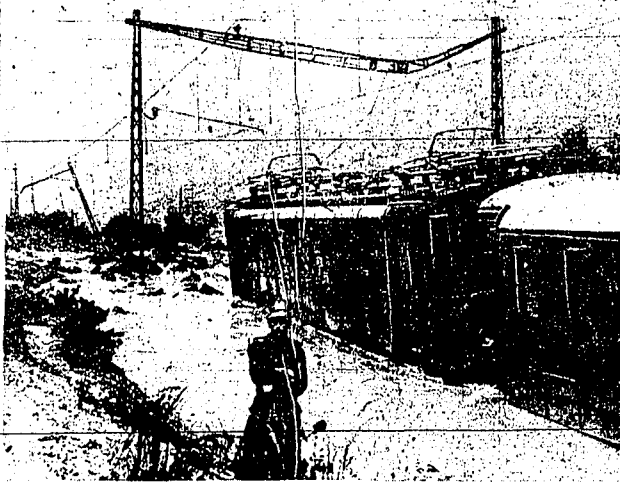

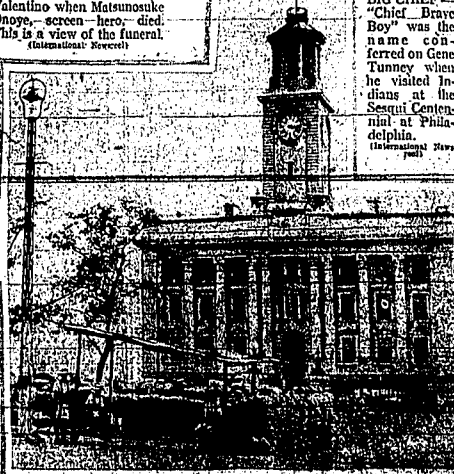

# HOUSE SHORTAGE IS BIG PROBLEM

Director of German Municipal Commission Would Curtail Activities of Dan Cupid.

BIRMIN, Oct. 16.—(AP)—An attempt to solve the housing shortage in England by curtailing Dan Cupid's activities is being made in Washington by Director Stiebel of the municipal housing commission. A warning which the commission is sending to all couples whose marriage intentions are pooled in the city hall in accordance with the law reads: "Don't get married. If you do, you will be forced to live with Indians. You know what that means. There is no such thing as a home of your own." The commission cannot promise you a place in which to live before you are eight or ten years old.

Eight Swedish importers have been sentenced to 18 months in jail each and fined a total of \$1,500,000 for attempting to smuggle in only 600 sacks of coffee. Bootlegging of the bean through smuggling is almost as intense as it was running in the United States, because the retail price of coffee averages \$1 a pound.

Cats are having such a hard life in Berlin that numerous societies for the protection of the felines are being organized. Society matrons wearing high priced Angoras, and elbows with workmen who handle scum tom cats at meetings called to protest against the treatment of cats. Speakers at these meetings deplore the fact that eight out of ten cats are killed in Berlin every day with the midnight yell of a cat as it "flings missiles" at them from the windows.
