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INQUIRY-TURNS TO SLUSH FUND IN WASHINGTON

Democrats Profess to Welcome Senate Investigation Called for by Republicans; Make Counter Charges.

(By the Associated Press.) BOBBIER, Oct. 20.—The United States Senator Charles McNary, republican, Oregon, designated chairman of the senate campaign funds committee to investigate campaign expenditures in Washington state, said today that he would cancel speaking engagements and go to Washington, "if the charges of campaign expenditures by McNary, Jones, republican, are substantiated and are such that an immediate investigation is necessary."

SEATTLE, Oct. 20.—The Washington state democratic campaign committee today stated that it welcomes an investigation of expenditures in the campaign which is being suggested by McNary, republican, Jones, republican, in being re-elected to his fourth term in the United States senate.

The investigation scheduled to be held here, was ordered today by Chicago for the senate campaign committee, after receiving a telegram from Hans H. Sumner, state republican central committee chairman, charging that McNary's campaign expenditures were lavish.

The statement continued: "Senator McNary, as a democrat and chairman of the committee, has done his duty in promising that an immediate investigation will be held. It should be completed before the people go to the polls November 2, for a candidate. His former wife, should be above suspicion."

"Since Senator Jones' campaign managers have asked for investigation, we propose that if the slush fund is so large, we shall ask Senator Reed and the committee to investigate the activities of the Antislavery League, which has confessed to giving Senator Jones money, or as it terms it, honorariums. We shall insist that Senator Reed and his committee investigate the activities of Senator Phillips of Colorado, chairman of the republican national campaign committee, and direct representatives of the United States senate."

"We shall ask the committee to determine the source from which the slush fund is to be placed at Senator Jones' disposal for Senator Phillips to be used."

"We shall ask the committee to inquire into the slush fund which Senator Jones and his managers have in reserve from the east and we shall insist that the committee investigate and learn from what source this money is to be obtained."

INDIANA KLAN'S ACTIVITIES IN CAMPAIGN TOLD

Former "Cyclops" Tells Senate Investigating Committee Organization Supports Senators for Re-election.

(By the Associated Press.) INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 20.—Ku Klux Klan support of Senator James E. Watson and Arthur Robinson, republican, in the Indiana legislature, was testified to today before the senate campaign funds committee.

Hugh T. Egan, of South Bend, Ind., a former entitled cyclops, declared he had been told by Klan officials that Walter Bowers of Indianapolis had been removed as grand dragon for Indiana because he had refused to go down the line. For Senator Watson in the present campaign, Egan said he had been told that "the good die young."

In Debt to Watson The former Indiana Klan official told the committee that he had been appointed grand dragon of the Klan in 1924, and that he had been instrumental in the election of Senator Watson, democrat, to the United States senate.

Watson was quoted further as saying that Senator Watson, "who had been instrumental in the election of Senator Watson, republican, New Hampshire, with reference to the activities of the Klan in Indiana."

Relating that Egan visited South Bend shortly before the Indiana senatorial primary, Egan declared that he had been told that if a big majority were given Watson, it might be that he would become a presidential candidate. He said that he had been told that should Watson be elected, he would appoint as ambassador to Mexico William W. Zimmerman, formerly of Kansas City, and now of Washington, who is grand dragon of the Klan in that state.

Evans, Egan continued, described Zimmerman as a person of great influence, who had been a member of the United States senate and his wife.

"He was and does with them," Egan said, "and he told me that."

Before opening its investigation of the Indiana situation, the committee heard a vigorous denunciation from Egan, who said that Zimmerman had been a member of the Klan in Indiana, and that he had been instrumental in the election of Senator Watson, republican, New Hampshire, with reference to the activities of the Klan in Indiana.

# SUN'S TROOPS MANEUVER TO HOLD SHANGHAI

### Main Bodies of Opposing Forces Aligned on Railroad 60 to 70 Miles From Metropolis; Clash Seems Inevitable.

(By the Associated Press.)  
SHANGHAI, Oct. 20.—Sun Chuan Yang's troops maneuvering for the defense of this "Paris of the east" against revolutionary forces from the Hong province, advanced today to Kaili, within 10 miles of the rebel base at Kweichow. The troops under Sun Chuan Yang, who has declared his province of Chekiang independent of Sun's overlordship, will advance his troops along the railway, a clash seems inevitable.

The main bodies of the opposing forces are aligned along the Hong Kow-Shanghai railroad. Fighting parties are opposed on the Whangpoo river 20 miles from Shanghai. The main forces are 60 to 70 miles from Shanghai on the railroad.

### Conflicting Rumors Rife.

Conflicting rumors continue to pour into this city regarding military alignments. The rebellious governor, Hsu Chuan of Chekiang, who yesterday was reported in league with the Sun Chuan Yang, Chang Tso Lin, was said today to be aligning himself with the Sun's government, upon receipt of Chang Tso Lin's order of relieving the governorship of Chekiang under the protection of the Manchurians.

Hsu Chuan is now said to have taken the jurisdiction under the Sun's government. Further interest in the checkered career of Hsu upon which guesses are being made by masses of intrigue and partitioning of the country as a whole, centers the probable action of Chang Tso Lin for against Sun Chuan Yang. Development will disclose whether Chang will attempt to seize for himself some or all of the five provinces ruled by Sun or will aid him against the advancing Cantonese force of both.



Annual Bonfire at State University to be Burned on Eve of Washington State Game.

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, Oct. 20.—University of Idaho freshmen, inspired by more than 20 years of bitter athletic rivalry with Washington State college and a tradition as old as rivalry, are planning the annual bonfire, to be burned on the night of November 25. This, in keeping with tradition, is the night before the Washington State game.

Preceding the fire the entire student body will assemble on the main rally of the year, including the boys' "pajama parade," headed by the pep band, the yelling, chanting and howling and parades in separate order through the downtown section of Moscow, before dispersing at the fair grounds where the fire is burning. Boxes, containing outbuildings, uncut wood, wooden sidewalks, barrels, railroad ties, logs and everything that is loose and will burn, are loaded in trucks to the fair grounds for days before the burning. Barrels of oil are used, and when the match is applied flames shoot several hundred feet into the air from the 75-foot pyramid. Finally an effigy, symbol of Washington State college, is placed on the pinnacle.

## Yon Vengeance on Cougars

As the flames cut darkness for several hundred feet around the center of the stadium, the vengeance on the Cougars rages through the main of college songs, yells and various other pep producers.

It has become customary for Washington State to send out delegations the night before the game to fire the pyramid prematurely. Accordingly a freshman guard is thrown up about the pile for two days preceding the burning. An additional guard is thrown about the campus to prevent Washington visitors from leaving the college.

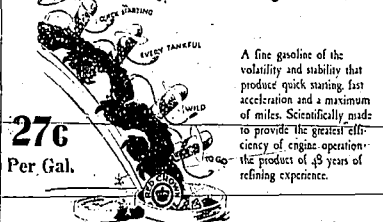

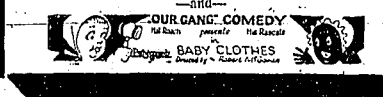

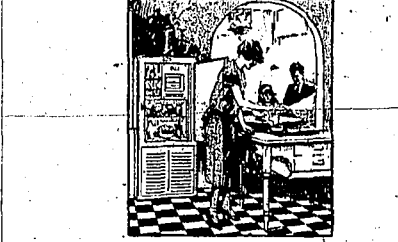
