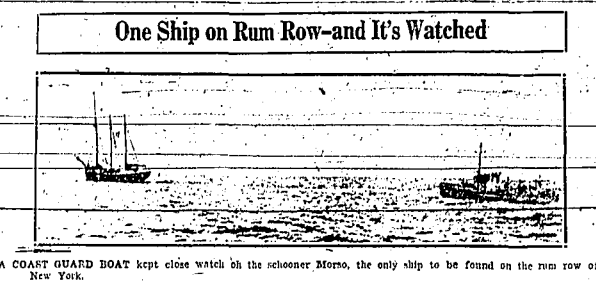

SHAKERS SECT FAST MOVING TO EXTINCTION

Half Century Witnesses Rise and Fall of Powerful Religious Communistic Organization in America.

(By The Associated Press) LEHANON, Ohio, Oct. 30. — Only the epitaph remains to be told of the story of the Shakers, once powerful religious sect.

More than a century and a half ago, the adherents of "Mother Ann" Leach came to America from England, and established the first colony of Shakers in New York state.

Despite opposition, the new sect grew and became wealthy. The Shakers bought the best land in the region. They were sober, industrious, pious and honest. They abolished marriage and depended upon converts from other denominations or "from the world" to keep up their membership.

Shakers made their life almost monastic in color. The monks and nuns they tolled for their church, gave money to the needy, and maintained the relationship of brothers and sisters. The "pooling" of lands and all resources in the hands of the church made it a communistic enterprise.

There were little intellectual life, and education was not encouraged until the latter years of the church. The Shakers believed that Adam and Eve were the physical progenitors of man.

100 WITNESSES TO TESTIFY ON JERSEY KILLING

Hall-Mills Case - Prosecution Announces Names of 80 Witnesses; Some From Far Corners of Earth.

SOMERVILLE, N. J., Oct. 30. (AP)—There are more than 100 principal witnesses ready for the trial of the persons accused of murder of Rev. Edward Whelan, "Half-Blooded New Brains" church pastor, and his choir along with Mrs. Eleanor B. Mills, which will start November 15.

The prosecution has announced the names of 80 principal witnesses, most of whom have circumstantial testimony. They were gathered through a campaign newspaper publicity, by State Senator Alexander Simpson, who said when the case was reopened this summer, four years after the killings, "I will turn this investigation from secrecy to openhandness."

Some of the witnesses thus obtained came from far corners of the country, but the most surprising development was the number of persons discovered who claimed to be within a short distance of the scene of the killing the night it occurred.

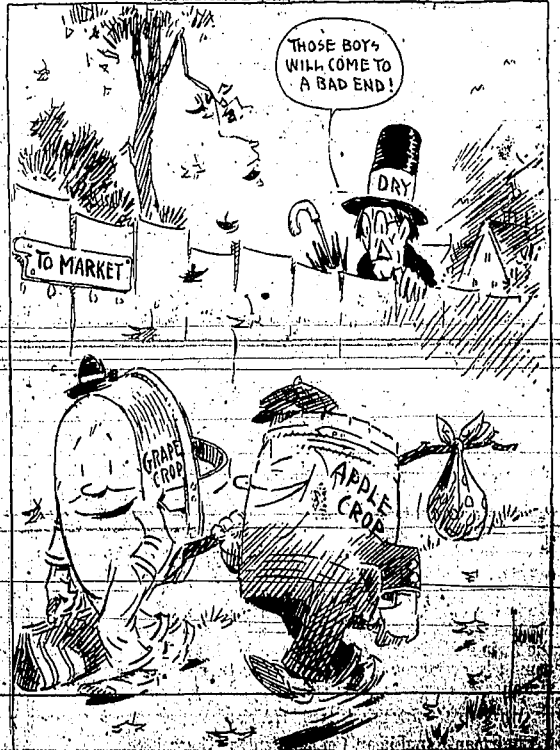

WINE LOVERS OF FRANCE TO WAR ON PROHIBITION

Noted Writers and Doctors Form Organization to Retailate Against Pussycot Johnson's Invasion.

(By The Associated Press.) PARIS, Oct. 26.—Pussycot Johnson brought the anti-tiger and wine fight to France, and, following his lead, French wine lovers have decided to start a campaign against prohibition in foreign lands.

The "Friends of Wine of France," an organization just formed by a group of noted writers and doctors, has decided to begin an active world battle to popularize the merits of the vine and to combat prohibition laws. Militant methods which, it is said, will be adopted abroad, have been discussed. Heading the new committee is Victor Baret, who was minister of agriculture in the Clemenceau cabinet. Other former cabinet members who will take an active part in its work include Jean Borodet, former minister of agriculture, Gabriel Chantemesse, who held the post of minister of the interior, and Ferdinand David, once minister of public instruction. The committee's action, the subject of the "Friends of the Wine of France," for, included in the propaganda work in France itself will be numerous pamphlets, of which the first of wine will be served gratis. Prominent Americans will be invited, and asked to address the merits of French wine in the United States.

The County Commissioners and the Weeds

THE REPUBLICAN candidates for County Commissioners, Messrs. T. E. Moore of Filer, L. H. Giffin of Twin Falls and Robert Brose of Rock Creek pledge and promise a continuance of the present program for the elimination of noxious weeds.

They will do this in a workmanlike and businesslike way, spending just as little money as possible and charging up to the individual the full cost of the work on individual farms, exactly as is being done at the present time.

They favor a continuance of the present policy of the Bureau of Noxious Weed Control under the direction of Ed. S. Larned and the carrying on of the work by the present methods except insofar as future efforts may disclose better methods.

They favor strict economy but not the kind of economy which will handicap the work and interfere with the success of the effort.

They endorse and stand squarely upon the record of the past two years with respect to this work.

Now here is the record to date, as shown by the figures in the possession of the County Auditor and the Bureau of Noxious Weed Control.

In the year 1924, the last of the Democratic two year term of office for County Commissioners, a sum amounting to \$1,400 was spent for weed work.

The only records available on this work consist of an indexed book which shows a cursory investigation of the weed situation in an area extending out a few miles from Twin Falls. A number of infested farms are listed but, apparently as the season, was far advanced when the investigation was begun, no work of any kind was done towards eliminating or controlling the weeds.

When the Republican County Commissioners took office in January, 1925, an organized effort was immediately begun. The Bureau of Noxious Weed Control was established with Ed. S. Larned in charge, work was commenced in infested areas and definite progress was made.

The entire county was mapped and every patch of noxious weeds entered. Chemical and other supplies were purchased, a warehouse to care for the tools, equipment and supplies was erected and every effort put forth, not only to gain control of the weed pests, but to educate the people as a whole to the dangers of the weed menace.

The gross cost of the year's work was \$10,913.48; plus the cost of a Ford truck at \$350.00, making a total gross cost of \$11,263.48.

But in addition to this item of gross cost there was an income to the County from the efforts of the Bureau.

The sum of \$2,896.20 was ordered charged against individual property and added to the 1925 tax roll, and in addition to this item, the end of the year showed an inventory of supplies and equipment on hand amounting to \$1,322.40, and cash turned into the County treasurer from the operations of the Bureau amounting to \$410.17.

Subtracting these three items from the gross cost of the year's operations it will be found that the net cost to taxpayers, after including a charge of \$350 for a Ford truck, for the work on weeds during 1925 amounted to but \$6,634.71.

This, then, was the cost to the taxpayers of the Weed operations during the year 1925; not \$11,263.48, but \$6,634.71.

So far during 1926 an even more favorable showing has been made.

FROM January first to October twenty-fourth, the gross cost has been \$27,314.35, but the net cost to the taxpayers has been even less than during the preceding year.

Here are the items of the Bureau's income or earnings during the year to date:

The net cost to the Taxpayers for weed control so far this year, then has been \$3,985.31.

An amount which figures out about one-tenth cents per acre in taxation cost for the work of caring for a situation in all Twin Falls County which is just as much a menace as is the matter of seepage, possibly even more so unless the present unremitting effort in the way of elimination is kept up.

And compare the above cost per acre with the cost per acre for drainage operations on the basis of all the land in Twin Falls County.

This last amounts to approximately 50c per acre. Now does it really look as though it were costing too much to take care of our weeds?

(The figures used are from the records of the Bureau and the office of the County Auditor. They are public records and as such are open to all).

This is the plain unvarnished truth about the operation of the County Bureau of Noxious Weed Control.

A vote for the Republican County Commissioners is a vote for a continuance of the work against the weed menace.

The Democrats did nothing about it in 1923 and 1924; and there is nothing in their campaign literature that would indicate that if elected they would do any more in the next two years.

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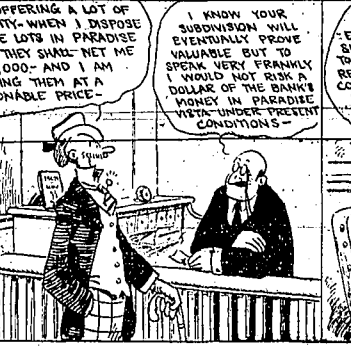

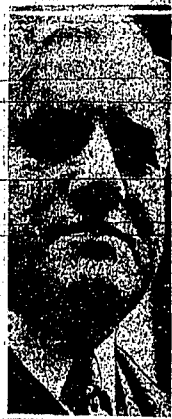

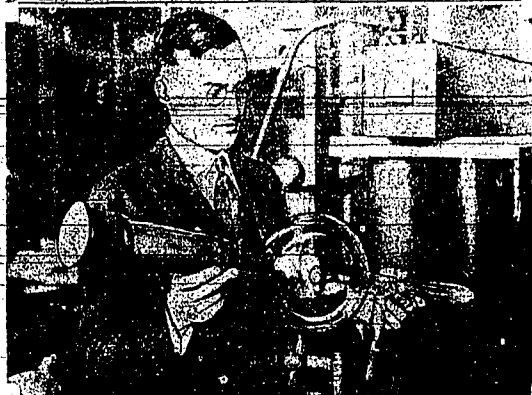

Seat in Congress Still Much Sought, Despite Criticism

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30 (AP)—Despite the avalanche of criticism at congress in recent years, seats in that body still are eagerly sought.

—Twenty-two congressmen from nearly 100 men and women seeking the 422 places to be filled in the seven-ninth congress—1927 in the house and 1928 in the senate.

—Almost the entire house membership—391 to be exact—is trying to stage a coup, with the senators, who are elected themselves, of the house such a by-product.

—The 125 Democrats, the three former labor and two socialist. Among the senators are 22 republicans and six democrats and one republican who is running as an independent.

—In one state—Illinois—there are 10 candidates for a single senate seat, while the total number offering for the 37 senate vacancies to be filled next Tuesday exceed 110.

There are 822 candidates for the house, the democrats having nearly 600 in the front, with 91 of them unopposed, and the republicans having 372, of which 27 are without opposition.

Besides the major parties, the socialists have 78 offering for the house; the farmers about 24, the Progressives 18, the I. O. O. F. 18, and the Progressives 12.

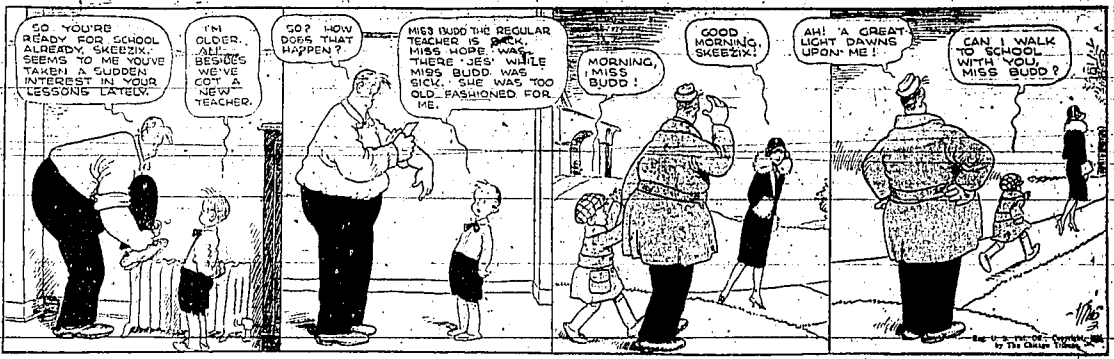

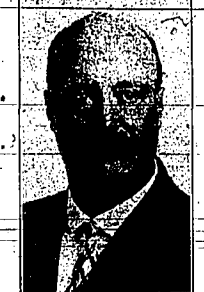

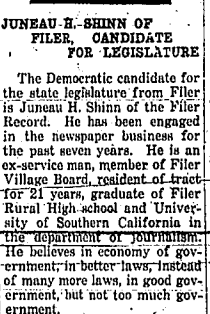

European Steel Trust is Regarded As Factor in Industry in America

Roger W. Babson Discusses Possible Affect of Merger on Continent as Well as in United States.

BABSON-PHOTO: Babson, Oct. 29.—The purpose of the merger of the European Steel Trust, Roger W. Babson was today asked his opinion as to the possibility of a similar merger in this country as well as on the western European continent. In an exclusive interview with the press he gives his views of the situation as follows:

"The formation of a European steel combine is important not only because of the great increase in the output of steel between the Western Hemisphere and the United States, but also because of its possible effect on the iron and steel industry in this country. On October 1, 1926, the steel producers of France, Germany, Belgium and Luxembourg signed an agreement to form a steel combine with an annual output in the neighborhood of 27,000,000 tons. Germany has contributed 14.9 per cent of the total, France 23.9, Belgium 14.6, Luxembourg 8.25 and Saar Valley 3.77. In 1925 the combined output of these four countries was 20,000,000 tons, and the United States 5.1 per cent and the United Kingdom 3.8 per cent.

"The proposed combine is said to be a full and complete merger, and among its members, however, I believe there are additional more loose relations. When Lorraine was reunited with France the pre-war German steel making began in the Ruhr and in Lorraine was badly disrupted. The division was political and broke down former economic combinations. The coal and steel industries of the Ruhr and Lorraine are equally essential to the German steel industry and the French, since their agreement as to the present was necessary to reunite these two important elements. This is not the basic purpose of the combine.

"That this agreement to compete on a friendly basis is a true thing, I cannot be certain. Friendly industrial cooperation requires a long step toward friendly political relations. The agreement to continue for five years by which time it is felt industrial and political conditions in Europe will have become much more stable. Cooperation will still be necessary to keep Westphalia and Lorraine together.

Effect on Prices.

"The immediate effect on steel prices will be a stabilized tendency in Europe. World prices will of course also be affected by English and American competition. Each country is to deposit \$1 in a common fund for the cost of steel manufactured within its allotted percentage. For each ton produced over and above this percentage the producing country must pay \$4 into the fund. Two dollars per ton will be refunded to any company falling in any one year to produce its allotted percentage of a minimum total of 20,000,000 tons. Hence this arrangement will tend to maintain a common price. The cost of carrying it on will presumably be added to the cost of steel and thus raise prices in these countries.

"Just what effect the combine's activity will have on prices in our country and in foreign markets cannot be said. The individual members of the combine have hitherto made efforts to extend their sales along the Atlantic seaboard. This activity may be intensified and lower prices may be a consequence. However, the combine's prices will tend to rise above the competitive prices previously maintained by its members. Moreover, direct selling of European steel with attendant price cutting will probably be eliminated. In addition there is an anti-dumping law in effect here to prevent the combine from selling cheaper in this country than they do at home.

Effect on Labor.

"The effort on labor in western Europe should be beneficial in that production will be better stabilized and employment maintained. Scattered strikes will be less probable because of

more continuous employment. With the elimination of restrictive price cutting wages will be subjected to cuts and might possibly be increased. The general level of wages, however, will probably remain much lower than in England and the United States. Companies at Pittsburgh draw from the 50-cent an hour, German steel workers draw 1.50 to 1.75 an hour, and workers of disintegrated countries French and Belgian labor works for even less. Hence the labor market is very tight.

There is this considerable room for competition between the combine and the American steel industry. Moreover, for a number of reasons such as better working conditions, the widespread use of labor-saving devices and the combine's ability to produce more productively, it is likely that the combine will sell its own steel at lower prices than the American industry. In the long run the combine will have a heavier production per man may be necessary to forestall these conditions.

Effect on Foreign Trade.

"Though has already been said to show that the combine, England and the United States are the three largest competing nations of the world market, especially in South America and the Orient. The kind of iron and steel produced, however, will have a bearing on the trade will vary. Exports of the United States' companies are largely finished goods. The combine's chief products have been iron and steel and products of heavy gauge. Our steel is more competitive in machinery and construction but conditions in the future may not be quite as satisfactory should the combine use its resources to intensify competition along new lines.

"On the whole, therefore, one can reasonably conclude that the formation of this combine and the results that it seeks to achieve are favorable to world peace and commercial relations. Europe can only be beneficial and both England and the United States are in a better position with Europe on a more solid basis than they have been heretofore with Europe a tangle of political and economic troubles. Competition between abroad was to be expected. Business in this country is prospering at a rate which has not been shown by the Babsonchart. There is nothing in sight to indicate any fundamental radical decline from present levels."

HARVESTER COMPANY AGAIN BEFORE COURT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30. (AP)—After an absence of 12 years, the International Harvester company today again was before the supreme court to answer a charge by the government that it was monopolizing the harvester business.

Cyrus McCormick, chairman of the board of the company, and other officers, attended the hearing.

William J. Donovan, of the department of justice on behalf of the government, insisted the company had not carried out its good faith agreement of 1914 to restore competitive conditions in the harvester trade. He reviewed "the long litigation, including several arguments in the supreme court, leading up to the agreement, the intervention of war, and asserted that after the restoration of normal conditions, the company had refused to end its monopoly under the agreement and was still retaining trade in harvesting machinery. He contended that the company now controlled between 81 and 89 per cent of this business.

These figures were denounced as misleading by William S. Elliott, counsel for the company, who held that the company's output in harvesting machinery constituted only 20 per cent of the volume of its entire business, and that there was active competition in all other lines. He insisted that the government conceded such competition and declared that the company could not restrain trade in harvesting machinery.

Losses in Oil

Somehow it became necessary to take cognizance of the statements of those who deliberately try to deceive the public. In advertising being recently circulated in Harry Sheriff's interest a most interesting paragraph, some of which statements are misleading and are direct attacks upon M. E. Paragraph 3 of Mr. Sheriff's advertising reads:

"I have put in seven years in the detection of criminals and outlaws and know how to trap, catch and bring them to justice. Mr. Sheriff could have a wonderfully fine job instead of being a common collector, if he is able to do all he says he can. Now paragraphs 4 and 5 of the Sheriff advertising state:

"I am absolutely in favor of the Constitutional Liquor Amendment, known as the Volstead Act, and the Idaho liquor laws and if I am, an old Sheriff, can have the support of law-abiding citizens and the prosecuting attorney's office, Twin Falls County will be the driest spot in Idaho."

"I have spent the last three years going all over Twin Falls County all times of day and night, in my present position, and know the haunts, haunts of all kinds of forgers, thieves, moonshiners, bootleggers and other crooks, and those that protect them, and if I can't outdo the law and protect the public better than has been done for the past four years, I will resign and turn the job over to someone who can."

Taking Mr. Sheriff's statement in the first part of paragraph 5, we find upon investigation that Mr. Sheriff had been a resident of Twin Falls County only a little over a year, when he asked the voters of the county for the important office of Sheriff. Mr. Sheriff lived on a 25-acre farm in Clifton, Idaho, just across the river from Glenns Ferry, which farm he rented from J. D. Gorbly of Glenns Ferry. It was while living here that Mr. Sheriff took orders for staves for a small other house. He left this farm and moved to Twin Falls in the spring of 1925. In the spring of 1925 he got the idea in his head that Twin Falls County would like the office of sheriff.

We note again in paragraph 4 that Mr. Sheriff makes it conditional that he must have the support of the prosecuting attorney and law-abiding citizens to enforce the liquor law. Now Section 2153 of Idaho Compiled Statutes, provides that persons having such knowledge as Mr. Sheriff says he has, may be called into court to give such information before the officers that they may be able to enforce the law. We would suggest that Mr. Sheriff read that section of our statute. Likely he is not aware there was such a statute.

It is true that a sheriff's office depends a great deal on good "law-abiding citizens" for information and support in upholding the law. To state Mr. Sheriff has never attempted to help the sheriff force apprehend any of the "moonshiners or the people that protect them." Perhaps he may have been recent in his duty. Now, if Mr. Sheriff has not supplied the county prosecutor with the information that he says he is well informed on, he certainly cannot expect that the people have any reason to believe he will enforce the law to any greater extent if he were elected to the office.

It is evident that Mr. Sheriff is grossly ignorant as to the law; it is also evident that he is unqualified in every way for the office which he seeks.
