BOURBONS GAIN AT LEAST ONE SEAT IN SENATE

Slowly Accumulating Returns Show Democratic Candidates Leading in Several States Formerly Republican.

(By The Associated Press.) NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—Slowly accumulating returns of yesterday's general elections developed so many uncertainties that people were unable to determine gains made by the outstanding candidates mentioned in the doubtful columns.

The democrats not only re-elected Governor Smith in New York, but picked up one senatorial seat in Massachusetts, defeating Senator Butler, personal friend of President Coolidge, and chairman of the republican national committee. Senator Underhill of New York also appeared in danger.

On top of their victories in Massachusetts and New York, the democrats were keeping their senatorial candidates in the lead in Arizona, Missouri, Maryland, Oklahoma and Kentucky. All of these states are now in the hands of the democrats.

Republicans in Lead.

In Indiana, stirred in the closing days of the campaign by charges of a corrupt political machine, the republicans, Senators Watson and Robinson, republicans, were leading on partial returns. Illinois and Pennsylvania, where the republicans' "slush fund" committee concentrated the attention, showed victory by a large margin. Representative C. C. Brannan, republican, in Pennsylvania, had a majority, but Frank Smith, named for the senate by Illinois republicans, was faced with the possibility of losing to a heavy majority of democrats in Chicago by George E. Brown, his democratic opponent.

Many Doubtful Contests.

The slowness of the returns left in doubt many contests for state and local offices. Of the 34 states electing governors, only six had reported the result early today and except for New York all of these were older in the democratic solid south or in undivided republican territory.

The available figures likewise made it impossible to gauge clearly the whole result of the advisory presidential referendum held in eight states.

President Butler was the only republican senatorial nominee to be endorsed publicly by President Coolidge, who journeyed to Northampton and was met there by his friends and party leader.

Back in the White House last night the returns had not yet been received, but had been the outcome in his house state.

Idaho Goes Solidly Republican in Vote

Entire State Ticket Is Named by Electorate; Latest Returns Indicate Progressives Running Ahead of Democrats.

(By The Associated Press.) BOISE, Nov. 2.—Idaho stayed solidly republican today, returning Senator Frank R. Gooding to the United States senate and Burton L. French and Addison T. Smith to the house of representatives, in addition to electing the complete republican state ticket.

With almost half of the population reported, 418 out of 542 precincts, Gooding has amassed 31,500, against 28,300 for H. E. Simmons, progressive, and 15,200 for John E. Nugent, democrat. The present reported vote shows the progressive ticket running ahead of the republican state ticket.

When Running Third.

H. C. Baldridge, republican, has a lead of 15,000 votes over Smith, Idaho progressive gubernatorial candidate, while A. H. Wilson, democrat, is running a poor third. The count for 20,000 of the state is as follows: 21,800; Hark, 16,400; and Wilson, 12,800.

Republican incumbents for congress expended little difficulty, the present vote standing for half of the senate: French, democrat, Burton L. French, republican, 15,400; L. J. Burdette, progressive and democrat, 15,200; French and Addison T. Smith, republican, 16,400; H. E. P. French, progressive, 7,100; and Mrs. Mary George, republican, 6,000.

CARDOZ GOES REPUBLICAN

SODA SPRINGS, Nov. 2 (AP)—Cardozo county seat decisively republican, over 5000 votes over Smith, Idaho republican ticket swept into office by overwhelming plurality.

Gooding and Smith scored a two to one victory over their democratic opponents. Progressives made little showing, losing 1000 out of 10,000 in the precinct remaining had 10 votes.

The returns gave Gooding 404; Nugent 180; Kappeler 10, in the senatorial contest.

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GRAPHIC STORY OF ATTEMPT ON PREMIER'S LIFE

Delayed Message From Scene of Attempted Killing Paints Picture of Youth's Rash Action and Swift Justice.

(By The Associated Press.) ROME, Nov. 2.—Fascist Italy, always stirred, to delirious enthusiasm by the utterances of its leader, Benito Mussolini, is now seeking with deadly determination to suppress all opposition to fascism.

The most stringent measures are being prepared to discourage any further attacks against the life of the duke or criticism against his policy.

The intense feeling engendered throughout Italy by the attempt of the boy, Lamberto, to kill Mussolini at Bologna, has been accentuated by the latest word from that city, confirming the report that he was involved in a far reaching plot, instead of being merely an isolated gesture by a deranged youth.

An alleged communist plot against the government is said to have been discovered, ten of those implicated being taken by the police together with a thousand manifestos. Seven "fascist" communists have been arrested.

BOLONGIA, Italy, Nov. 2.—Premier Mussolini escaped death today within space of several seconds from a bullet, when the second attempt to assassinate him within six weeks failed.

After a bullet, fired at a distance of less than 20 inches, miraculously missed the mark, ripping his coat, the assassin, who had been seen to cavalcade him within six weeks failed.

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BELGIAN RULERS NOW IN SWEDEN

Arrival of Royal Family Marks Opening of Official Ceremonies for Coming Wedding.

STOCKHOLM, Nov. 2 (AP)—Official ceremonies in honor of the coming marriage of Crown Prince Leopold of Belgium and Princess Astrid of Sweden began today with the arrival of King Albert of Belgium and Queen Elizabeth in Stockholm to the strains of a band playing the Belgian national anthem.

Swedish King Gustaf, who had been joined by Prince Leopold at a way station 15 miles from the capital, received a rousing greeting. The weather was fine and frosty with a brilliant sunshine when their train rolled into the newly decorated central station in Stockholm to the strains of a band playing the Belgian national anthem.

King Gustaf, the Duke of Vesterborg, land, father of Princess Astrid, and Princess Ingeborg, her mother, and the princess herself received the king and queen of the Belgians warmly. King Gustaf hurried to embrace and kiss King Albert on both cheeks, while Queen Elizabeth tenderly kissed Prince Leopold.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2 (AP)—Election returns were received by President Coolidge at the executive mansion for more than an hour tonight after his return from Northampton, Mass., where he and Mrs. Coolidge stayed over the night.

When it appeared that several of the close contests would not be decided for many hours, he went to the executive mansion soon after 11 o'clock and retired.

Prompt reports from the various states were given Mr. Coolidge by press associations over special telegraph wires, and even before he reached Washington on his special train from Northampton, he was advised by The Associated Press of early returns, but he made no comment on the situation.

G. O. P. CONTROL IS INDICATED IN EARLY RETURNS

With Little More Than Half of Newly Elected Representatives Accounted For, Bourbons Gain Only Two Seats.

(By The Associated Press.) NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—Only a little more than half of the new house of representatives elected today had been accounted for in the returns received up to midnight.

The exact number was 228, including 108 democrats and 120 republicans. Only a net gain of two out of the 300 democrats needed to gain control of the house had been recorded—one in New York and one in Pennsylvania.

With returns from the doubtful enough contests coming in slowly, both the New York Times and the New York American in early editions stated that Robert Wagner, democrat, had won over Senator James W. Aldrich, republican, New York's 19th senator, a staunch republican paper, conceded the race was close.

With a third of the Massachusetts precincts outside of Boston heard from Senator William Butler, hearing the sound of the new president Coolidge, was 28,000 ahead of his democratic opponent, former Senator David I. Walsh. Butler, however, a New England stronghold, still was to be heard from.

Willis Leads in Ohio.

Senator Frank H. Willis, republican, had forged ahead of former Senator Patterson, democrat, in Ohio returns from his district of the state after his 60,588 to 61,742 for his opponent.

Returns from one-fifth of Missouri gave Representative Harry H. Rogers a lead of about 20,000 over Senator George J. Williams in the contest for the expired term of the late Senator Spencer.

Representative William H. Vane of Philadelphia, had a commanding lead over Senator Charles W. McNair, republican, in the Pennsylvania senatorial fight.

Over in Oregon, democratic national committeeman, from Illinois, was 35,000 votes in front of Frank L. Smith, republican, in the contest for the senate, but most of the returns were from Cook county, Oregon stronghold.

Moore Western Returns.

An hour before midnight no returns had been received from the senatorial race in California, Washington, Oregon and only the most meager returns had come from Utah, Nevada, Colorado and Arizona.

Although the democrats had gained only two seats in the new house out of 212 congressmen-elect, the republican party, in the general election Tuesday, was in a position to carry the house of representatives.

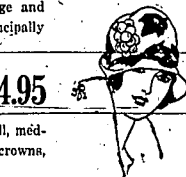
