**Communists Carrying Banners  
Inject Into Chicago's Reception  
to Queen Marie Un-  
looked-for Feature.**

(By the Associated Press)

CHICAGO, Nov. 12.—Three hundred communists, carrying banners, denouncing Queen Marie and the Romanian government, injected into Chicago's welcome to the queen tonight a few notes not included in the plans which she approved for her reception.

Down with Romanian terrorism," "Down with Queen Marie, oppressor of Bukovina, Bessarabia and..." and "2500 political prisoners out in Romanian jails," were among the inscriptions which the communists waved aloft.

The queen, sheltered from a downpour by her enclosed car gave no indication if she was aware of the disruption of her welcome at the city hall where she was presented to Mayor Dever and the city council which gave her the keys to the city.

CHICAGO, Nov. 13. (AP)—An all-day journey through Illinois earned Queen Marie of Rumania the title of first even "ignorant" hostess of welcome awaiting her before midnight.

In a dismal drizzle which shrouded the lake front, phalanxes of Rumanian children in native garb, military escorts, a naval band, and a welcoming committee greeted her train at the Illinois Central station; and Michigan avenue was packed with thousands of eager faces for a glimpse of royalty could not be dispensed by train.

Her program gave her but 15 minutes to ride to the city hall, where the mayor and the city council held for her the keys to the city, and bade for quick access to the Lake Shore Drive hotel, to dress for dinner and a reception.

**Faces Strenuous Program.**  
The reception, to which invitations were held by a thousand Chicagoans, marked the high point of the ceremony of greeting, and tomorrow the queen will set out early to "do Chicago" three days as full of functions as was tonight.

## ITALIAN BREAKS SPEED RECORD

**Overseas Pilot Wins Schneider Cup in International Seaplane Races at Norfolk.**

Averaging more than four and one-tenth miles each minute, the little

streak walked away from everything on the course. When De Bernandis crossed the finishing line his average speed was clocked as 210.400 miles an hour.

**Sets New Marks.**

In addition to this record, he broke the records for the 100 kilometer closed circuit at 248.180 miles an hour; for the

200 kilometer closed circuit at 248,000 miles an hour, and bettered the three kilometer record in six of his seven laps. America's only hope in the race, the all-Curtiss plane, piloted by Lieutenant George T. Cuddihy, went down as it started for the home pylon on his first lap. His average speed for the race at that time, however, was far below that of the Italian, being only 229,161 m.

Besides Cuddihy, Captain Arturo F. Farin, who had flown a splendid first three laps, came to the water and out of the race just after completing his third lap with an average speed at that time of 235.358 miles an hour.

## VOTERS DECLARE FOR AMENDMENT

Official Canvass Shows County's Electors on Record, 1970 to 1174, for More Pay.

Twin Falls county electors voted 1970 to 1174, in the general election November 2 in favor of adoption of the proposed amendment to the state constitution so as to provide that "each member of the legislature shall receive for his services a sum not exceeding \$10 per day from the commencement of the session, but not more than \$400 for per diem allowance for any one session."

The proposition was approved in 37 precincts and voted down in 10 precincts. In Hansen the vote was evenly divided, 37 for and 37 against the proposed amendment. In general, city precincts favored the proposition, and rural districts opposed it.

As compared with the total vote of 1914 and in the county for all candidates for governor, the total vote on the proposed amendment was 1174. The number in which electors of the several precincts expressed their views on the proposition is shown by the official canvass of election returns, as follows:
