Mexican Federal
Troops Begin to
Turn Yaqui Tide

Soldiers Surround More Than 500 Warriors and Put Them to Flight in Sharp Conflict.

NOGALES, Ariz., Nov. 19. (AP)—Advisers to the United States Mexican federal army today began to turn the tide of Yaqui Indian victories on the Sonora front on the eastern slope of the Sierra de Huachalera when they surrounded 500 Indian warriors, victors in the recent Yaqui arena battle, and put them to flight with heavy casualties. After a conflict lasting over an hour, the Yaquis left on the field many dead and wounded, taking their casualties with them to retreat. The battle occurred after four days of pursuit by the Mexican soldiers, and ended not only in a victory for the pursuers but the recovery of several hundred head of horses and mules, and the capture of a Yaqui station at the Arenas encampment.

Long Four-Cornered Battle for Construction Privileges in Texas Panhandle Won by C., B. & Q. and Frisco.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—The long four-cornered battle for the right to finance in extensive railroad construction in the north plains area of the Texas Panhandle was won today by the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy and the St. Louis-San Francisco systems. The interstate commerce commission authorized these two major lines to build 200 miles of new railroad at a cost of \$7,125,000, but they said that unless they proceeded promptly with construction work, the Santa Fe and Texas Panhandle & Gulf railroads, whose application to build in the same territory, were rejected, would be permitted to receive their request.

Twin Falls Bruins Win Southern Championship

Plastino Squad Triumphs Over Filer Wildcats, 6 to 0, Clinching Gridiron Title for South Half of Idaho.

A weary, mud splattered Bruin eleven trekked home from the Wildcat last night with a 6 to 0 victory and the championship of southern Idaho tucked in their hip pockets. It was a well earned victory and only the superior kicking of Bruin players made possible for the Bruins. The Filer lunks were able to gain through the Bruin line in the center of the field, but when the Bruin line was against their own goal line, they held, and two attempts at drop kicks were short, after the Wildcats had plugged down the field within striking distance. A rain-soaked field made the open work and the dashing and runs of Bruin players impossible, although he did get away for one long run.

Filer Opens Up
The Wildcats carried the ball down the field on straight kicks, but were halted on the 12 yard line and Smith's attempt at a drop kick was wide. Harvard and Yale Will Ring Down Curtain in Final Contest of "Big Three" Series.

NEW YORK, Nov. 19 (AP)—Harvard and Yale will ring down the curtain on a season of annual coverage to history in the last game of the "Big Three" series. It will be their forty-fifth meeting on the grid iron, Yale having won 23, Harvard 15, and six battles having ended in ties.

Harvard, off to an improving start, lost to Geneva and Holy Cross, rallied aggressively to beat Dartmouth, Wakefield and Mary and Tufts, then slipped to defeat again at the hands of Princeton, Yale, taking the other end of the Harvard record.

Yale Bruins, on the other hand, have had a period of supremacy under the late Foy Haglund, but only in 1924 by the 4-2 victory of Foy's Bruins, since then to an end in 1925, when the Bruins signed off a 1-6 trip, since then the Bruins have been unable to defeat more than one team in the series.

Members of Twin Falls County Realtors Association Adopt Plan to Bring Qualities of Land Here Before Buyers.

First steps were taken Friday night toward perfection of a national advertising plan outlined with a view to placing the real estate in this section before the buyers of the United States at a meeting of the Twin Falls County Realtors' association in Twin Falls. Twenty of the organization's 35 members were present and endorsed the proposition. A committee of three, composed of J. E. Roberts, J. E. White, was appointed to solicit the cooperation of members in Twin Falls who were not present at the meeting.

Adopt Program.
The plan adopted provides that each of the members of the association shall pay an additional fee of \$10 per month for one year. The funds thus raised will be devoted to the cost of advertising to the public in various newspapers of Twin Falls and cooperation of the public which will be required to mail copies of the papers containing the advertisements to friends throughout the United States.

In the absence of J. E. Roberts, president of the association, C. D. Thomas, local realtor, presided. Principal addresses of the evening were given by Mrs. Mary Mendenhall, E. White and J. E. Keel of Twin Falls, and Mr. Thomas submitted a report on the meeting of the Twin Falls Realtors' association, which was held in Pocatello two weeks ago.

The plan adopted at the meeting here last night is a far-reaching one, being carried out by the Realtors of Idaho Falls, who prize its merits in no uncertain terms. It was stated by Mr. Thomas, Friday.

BANKERS OF AMERICA ARRANGE HUGE LOAN

NEW YORK, Nov. 19 (AP)—A \$20,000,000 loan for the city of Yokohama has been arranged by American banks and probably will be placed on the market next week. J. P. Morgan and company are expected to head the offering.

The sale of the bonds will provide funds for reconstruction purposes, which were authorized soon after the 1923 earthquake. A \$100,000,000 Japanese government reconstruction loan made unnecessary any borrowing by individuals since that time.

Kengo Mori, Japanese financial controller in the United States, conducted the negotiations for the Yokohama loan.

Bad Checks to Deck Walls in Office of Credit Association

Several hundred bad checks, some of which are forgeries and others that have been returned to their issuers because of insufficient funds in the bank account of the issuer, aggregating nearly \$10,000 are to adorn the walls of the office of J. H. Hughes, secretary of the Twin Falls County Creditors' association. Mr. Hughes stated in an address at a dinner meeting of the organization in Twin Falls Thursday evening. The public will be invited to view the checks, to inspect the collection and note the signatures with the hope that practice on the part of persons who issued the checks will not continue. The association, during the period beginning January 1, of the year and ending November 15, received 7,200 direct queries from outside companies as regards the status of persons holding credit in this section.

MURPHY AIRSHIP CAR TO USE AS MOTOR BOAT

AKRON, Ohio, Nov. 19 (AP)—An all-metal airship car, designed for army and navy training duties, under construction by the Goodyear-Zeppelin works here, is so designed that it will be detachable from the bag of a dirigible and can be used as a motor boat. The cabin unit will be operated like a submarine except that instead of propellers above the water will give it motive power.

The car is especially designed for coastal use. In time of war it could be used rapidly as a surface craft and within a few minutes' time attached again to a dirigible for air service. If the dirigible became disabled, or the car would act as a boat, using the dirigible bag as a sail. The car is being constructed of duralumin throughout.

FINDS SOURCES OF NEGRO LORE

Ohio Professor Lays at Door of White Man Major Portion of Black Superstition.

CLEVELAND, Nov. 20 (AP)—The greater mass of the southern negro's superstitions and folk-tales are attributable to the white man and to Africa, says Dr. N. N. Puckett, professor of sociology at Western Reserve university.

Only the platypus voodoo beliefs and a few general folk-tales are African in origin, he declares in a book written at Cleveland, is a thing of the past in America.

Voodooism Vanishing.
"White and black, the fear-spirit of voodooism is vanishing. 'Orange superstitions, cheating' rites in the southland," writes Dr. Puckett, but voodooism as a cult, formed by man's devil worship, is a thing of the past in America.

Race Pride Helping.
"Line by line, increasing knowledge and pride of race are forever erasing these records of folk thought," Dr. Puckett made a special study of voodooism and for some time became a voodoo doctor in New Orleans as one means of obtaining data for his book. Research was made into all published sources of African and American negro lore.

He tells of some of the old "recipes" of voodoo lore. "How to make a cross to ward off evil spirits," he says, "is to sweep down the chimney in the house, or build a fire in a stump on a cloudy day."

Some Old 'Recipes.'
Agricultural hints: Peppers must be planted by an angry person, or harvested or red-haired person, or they will not grow well. Let children plant large vegetables, and they will grow with the children.

Advice to the husband: Hair from your lover's head placed under the hand of your hat, worn in your purse, or in your pocket, secured your heart, or build a fire in a stump on a cloudy day.

SPAN BUILDERS LAUNCH ACTIVE WORK AT SITE

Construction of Roads to
Bridgeheads, Preparations for
Building Anchorages and
Camp Claim Attention.

Development in connection with construction of the proposed Twin Falls-Jerome county \$250,000 toll bridge to span Snake river canyon at Blue Lake, three miles south of here, are moving rapidly since the arrival the first of this week of Charles G. Baker of Portland, president of the Tabor Bridge company, and L. E. Murray, president of construction, and J. S. Tabor, resident engineer for the Twin Falls-Jerome district bridge company which has been organized to build and operate the big span.

Excavations are being made for foundation of road between improved road south of Jerome and the recently completed roadway that has been blasted through lava rock to the north bridgehead, and fences have been removed on the property purchased from L. C. Tabor for sight of way for the road to the south bridgehead.

A blacksmith shop has been erected at the south bridgehead and construction of other buildings for the camp at the south bridgehead will proceed as rapidly as possible.

Preparations for Blasting
Preparations are being completed for blasting on the rimrock on either side of the canyon to provide anchorages for the big bridge.

Rainfall Is Heavy During November

MAKES DOUGHNUTS WITH AUTOMATIC MACHINERY

The first automatic doughnut frying machine to be installed in this territory has been installed by the Royal Bakery to be used in making of Smith's "Downy Flake" doughnuts. The device has been installed in quarters at 136 Main avenue east, and the new doughnut shop will be opened to the public today. The shop will be operated under management of Merrill Ayres, and the product will be sold at retail at the shop and at wholesale to restaurants and dealers.

The device occupies a position in the window where its operation from the moment the dough is dropped into the hot vegetable grease until the finished product is delivered without being touched by hands may be observed by passersby.

The machine has a capacity of from 25 to 40 dozen doughnuts an hour. The device has been perfected only recently after years of experimentation. It has only recently been made available outside of the larger centers in which it has been introduced.

NEW HOME FOR KRENGEL PLANT

Construction of \$20,000 Building for Pioneer Machine Works to Begin Soon.

A new home for the Krengel Machine company—a structure of reinforced concrete, 75,000 feet in dimension, involving an expenditure of approximately \$20,000, is to be built at once on the site of the company's present quarters on Second avenue south. It was announced Friday. Construction, under direction of Ernest White and Company, will begin next Monday and it is anticipated that the structure will be completed within five or six weeks.

The structure will be built around and over the Krengel Machine company's present home which includes the original building erected in 1907 by the late E. E. Krengel, founder of the establishment, which since his death has been carried on and developed under management of his son, Captain Charles H. Krengel. The present building will be razed after completion of the new structure, so that the company's operations may be carried on without interruption during the construction period.

The new building, it is believed, will be the only one of its kind in the western states.

It will be divided into two sections, one for the accommodation of the machine works and blacksmith shop, and the other for the warehouse stock that is to be expanded.

Exterior of the front elevation will be of California stucco of buff color with white marble cement capings and precast cement ornamentation. Large steel sash factory type windows will be installed together with lighting of modern type construction on the roof to provide abundant lighting.
