Twin Falls Bruins Win STAGE SET FOR Southern Championship

Plastino Squad Triumphs Over Filer Wildcats, 6 to 0, Clinching Gridiron Title for South Half of Idaho.

A weary and shattered Bruin eleven trudged home from the Whitehat last night with a 6 to 0 victory and the championship of southern Idaho tucked in their hip pockets. It was a hard-fought victory, but the superior kicking of the Bruins made victory possible for the Bruins. Harvard, off to an unimpressive start, lost to Geneva and Yale twice, suffered a defeat to Cornell, and then slipped to Princeton, Yale, taking the latter and of the team opened with

two wins over Boston University, Georgetown and Dartmouth, only to be dashed by three unexpected season defeats at the hands of Brown, Army and Maryland.

Yale Breaks Crimson Rule

Harvard's losing period of occupancy under its old gridiron rule, beginning only in 1916 to Yale's 63 victory, of 1924 Black's team, came to an end in 1925, where the Harvard rapped off

its 15th triumph. Since then the Harvard team has been unable to beat Yale, although the Harvard team

END INSURANCE SESSIONS



DESIGN AIRSHIP CAR TO USE AS MOTOR BOAT

SPAN BUILDERS LAUNCH ACTIVE WORK AT SITE

Construction of Roads to Bridgeheads, Preparations for Building Anchorage and Camp Claim Attention.

Developments in connection with construction of the proposed Twin Falls-Teton county \$25,000 toll bridge to span Snake river canyon at Blue Lakes, three miles north of here, are moving rapidly since the arrival last Friday of this week of Charles G. Hobart of Portland, president of the Pioneer Bridge company, and of the surveyor and engineer of construction, and L. E. Tabb, resident engineer for the Twin Falls-Jerome Intercounty Bridge company which has been organized to build and operate the big span.

The first work to be done will be construction of road between imperial road south of Jerome and the recently completed roadway that has been blasted through the base rock to the south. Hobart and Tabb have been retained on the property purchased from F. C. Davis for right of way for the road to the south bridgehead.

A blacksmith shop has been erected in the south bridgehead and construction of other buildings for the camp at the south bridgehead will proceed as rapidly as possible.

Preparations are being completed for blasting on the rimrock on either side of the canyon to provide anchorage for the bridge.

R. M. Murray, bridge engineer who designed the span, and to whom the franchise for its construction was issued by the commissioners of Jerome and Twin Falls counties only a very few days ago, is expected to arrive sometime Saturday to remain on the ground during the construction operations.

NEW HOME FOR KRENGEL PLANT

Construction of \$20,000 Building for Pioneer Machine Works to Begin Soon.

A new home for the Krengel Manufacturing Company, a structure of reinforced concrete, 75x50 feet in dimensions, approximately \$20,000, is to be built at once on the site of the company's present quarters on Second Avenue, which it was moved to Friday, October 21st. The new plant, directed by Ernest White and Company, will begin next Monday and it is anticipated that the structure will be completed within five or six weeks.

The structure will be built around a large steel frame, which includes the original building erected in 1907 by the late E. E. Krengel, founder of the establishment, which since his death has been carried on and enlarged under the management of his son, Captain Charles H. Krengel. The present building will be removed after completion of the new structure, so that the company's operations may be conducted in one building during the construction period.

The new building, it is believed, will be the only one of its kind in the western states.

It will be divided into two sections, one for the preparation of the dough, another for the baking shop, and the other for the hardware store, that is to be expanded.

The structure of the front elevation will be of California stone, buff colored, with white cement rendering and steel and cement ornamentation. Large steel sun factory type windows will be installed together with lighting of monitor type construction on the roof to provide abundant lighting.

The structure will be equipped with a large oven, a large fryer and a large deep fat fryer.
