

DESTROYERS TO STAND GUARD IN CHINESE CRISIS

American Warships Truxton and Pope Ordered to Proceed to Hankow to Aid in Protection of Foreigners.

(By The Associated Press)

Peking, Nov. 20.—The American destroyers Truxton and Pope have been ordered to proceed up the Yang-tze River to Hankow, 785 miles inland, to aid other foreign warships in protecting foreigners on a cruise of 1915.

Hundreds of miles away, in Fukien province, Chinese officers of Marshal Sunchuan Fang have professed their inability to guarantee safety of foreigners at Fou Chow, which is menaced by the advance of the victorious

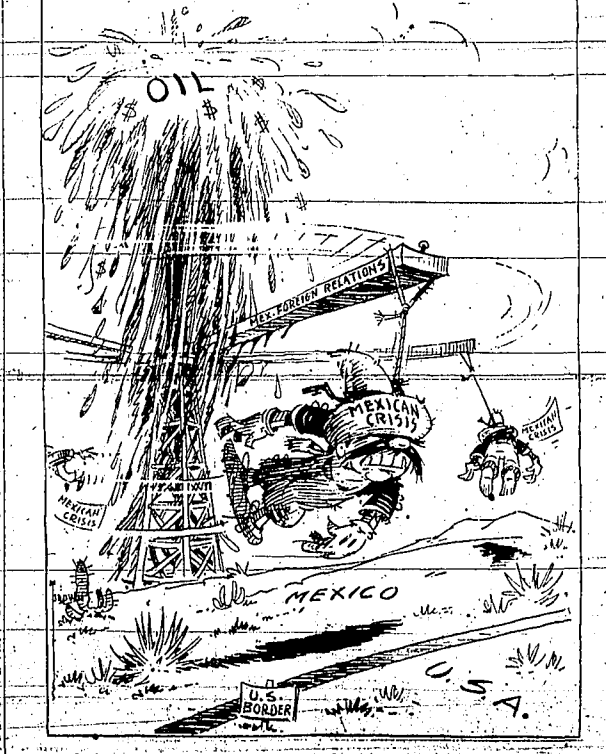

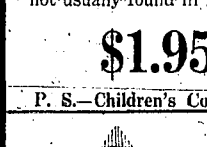

Brand Discusses Italian Temper at Chamber's Session

PARIS, Nov. 30 (AP)—Italy has the right to show her temper, but not too often or too much, Foreign Minister Brandi today told the Chamber of Deputies. At the same time he gently warned that France does not take kindly to attacks on her legations in foreign countries such as recently occurred in the Italian town of Ventimiglia after the recent attempted assassination of Premier Mussolini.

Congratulating himself on "keeping cool" after the Ventimiglia incident, the foreign minister added with a touch of humor lightning his warning sentences.

"Nevertheless there are things that must be said. Any country has the right to have the kind of government it pleases. It even has the right to have attacks of temper, but there comes a time when it must stop."

"We will consider that her family quarrels have gone far enough and ought to cease," he said in answer to one question, while to another he remarked:

"Candidates, embassies and legations are places that people are accustomed to respect because of diplomatic regulations. There were unpleasant demonstrations. Our ambassador made representations and received satisfactory results. Relations were resumed and all is well."

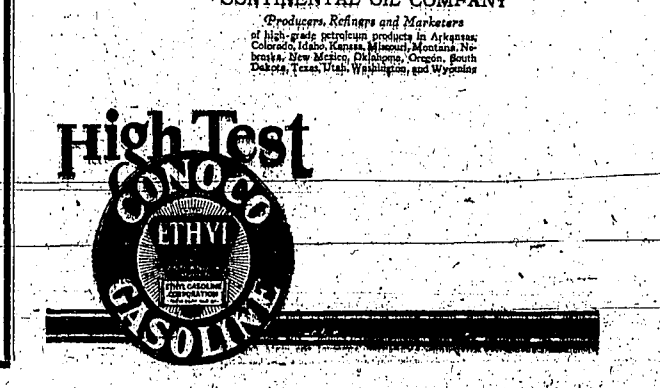

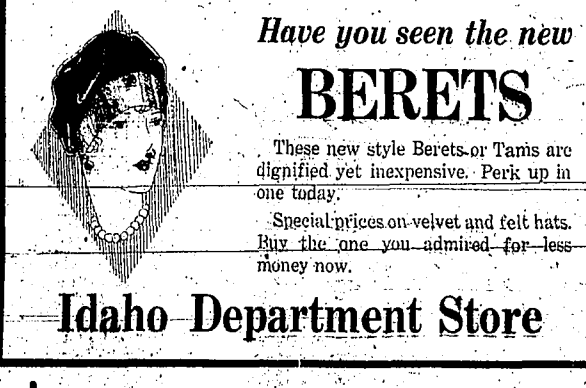

BERLIN, Nov. 30. (AP)—Dr. Boll, recently appointed minister of the occupied zone and one of the signatories of the Versailles treaty, made a powerful appeal in the Reichstag today for the evacuation of the Rhineland.

By signing the Locarno convention and entering the league of nations Germany he contended had paid sufficiently for evacuation. He described the situation in the Rhineland as a nightmare. The plight of the Rhinelanders he declared was terrible and they were greatly excited over recent excesses committed by the French occupation forces.

In conclusion he exclaimed: "There can be no understanding of France only if occupation disappears in a day."

SEVENTY-FIVE AIRPLANES

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Nov. 30. (AP)—Seventy-five airplanes from the flying fields here will start in the first hop of the army's aerial tour of South America, which it leaves Munich field here at noon December 15.

Dudley Field Malone, appearing as Tunney's attorney, today consented to an adjournment of the case on condition that the police in the interim "would not break up the show."

FORECASTS SHARP TILT
ON PROHIBITION ISSUE

NEW YORK, Nov. 30. (AP)—A sharp tilt between democrats and republicans on the liquor issue is being forecast today by Republican presidential campaign manager Al Smith, democratic candidate, and the republican battling both men, one forecast today by Representative Hamilton Fish, Jr.

The republican candidate, Al Smith, is expected to win the election, but the republican party of New York is expected to win the election by playing "a loose game" in the coming year and to "concentrate" on the liquor issue.

A subcommittee, to be headed by the republican candidate, is expected to introduce a bill to amend the plan, which will provide funds to meet demands already granted by the German-American national claims commission.

KEEPING OUT OF WAR

Commenting on some remarks of an American college professor of responsibility for the World War, a Toronto newspaper makes this impressive point:

"It is a remarkable phenomenon that so many otherwise intelligent people, both here and in Britain, have developed in the years which have elapsed since the Armistice an apparent disposition to regard the war as a mistake which might and ought to have been avoided, and a mistake which they could see themselves repeating. It cannot be sufficiently emphasized that such a view rests upon no moral or rational foundation, and that, given precisely the same conditions, the British people, in which we include Canada and the Empire, would have an alternative choice consistent with honor and righteousness, and for the maintenance of which in this national life there can be no price too high."

Many Americans today are inclined to apply to similar factors of the entrance of the United States into the war, evidently assuming that our country could have kept out, or would have kept out, except for the more or less accidental or willful action of that or that person or group.

The fact is, probably, that our participation in the war, as it developed, was almost as inevitable as the great battle of Marston. It occurred inevitably, then, to an overwhelming majority of Americans, and nothing but forgetfulness now will pronounce it otherwise. Not physical necessity, but moral necessity, rendered it a national state of mind.

Unless human nature has changed marvelously all at once, it will probably be the same if another great war ever develops. The thing to do is to stop complaining about the past and try to shape things so as to prevent the start of another war.

TRUCK CHIVALRY

Princess Hanna of Rumania had a car accident when driving on an Indian highway, when she ran into a truck and was seriously injured. PRACTICAL FARM AID

Congress will be asked soon to appropriate \$100,000,000 for a national fight against the European corn worm. This is a worthy cause and the practical form of farm relief, in which Congress should take a serious interest.

This pest is already spreading west and south. It infests almost all corn and many million acres of land. If not stopped, it will inevitably sweep over the whole country and ruin the greatest of American farm crops.

Top million farmers are not much for such a contest. It would serve, however, to pay for what is most needed—adequate governmental direction of the war against the corn borer, with publicity and money regarding the best methods and materials to use. The bulk of the work must naturally be done by the local authorities of the various states and communities affected, and by individual farmers.

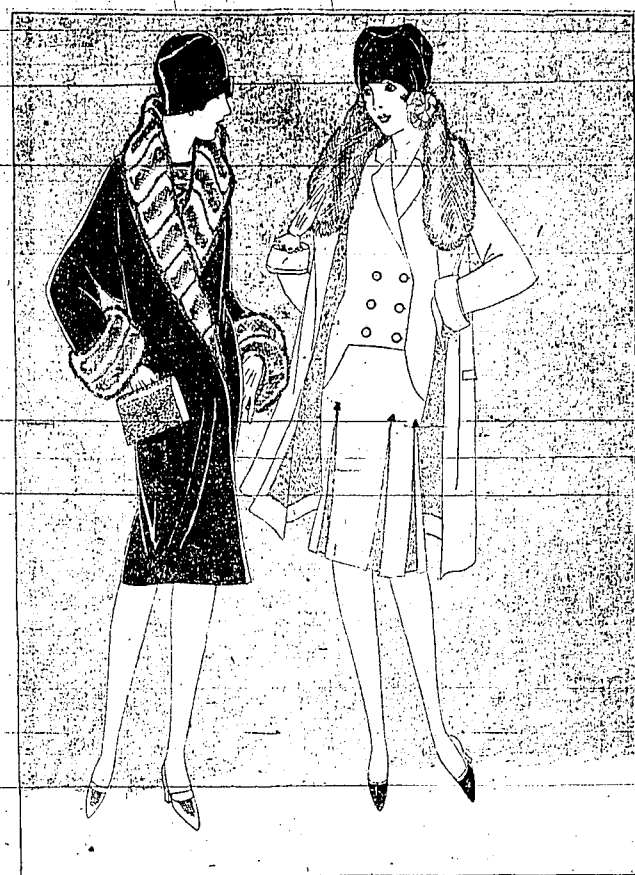

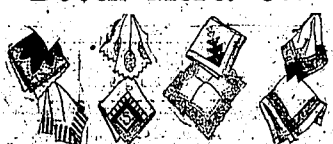

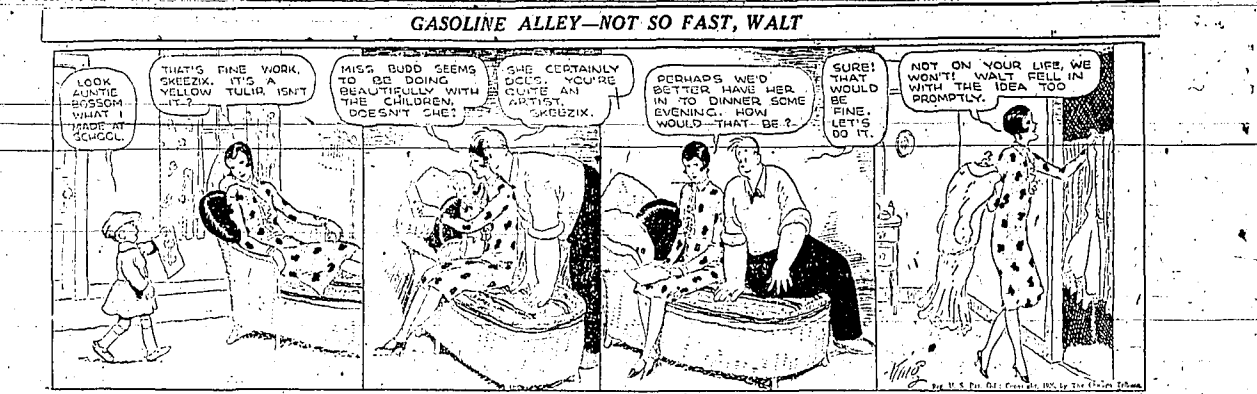
