

COURT DECISION AGAINST TAX ON STORED WATERS

Wyoming Counties Meet Defeat in Attempt to Collect \$100,- 000 Levy on Jackson Lake From Idaho Canal Companies

Attempt by Lincoln and Teton counties, Wyoming, to tax storage water rights in Jackson Lake reservoir has been defeated by decision rendered by the United States circuit court of appeals in St. Louis, Mo., according to a Press dispatch received here Tuesday.

The decision grants the prayer of the complainants, Twin Falls Canal company and North Side Canal company, that the Wyoming counties be restrained from levying or collecting taxes on the Jackson lake rights.

(CHICAGO, Dec. 21.—Two of the greatest baseball players in the history of the game, Ty Cobb and Tris Speaker, today were named by Commissioner K. M. Landis in an expose of a scandal that went back to 1919, the year charged by former baseball world's series between the White Sox and Cincinnati Reds.

Both Resign This Year
Cobb, until after the close of the 1926 season, was manager of the Detroit club and a star player on it for 20 years, while Speaker held the same managerial position with Cleveland. Both resigned suddenly after the finish of the 1926 season in Cleveland. The scandal, breaking today, was the third that has rocked the major leagues since the landing force of the eight "White Sox" players for conspiracy to throw the 1919 world series. The sum of money involved in the latest scandal was \$100,000, but by Leonard, one time Tiger, pitcher, and Wood against \$200 on the Tigers to win. Detroit won the game.

The scandal came to light when Leonard, pressing a claim against the Detroit club, turned over two letters, one from Cobb, the other from Speaker. These letters were presented to a secret meeting of the board of directors of the American league, held here last September. Ben Johnson, American league president, immediately presented them to Commissioner Landis for investigation.

MONEY AND ESTEEM

Americans give are notoriously lavish in their methods of welcoming celebrities to their midst or paying homage to the good and the brave. But now and then something happens to make citizens wonder whether the right expression of respect have been shown and whether the end sought is sufficiently well served to be worth the high cost.

Much thoughtfulness has been forced in New York by the recent refusal of the Comptroller to approve several bills incurred by the city in welcoming the late General Pershing. The bills totaled into thousands of dollars. They included such items as special offering of the freedom of the city and costing nine hundred thirty-five dollars, flowers for wives of the honored ones at fifty dollars, auto hire for cars "never used" at six hundred ninety-eight dollars, gold-plated badges at one hundred thirty dollars and fifty cents, stenographic reports of the funeral, words of speakers at forty-five dollars, flagstaff at the mayor at fifty dollars, flowers and sandwiches at three hundred thirty-five dollars and fifty cents, and so on. It may be an unusually long list, but other cities probably have had their own pretty good list.

Some of the visitors so extensively welcomed are of really great value—for example, Captain Fritz and Chief Officer Miller of the Roosevelt. Certain royal visitors, too, seem to justify a little special expenditure. But when the custom is extended to movie and vaudeville stars, and actors and actresses and everybody that has broken into sudden popular approval, it begins to look a little foolish.

And even when honoring such worthy heroes as the brave men from the Roosevelt—just how much respect, esteem and honor can be expressed in a single hundred thirty-five dollar bill is not so certain. Especially when, as is charged, the words of praise are couched in poor English. Our standards for such things are a bit different. We think that money and gift and button and badge can express deep feeling better than bare words, respectful silence, honest tears and proud and loyal hearts.

THE RUMANIAN CRISIS

Queen Marie's "dignity" of America created greater curiosity about her own country than Americans had ever felt before. Her return home, with the conflicting reports regarding the health of King Ferdinand and the complicated political situation there, has intensified the interest.

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"An impatient leader, weary of a schilling conflict with an infantile land of energy, ambition and a determination, married by bad judgment; a young gentleman (the crown prince) with no particular qualification for leadership, moreover, devoted to martyrdom through exile and distant from a throne which neither inclination nor temperament adapted him to fill very acceptably; a devoted wife and healthy five-year-old son, about whose head are already gathering the rivalries and strife that seem the inevitable lot of minor rulers—these are the leading personal factors which the politicians of Rumania are trying to manipulate today."

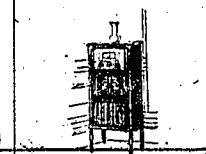
Banquet Second Day

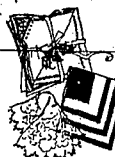

Twin Falls Canal company will not forfeit a credit of \$200,000 would be immediately receive \$200,000 in money on account of the American Falls rebate. The company's stockholders decided to accept the rebate in money instead of additional storage water rights in the reservoir, but funds for payment of the rebate in money will be derived from sale of surplus water rights in the reservoir.

This, as well as other essential facts in regard to the rebate on which the stockholders will vote at their annual meeting here in January, is set forth in a statement issued Tuesday by the canal company's directors.

The water laws of the Twin Falls Canal company have been sold, having the amount of \$200,000. It is estimated that the actual cost of construction will be approximately \$25 per acre foot.

This credit can be realized upon in either of two ways, namely:

1. The Twin Falls Canal company may purchase additional water at the ultimate initial cost, which, as stated, is estimated to be \$25 per acre foot.

2. The Twin Falls Canal company may demand and receive the money for its credit of \$200,000. The money can be paid upon the following terms:

First, out of the first water sold from the rebate water, which the American Falls reservoir is to receive, the United States will pay itself \$500,000, with interest at 6 per cent per annum.

This is the amount of money that the United States paid for the construction of the large dam over and under the smaller dam.

As the remainder of the water is sold and paid for, the Twin Falls Canal company will receive its credit in money.
