JUDGE DISMISSES CHARGES AGAINST TEMPLE LEADERS

Criminal Conspiracy Case of Mrs. Aimee Semple McPherson, Evangelist, Transferred to Court of Public Opinion.

(By The Associated Press) LOS ANGELES, Jan. 10.—The case against Aimee Semple McPherson, evangelist who recently was held for trial on a criminal conspiracy charge, today was transferred on request of the city's chief prosecutor from the law courts of California to the court of public opinion.

Superior Judge Albert Lee Stephens, an eminent Los Angeles attorney, has today dismissed all the charges against the evangelist, her mother, Mrs. M. L. Kennedy, Kenneth C. Orin, and Mrs. Lorraine Wisconsin Siefert, charging an attempt to defraud the members of the Pentecostal church and to defraud the public.

It is noted that Mrs. McPherson's chief counsel, the Rev. J. H. McPherson, today was transferred to the court of public opinion. He is charged with the same offenses as his wife, but his case is being handled separately.

CHAPLIN'S WIFE WANTS DIVORCE

Estranged Spouse of Motion Picture Comedian Files Separation Suit in Los Angeles.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 10.—A suit for divorce was filed today by the estranged wife, Lita Grey Chaplin, in which she made sensational charges against the film comedian.

The complaint in the divorce suit covered 42 pages, and included a list of the charges against the comedian. It alleged that he had been guilty of adultery, and that he had been guilty of other offenses.

FARM AID BILL GETS ATTENTION

McNary-Haugen Measure Up for Consideration in House Committee; Hear Complaints

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—The pending farm relief question, which has puzzled the house of legislators for more than three years, will be thrust forward with renewed force tomorrow when the house agriculture committee begins consideration of the new McNary-Haugen bill.

The situation has been complicated by the lack of a unanimous endorsement from leading agricultural organizations of any one measure and the pressure today to complete the bill.

The complaints were precipitated by the appearance before the committee of L. J. Tolson, president of the national farmers union, who submitted the nation's agriculture bill to the committee.

FOREIGNERS IN DANGER IN ALL PARTS OF CHINA

Agitation Against Whites Is Spreading Rapidly Over Interior: British Missionaries Leave Their Posts.

(By The Associated Press) BEKING, Jan. 10.—Agitation against foreigners is spreading rapidly over interior China and their condition has become precarious in a large area. Dispatches from foreign officials at Hankow received today stated that the British were leaving their installations from all places they could reach in the province of Hupoh, Hainan and Szechwan in the Yangtze river basin, and from Fukien province, along the coast.

American and British women and children fleeing abroad river steamers to escape flooding, famine, and looting, have arrived in Shanghai to receive protection of white residents there.

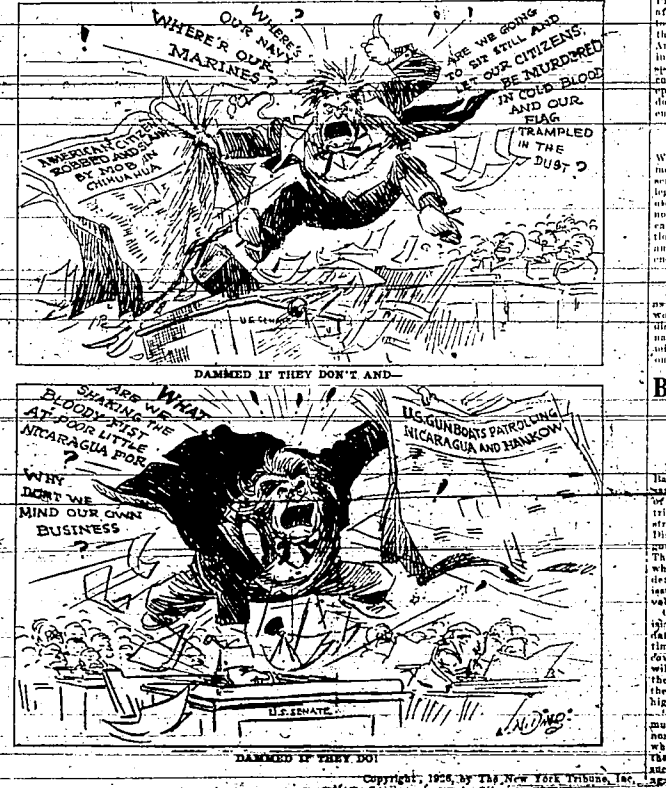

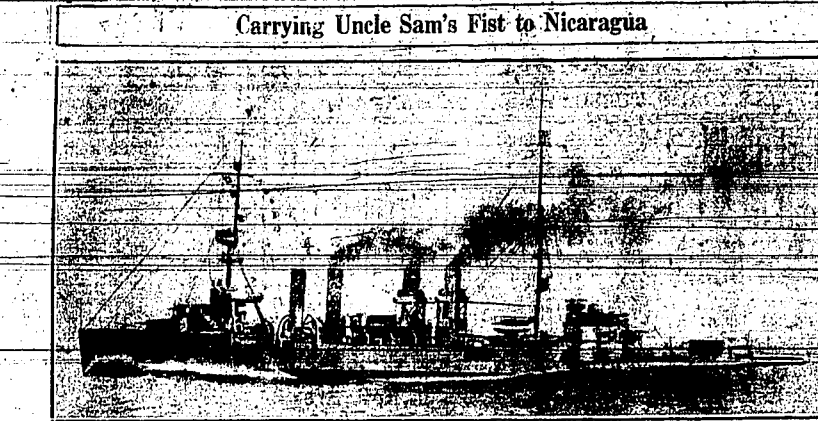

## Jose F. Gaudra Proclaimed Chief of Military Operations in Revolutionary Manifesto

EL PASO, Texas, Jan. 10 (AP)—A manifesto announcing a revolution had been drafted in Mexico for Ayu Gaudra, an El Paso business man who is proclaimed chief of military operations for the revolt. The manifesto recognized Rene Capistran Garza of Mexico City as provisional president of the movement.

Gaudra went to El Paso on Sunday as the manifesto was issued. He was said to be trying to enter Mexico at some point east of El Paso, but Major J. J. Gaudra, chief of staff of General James Lopez, commander of the Juarez military garrison, and other recently entered Mexico he would be essential. Major Lopez declared all talk of a revolt in Mexico was nonsense and that neither Gaudra or Garza had any following.

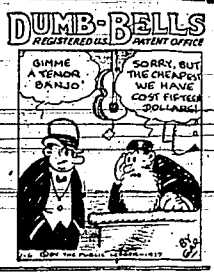

# EARLY MORNING BLAZE DESTROYS DANCE PAVILION

## Fire, Thought to Be of Incendiary Origin, Reduces Rainbow Gardens to Ashes; Accident Puts Fire Engine Out.

Fire, believed to be of incendiary origin, leveled the Rainbow Gardens dance pavilion, on the highway to Twin Falls, during the early hours of Monday morning. The structure, valued at \$2000, was completely destroyed. The loss was almost entirely covered by insurance.

The Rainbow Gardens is the third dance hall that has been destroyed by fire here during the past five years. Officers last evening, held in several instances during the past two months, of which goods have been dealt with firmly by Ezra Rapp, owner and manager of the hall.

### Truck Hits Rock

Twin Falls fire department responded to the scene of the blaze at 7:30 o'clock Monday morning with the only available fire engine. Although the engine was confined to a small section of the burning structure, it was not until a few minutes after the alarm had been turned in by a traveler passing by, that the fire was brought under control. The driver of the fire truck was attempting to reach the back of the building when it was intended to pump water to be used in extinguishing the flame, the truck came on the engine was mired in crossing the rough ground by a projecting rock and the fire engine was out of action. Water supply available from the little stream running past the pavilion a few feet below where the building was destroyed.

### Wind Tears Flames

Forty-five minutes after the fire was discovered, it was reported to the fire station. The building was totally enveloped in flames which were easily visible from any point in Twin Falls. Destruction was facilitated by a perceptible wind from the southwest which fanned the blaze, to intensify and carry it to the westward. After the fire was first noticed nothing remained but smoldering ruins. The hall destroyed last night by the fire, was burned here during the last five years. The structure was burned during the year 1922 by a fire of unknown origin and in 1914 the hall operated on Third avenue, west by James Gallagher, was completely destroyed by a fire of unknown origin.

### Opened Thanksgiving Day

The first dance was held in the hall Thanksgiving day immediately following completion of construction work. The building was of imposing architecture and on the interior the decorations and built-in features were a work of art.

The following morning, at that hour the fire in the two dance halls had been extinguished and preparations in the way of warming the place for the dance which was to have been given last night had not been started. The blaze evidently started near the rear of the building, near the entrance of the hall.
