VALUATION OF HIGHWAY BONDS IS UNDERTAKEN

Following Request of Governor Baldridge for Immediate Action, House Judiciary Committee Introduces Measure.

(By The Associated Press.) TWIN FALLS, Jan. 11 (AP)—The valuation of Idaho highway bonds is being undertaken and legalizing existing highway district organizations were introduced in the request of Governor H. C. Baldridge when the judiciary committee introduced a bill on Tuesday.

Delivers Special Message He earnestly recommended to the legislature that it be called immediately so that holders of the obligations of the state of Idaho, and of any of its public corporations, might be relieved of their obligations.

The legislature first enacted the present highway district law in 1911. Governor Baldridge said, "In the first place, the bill is designed to correct all defects in the present highway district law and to maintain the legal, constitutional and moral integrity of the state of Idaho."

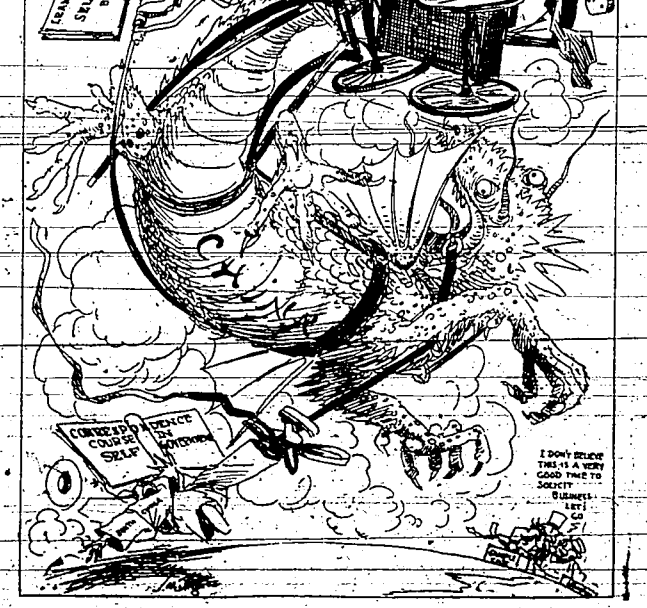

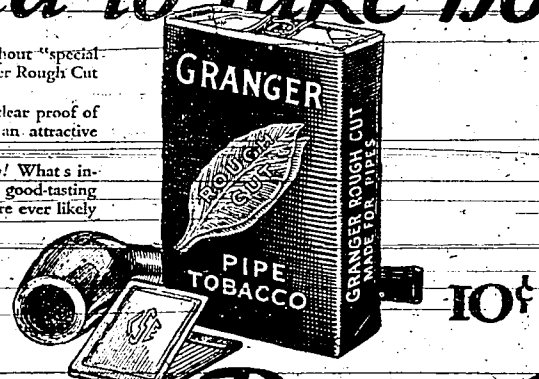

Twin Falls Canal company received its 1926-27 Annual Report, 92,400 acre-feet of water and from American Falls reservoir 90,900 acre feet in addition to its normal water rights to make an average 81.70 per cent water delivery during the past season. The annual report, containing a season of water precipitation, and the annual report of Barton Smith, general manager, submitted Tuesday before the company's stockholders at an annual meeting here.

Water Drawn from Jackson Lake Reservoir Included 19,420 Acre-Feet

Water drawn from Jackson Lake reservoir included 19,420 acre-feet as compared with 18,700 acre-feet in 1925. The surplus water was exchanged for surplus-normal flow for stored water in Jackson Lake reservoir.

Condensed Statement

The manager's report was a concise statement of conditions affecting operations of the Twin Falls irrigation system during the past season and at the present time. It expressed appreciation of the splendid cooperation of the board of directors, a large number of the stockholders and the members of the organization of water-masters and hydrographers. Statement of the company's providing an average of 81.70 per cent of the population of 250,720, as compared with 78.70 per cent in 1925, was included in the report.

Minimum Yield of the Report Is as Follows:

Jackson Lake Reservoir.
The latest reports show 92,840 acre-feet in storage as compared to 460,300 acre feet on the same date last year.

Precipitation from September 1, 1926, to January 1, 1927, is 40.12 inches.

Practically all of the storage was drawn out last season, there being 400 acre feet of storage in the reservoir on September 28 which belonged to the upper river interests. The greatest quantity stored in 1926 was 781,470 acre feet on May 21 or 22, and was filled when natural flow was released.

The exchange of natural flow for Jackson Lake storage was never permitted under the conditions of the exchange, but was practiced until priorities were cut off to the date of right of eminent domain in the case of the storage exchanged should be credited to the storage of this company and charged to the storage of the reservoir as a penalty for use of the reservoir and river, June, 1926.

From this surplus water, approximately 19,420 acre feet additional storage making about 92,400 acre feet which was "total received" from Jackson Lake by the company during the season of 1926.

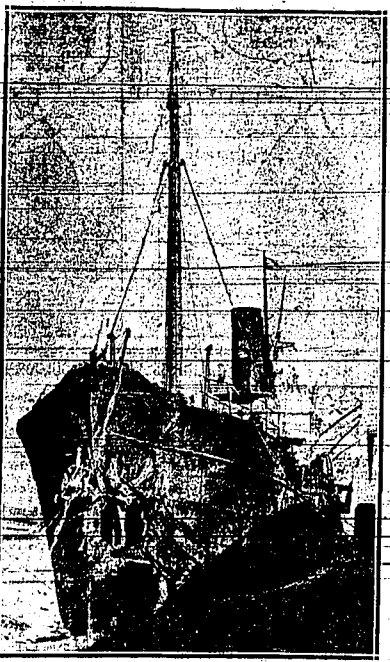

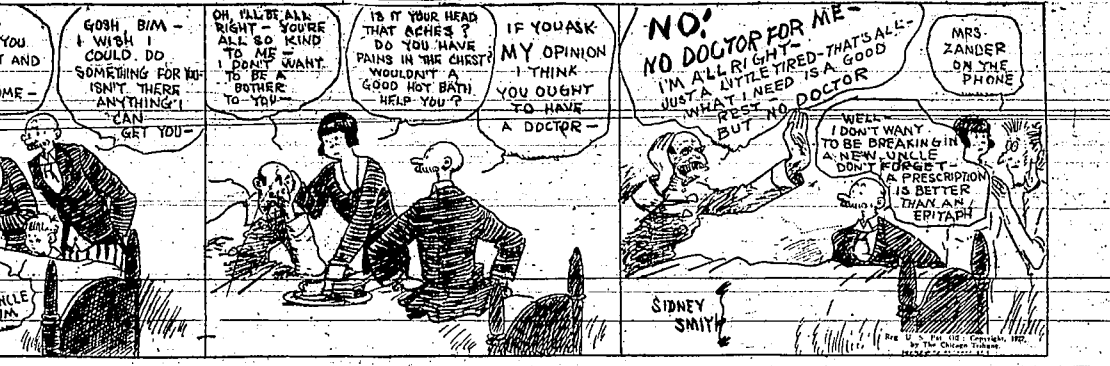
