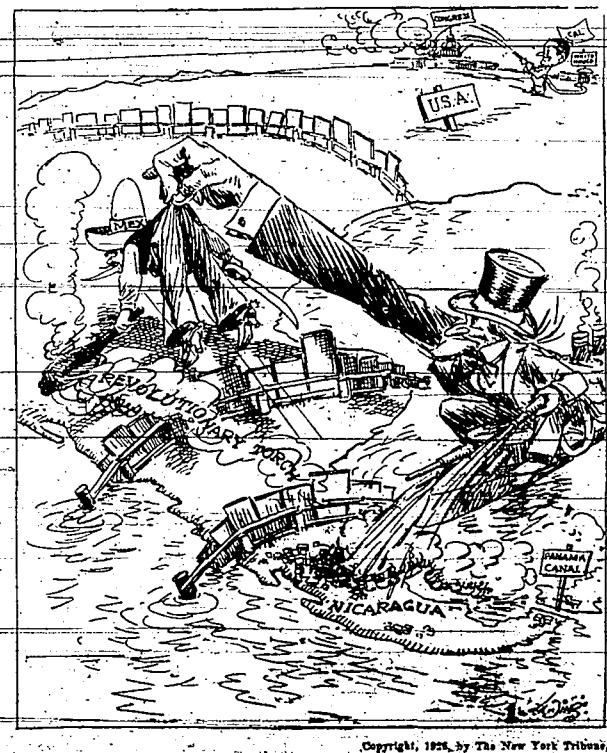

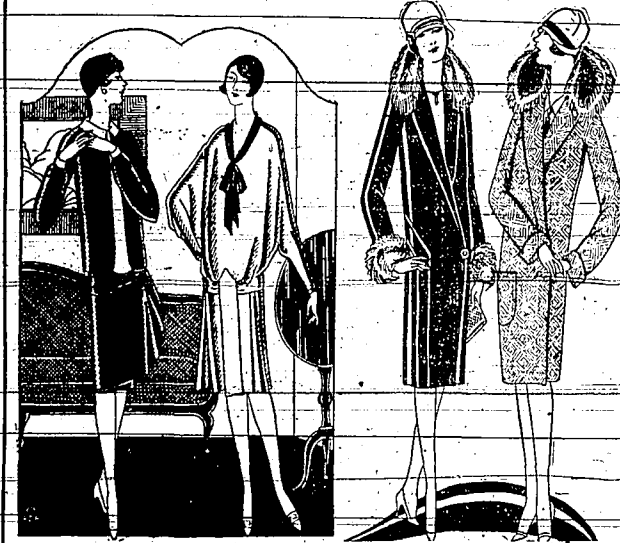

# CHAMBER SEEKS CITIZENS' VIEWS ON LEGISLATION

### Directors Take Action Looking Toward Revision of Consensus of Opinion Here Before State's Law Makers.

What do Twin Falls people think about city zoning legislation to define zones for water-borne business, with residential buildings and prevent encroachment of any other character? What are the citizens' views on possible changes in time for payment of taxes which now become due in December and June? A committee will be named to prepare a list of legislative proposals on matters of local interest, which, it was announced, must be introduced in the legislature.

Copies of the senate and house journals, containing complete record of all bills introduced in the Idaho legislature will be placed on file in chambers of committee offices, it was announced, for consultation of all persons interested in the legislative record.

### Out for Conventions

Twin Falls should capitalize its municipal attractions for visitors, including the scenic beauty of the Snake river 476 feet above the bed of the canyon that will be completed next fall, and should make arrangements for annual meetings and conventions of various state organizations, the directors agreed. It was decided to extend invitations to the Idaho Wood Growers' association and Idaho Cattlemen's association meeting in Weir, and to the All-Idaho Congress and Idaho Irrigation congress meetings in Boise next week, and to all other state organizations holding their annual meetings at the season.

The Twin Falls chamber will be represented at the All-Idaho congress and annual meeting of the Idaho State Chamber of Commerce in Boise, next Thursday by Asher R. Wilson, Avell Harbor and Secretary Norman W. Wight, it was decided.

In cooperation with Twin Falls county farmers' groups, the chamber, through its civic committee of which Harry Bennett is chairman, is making arrangements for accommodation and entertainment of more than 500 delegates and visitors who are expected to attend an annual meeting of the Idaho State Chamber of Commerce Monday.

The directors at this meeting accepted the resignation of W. A. Patrick as president of the board, and elected Asher R. Wilson, former president, to fill the vacancy. Mr. Patrick will continue as a member of the board of directors.

Approval was given by the directors to plans for a general membership and community public forum meeting of the chamber to be held on Wednesday evening, January 20.

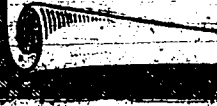

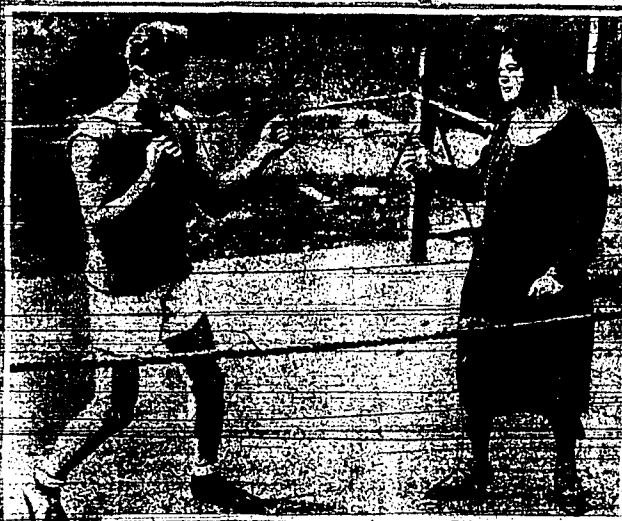

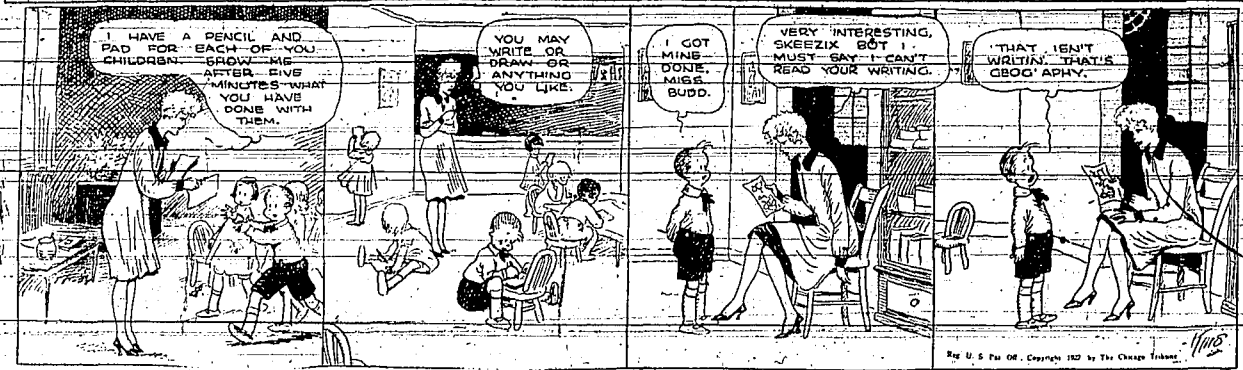

# ARMY NO PLACE FOR OFFENDERS

## Peace-Time Military Organization of Uncle Sam Not Correction House for Incurables

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8 (AP)—Parks who still harbor the notion that the army in peacetime is a sort of house of correction to which wayward youths can be committed to their financial and mental relief, of their long commutes are apt to fall foul of shouting and sometimes capricious Washington officials known to his intimates as "Corky" Davis. His official title is the chief general of the army. The names in the long list of names are: Davis, major general.

Among the puzzlingly diverse duties of his office is that of recruiting the army. Other complicated machinery works out how soldiers are to be fed, clothed, armed, equipped, disciplined, transported, organized, hospitalized, entertained, both retired and even buried. But it all begins with finding the young men to whom these processes are to be applied.

**Good Soldiers, Good Citizens**

"The 'Corky' Davis," says "Last year he collected and fed into the army machine nearly 60,000. Presently the vast majority of them will be good soldiers. Still later they will be successful civilians again, with honorable discharges to show.

"The 'Corky' Davis and his staff are able to guarantee it, they were all good citizens in height, with... If there was a physical defect or a mental deficiency in the lot, he steered it, somehow, through elaborate barriers erected to keep normally mentally and physically unfit out of the ranks of Uncle Sam's most-esteemed fighting machine.

**Critique Lenten Judges**

Within the last year, General Davis has personally investigated the operation of new, simplified, physiological tests designed to be run with less lax tenderness. It is a simple reduction of the army desertion and impairment rates, for one thing, and is so simple that recruits are beginning to show. It is quite natural, therefore, that he sees not where an instance comes in his mind of a soldier being off a minor offender against civil law on a promise of the captain to enlist in the army. "The general" speaks with all the vigor of a hard general, and phrases words—correspondence" engage. The adjutant general has had years of first-hand experience in dealing with the kind of soldiers Uncle Sam wants. He has been through the "infantry" drill with them from "drilled" second line" to brigades, command, even division for a time.

**Origin of "Corky's" Name**

The name "Corky" is a nickname, and "Corky" as probably significant in a slangy way of the kind of an adjutant general of the A. E. F. he made, or of his work now in Washington, N. D. It was hitched to him in West Point and has to do with his legs.

The immediate, rather edge-irregular white uniform pants of the West Pointers are the special pride of the most carefully dressed of the most successful class. Cadet Davis was, and still is, equipped with a pair of rather slender and very straight legs. They set off a pair of white ducks to admiration. "An evildoer and more bulky built could not more completely than he also could show end-of-class as white pants as well as a fine line of legs."

After that, of course, Cadet Davis became "Corky" Davis. Perfectly simple that "Corky" should follow "Corky" still for life.

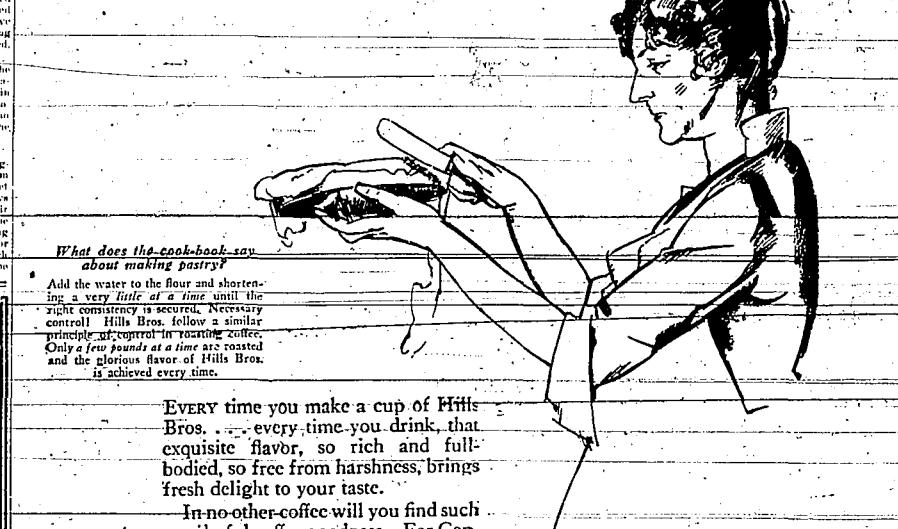

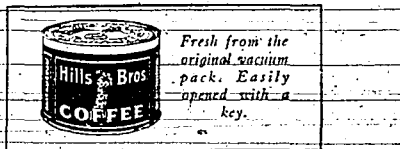

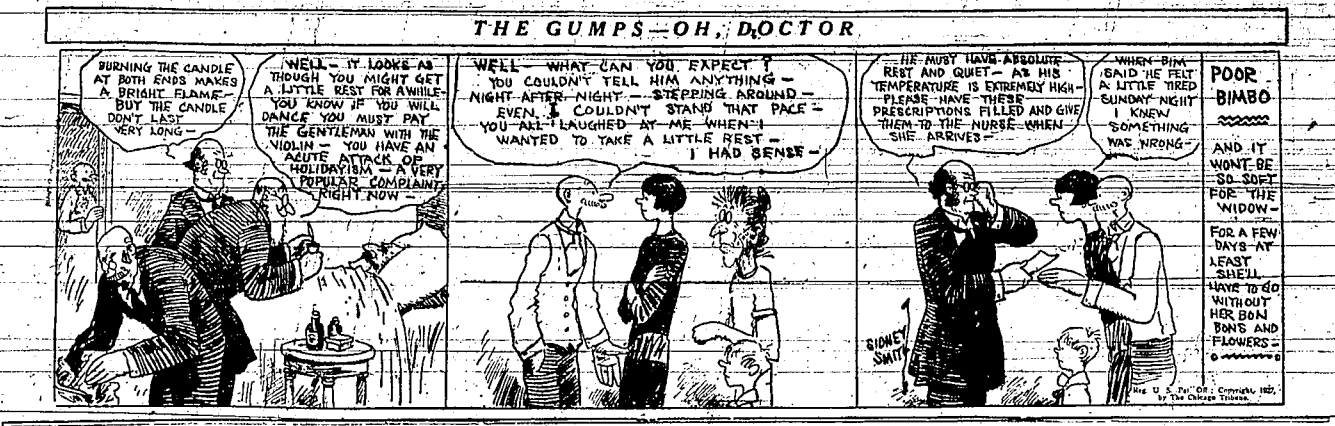
