Prosecution Strikes at Self-Defense Plea of Dr. Norris; Surprise Witness Tells Story; Defense Begins Today

(By The Associated Press) ASTORIA, Tenn., Jan. 14.—After presenting testimony striking at the self defense plea, the state closed its case here late today against Dr. Frank Norris, Baptist minister, for the killing of Dr. C. Chipps, lumberman, at Four Worth last July.

Testimony was adduced by the prosecution to show that the fundamentalist killed the unarmed man and his surprise witness declared on the stand that Dr. Norris fired the shots that ended Chipps' life as the latter was turning away to leave the defendant's church office.

The defense case will get under-way tomorrow. The defense contends that Dr. Norris killed Chipps in self defense, fearing that the lumberman had come to the church to kill him. No defense attorney to date has announced they would show that Chipps had threatened Dr. Norris.

Call Only Six Witnesses

The state's case was laid before the jury in whitewash fashion. Only six witnesses were called.

Mrs. Jessie Parker, widow of the judge who tried Parker of Twin Falls, who lives on a farm 22 miles from Twin Falls, was the only witness for the prosecution.

Mrs. Parker testified she witnessed the slaying as she called on Dr. Norris, the physician, with the purpose of having her farm house for a Sunday school.

As she stepped to the door of the ante-room leading to the parlor, she heard a noise and turned around, looking over the door of Norris' inner room and Chipps appeared.

"The man had one hand on the door knob," Mrs. Parker went on. "He stepped back and said, 'I am not in.'

"As the man said, 'I'll come back,' he turned slightly as though to carry his words into effect. His hand was raised in a gesture. Just then there was a flash of a gun. Shots were fired in rapid succession.

"The man staggered. That was all I know. I fled down the staircase. Dr. Norris was about five feet from me when he fell."

Defense attorneys failed to shake her testimony.

PROSPECTS FOR BEET CROP HERE NEXT YEAR GOOD

Walter Carter, United States Entomologist, Makes First Definite Forecast After Two Years' Resident Study

Prospects are favorable for successful production of beets in Twin Falls during the coming year, said Walter Carter, United States entomologist, who held a meeting of 30 beet growers at Rupert, Paul and Durley districts at luncheon in the Park hotel here Friday. Carter's forecast, the first after two years' study established here, was good for the purpose of establishing a forecasting station and of carrying on an investigation with view to ensuring the welfare of the beet crop.

W. S. Swedden, district manager for the Amalgamated Sugar Company, who spoke briefly at the Thursday noon meeting, expressed himself favorably as to the reliability of Mr. Carter's findings, after going over the scientist's mass of accumulated evidence. Mr. Swedden further stated that farmers of this section would be urged strongly to plant beets during the coming year.

"In my opinion," Mr. Carter stated, "the coming year will be very favorable for production of beets. This opinion is based upon results obtained during the winter months, its habitat, influence of weather conditions during the past two years and a study of climatic records and beet yields in this locality covering the last ten years."

"The purpose of the government investigation here," Mr. Carter continued, "is to provide a forecasting service to enable the beet growers and sugar companies to plan their operations for the coming year. It is realized that much remains to be done in the way of getting the forecast accurate in every detail, but it is believed that the preliminary work has been done in setting up forecasting for next year to start."

Mr. Swedden, manager of the sugar company, in commenting on the report of Mr. Carter Thursday evening, stated:
