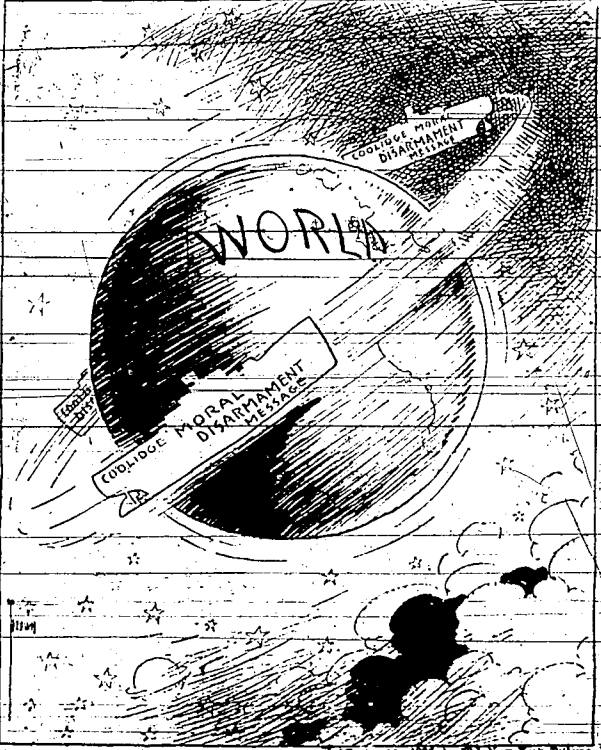

TO DEFENSE OF TARIFF BOARD

William Burgess Tells Investigating Body, Critics Are Guilty of Acts in Complaint.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17 (AP)—In a defense of the tariff commission, in which he formerly served as a Republican from Pennsylvania, William Burgess today told a Senate investigating committee that critics of the commission had been guilty of the practices about which they themselves complained.

The whole inquiry, he said, was inspired from within the commission, for the sinister purpose of discrediting its members and "preventing" handling and handling.

Tells Only Part of Story
Mr. Burgess charged that William S. Dill, former commissioner and now a Republican senator, who had participated in the sugar case when his wife owned an interest in a southern sugar plantation, had neglected to tell the committee that he had taken an active part in the wheat case when his wife owned one quarter section of 160 acres of wheat land from which she received an annual rental of \$275, which he said was double the amount Mrs. Glass received.

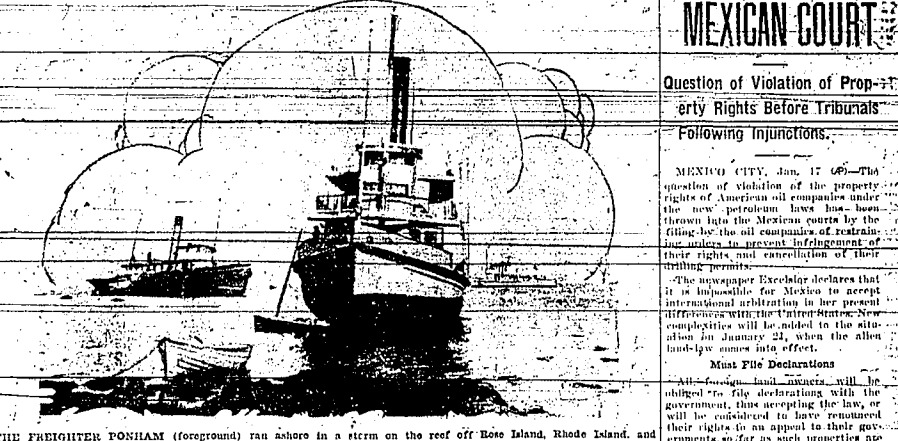
WASHINGTON QUIET ON NICARAGUAN QUESTION

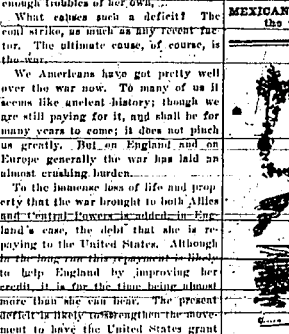

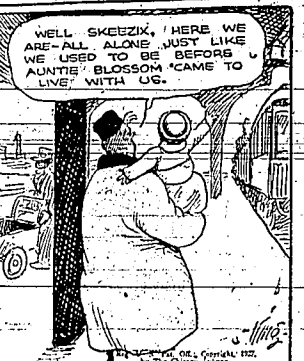
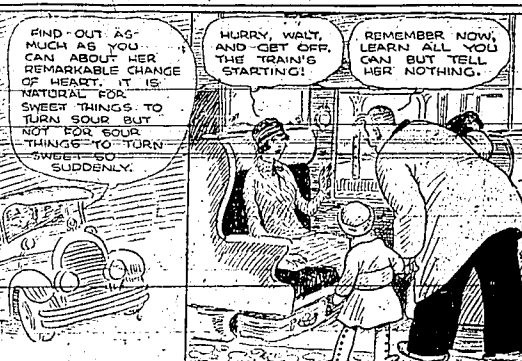
