

APPROVES SALE OF MILWAUKEE

Federal Judge-Wilkerson Takes Action Following Hearing of Jameson Group Protest.

CHICAGO, Jan. 19 (AP)—Action of the Chicago Milwaukee & St. Paul Railway Co. to sell the Milwaukee & St. Paul Railway Co. to the National City Corp. for \$10,000,000, and the plan submitted by those companies as a reorganization measure, was approved today by Judge W. L. Wilkerson, who said that the railway was in a state of insolvency and that the sale would be for the benefit of the stockholders.

The judge's order provided that the deed to the valuable property should not be returned over to the state-commerce commission of the financial reorganization contemplated. Immediately after the hearing, Judge Wilkerson, acting for the New York banking houses which had been the St. Paul's local agents in the sale, ordered the railway to be sold to a new Delaware corporation, the Chicago Milwaukee & Pacific Railroad Co.

Bars Further Complaints

The judge's order further complained against the reorganization plan, but specified that the court retained jurisdiction in the case as to interpretation of any problem not mentioned specifically in the order.

The Jameson group of holders of approximately 50 percent of the railway's junior bonds, has opposed the majority interests throughout the reorganization. Judge Wilkerson's order of foreclosure and sale was entered over the Jameson group's strenuous objections at the appointed hearing today by Judge Wilkerson.

SCHOOL HISTORIES UNDER FIRE IN COMMITTEE-ROOM

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19 (AP)—Turning its attention to the historical side of the World War, the House military committee was told today that a number of American school histories give a distorted and imaginary account of the part played by the American troops.

The statement was made by Representative Andrew J. Higgins, Republican, Massachusetts, who introduced a resolution providing for the publication of official army and navy war records. The Massachusetts member made public a letter from Secretary of War Woodrow Wilson, dated December 10, 1916, in which the war department could not enforce the plan at this time because of the cost of publication.

Britain Re-enacts War-Time Scenes

LONDON, Jan. 19 (AP)—War-time scenes were enacted at Oldham today when members detailed for duty in Great Britain assembled to begin their journey to parliament. These included marching to the station with military equipment, headed by a regimental band, and were particularly cheered along the route. They were accompanied by a band of music and a contingent of 1000.

Official quarters again emphasized today that whatever is being done is not intended to be a departure from the policy of non-aggression. In this connection, a British radical newspaper said:

"It is intended to impress Eugene Lyons (American foreign minister) that it may be possible to settle our differences with a nation like ours through a demonstration and then draw back, a demonstration and then draw back."

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Liberal President Denies Existence of Mexican Pact

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 19 (AP)—Luis Cabrera, Nicaraguan, Jan. 19 (AP)—Dr. Juan Bautista Somoza, Nicaraguan president, told a staff correspondent for the Associated Press at an interview today that Nicaragua had no pact with the United States, and that the United States had no pact with Mexico.

The liberal chief, whose government recognized by Mexico, is opposing the Diaz conservative regime at Managua, which has American recognition, except proof conclusive of being able to carry out his fight to a successful conclusion. He also denied again that the liberals have a pact with Mexico, but he received military aid from Mexico.

Went U. S. Friendly

"I am in perfect accord that the United States offers Nicaragua and the other Latin-American nations greater commercial advantages than Mexico or any other nation."

Washington, Jan. 19 (AP)—The Mexican law which provides that the alien shall acquire direct ownership of 5000 hectares of the Mexican land will go into effect Friday, it was learned today at the Mexican embassy.

The law stipulates that a foreigner participating in a Mexican company acquiring ownership within the restricted zone must not invoke the protection of his government. Foreigners owning property prior to the inauguration of the law on January 21, 1926, however, are permitted to retain it until death, or by the sale of the property to a Mexican.

Participants who acquired rights prior to January 21 were required to make a declaration before the Mexican department of foreign relations within a year, the law providing that those failing to do so within the specified period, having acquired the property subsequent to its promulgation.

WATERWAYS AND RAILROADS
American railroads have always been actively opposed water transportation. At first there had to do that, in their early struggle for a market, they needed eventually in shifting in general waterway traffic and throttling new developments. Always canal, river and lake transportation has been a threat to the railroads.

At last, however, railroad opposition to the building and use of canals is beginning to change. This change is being made by the National Waterway Administration, a government enterprise which for the last few years has been trying to revive the old traffic on the Lower Mississippi.

Though operating on a small scale, with little capital, the success of this venture under General Ashburn has been notable. Not only has it turned the corner and started making money, but more remarkably it has succeeded in getting the railroads to work with it.

River traffic alone would not support those barges. They need connecting railroad lines. General Ashburn succeeded in persuading one railroad another that it would benefit the railroads themselves to exchange freight on a mutual basis. Now there is a joint rail and water rate, the large line has working relations with one hundred and thirty-two railroads and four hundred and thirty-five miles of waterway.

What is good for both waterways and railroads in the Mississippi Valley will doubtless be good for both elsewhere in another great field of transportation when the proposed deep waterway is built from the Great Lakes to the Atlantic. The federal commission headed by Secretary Hoover submits figures to show that by the time that channel is opened, water and rail lines will both have all they can do to handle the available freight. Accordingly, the railroads may be expected to show less hostility to that project.
