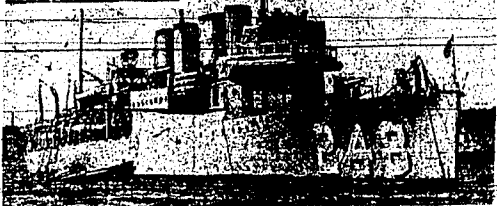

# PLAN MERGER ON EQUALITY BASIS

### Share for Share Exchange of Old and New Stock, Proposition of Two Executives

NEW YORK, Jan. 20 (AP)—The large northern railway merger is being planned on a share-for-share equality basis in an exchange of stock of the Great Northern and the Northern Pacific for stock in the new operating railway company. This was disclosed here today in a joint statement issued by Joseph H. Hodson and Charles W. Johnson, president of the Great Northern company.

The announcement was made at the close of a meeting of directors, officers and counsel for the two railway systems, at which "satisfactory" preliminary arrangements were made.

The exact method by which the plan shall be carried out was not revealed.

### Stocks Differ on Market

At the close of the stock market tonight, there was a spread of 2 1/2 points between the quoted closing prices of the two stocks. Great Northern preferred, the only stock of that road outstanding, closing 20 1/2 and Northern Pacific common at 23 1/2.

The Great Northern road has authorized a 25 percent increase of stock to \$400 per share, the value of which is \$25,000,000. It is outstanding, and the Northern Pacific company has authorized a 25 percent increase of capital stock to \$100 per share, of which \$25,000,000 is outstanding.

There is a close similarity also in the funded debts of the two roads, the Great Northern having \$322,212,212 in bonds and equipment obligations outstanding as of Dec. 31, 1926, and the Northern Pacific had \$320,123,000.

The meeting today closed the New York session of the conference, Mr. Hodson leaving tonight for the west. It is expected, however, that further discussions will follow, shortly, probably in St. Paul.

### FAVORS PERMISSIVE LAW FOR PROPOSED COMBINES

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20 (AP)—The point of divergence between advocates and opponents of railroad combination legislation is whether it should be permissive or coercive, the senate interstate commerce committee was told today by A. E. Thom, general counsel of the Association of Railway Executives.

He believes, he said, that a permissive law to start with would best serve the public interest. The present law provides no way, he said, by which the Great Northern and Northern Pacific railroads could consolidate and the union of those lines would technically be a "acquisition of control," since the interstate commerce commission is not empowered to approve consolidations.

### Favors Fee Measure

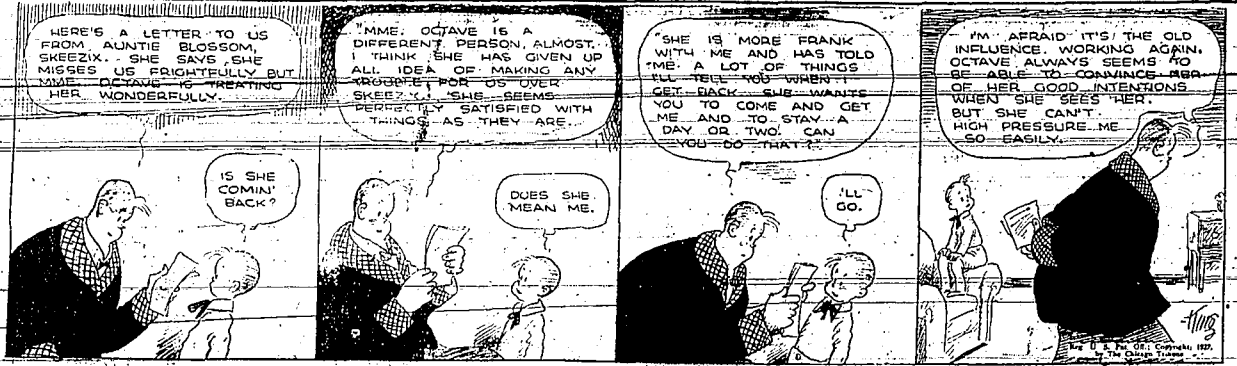
The Interstate Commerce commission, which the committee is considering would modify the defects of existing statutes, Mr. Thom believed, he also would favor the combination of Senator Howell, republican, Nebraska, that the measure was framed to promote the interests of railroads instead of those of the public, declaring the interstate commission would entertain applications for consolidation only when it believed the public interest would best be served.

Discussing the status of minority stockholders, which had been a stumbling block of mergers in the past, Mr. Thom said this might be cured, for either by the commission requiring disclosure of the names of all stockholders or by the matter of controlling properties was described by the witness as most important because there was a question as to the power of congress to deal with it.

HOLLYWOOD, Cal., Jan. 20 (AP)—The Little Theater movement is credited by Director Eugene Brann with having made possible the so-called highway scene drama. It has provided an audience, he says, for motion pictures based upon the drama of modernism and other elements of the stage.

"The Little Theater," says Brann, "is not only a new type of theater, but it is also a new type of picture. It is a drama, and more than that, it is a drama for a better type of picture and a more lasting type of drama. They therefore are doing a great work in raising the art of the screen to a par with that of the stage. For while the public seemed to accept the stage works that were being presented in the films, which because of wide distribution had to have things more popular in scope.

"The public through the Little Theater, came to have a loving regard for the new drama and a more intelligent knowledge of it." Thus the Little Theater has done a great good, even though it has reaped a meager reward for it."

## ALBRECHT WILL DIRECT CONCERT

### Talented Prussian Prince, Cousin of Former Kaiser, Plans Trip to United States.

BREITENBURG, Prussia, Jan. 20 (AP)—Prince Albrecht of Prussia, second cousin to former Emperor William II, who will soon go to the United States to direct a series of symphony concerts, is not only a composer but a virtuoso as well. His instrument is the cello, and he has frequently assisted at clarity, a cello and contrabass in the role of cellist.

"My cello," he told the Associated Press, "was built in Berlin by the brother of my teacher. But all experts whom I have consulted agree that it is the equal of the best of the old Italian instruments.

"There is something mysterious about my instrument. One day an old instrument maker came to the master who built my cello and told him he would 'blow something into the instrument' by which they would acquire the properties of the old Italian instruments. Whatsoever that 'blowing' process may have been, it did the trick."

To Interpret Own Works  
—Just before his death a few years ago this old fellow revealed the secret to the man who built my instrument. The latter declared he will take the secret down into his grave. All my attempts to persuade him to leave the formula to posterity have failed."

Prince Joachim Albrecht expects to direct concerts in about a dozen leading cities of the United States. He will confine himself to directing and interpreting his own works, which are chiefly in the nature of symphonic fantasies. He has also written considerable ballet music. Besides orchestra compositions, he has composed songs for baritone voice, and a cantata for the cello. His latest orchestral work is entitled "Fantasia armonica."

Since the war, the prince has conducted concerts in Baden-Baden, Vienna, Budapest, Zurich, Breslau, Linc, and Rio de Janeiro.

"The prince does not think much of jazz and other modern music. Automobile driving is his favorite diversion.

### FRENCH ROAD SHOWS FEEL HEAVY EXPENSE

PARIS, Jan. 20 (AP)—The high cost of traveling has put a crimp in the provincial theatre business in France. Railway fares have risen more rapidly than the price of theatre tickets, so much so that road companies are finding it difficult to make ends meet and many are going out of business.

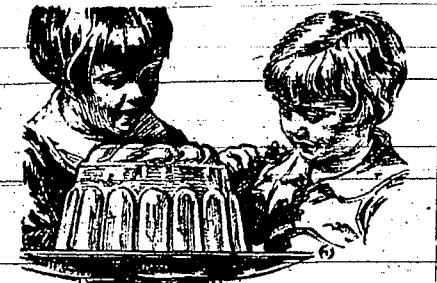

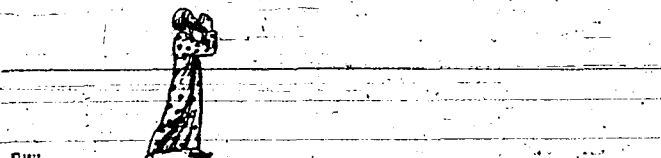

### Members of German Government Get News Immediately When Statesmen Of U. S. Speak; Cables Keep Busy

BERLIN, Jan. 20. (AP)—Every time the President of the United States, Secretary of State, or any other statesman of the United States makes a public announcement, there is unusual activity in the press division of the German foreign office at Wilhelmstrasse. It is because there is a standing order in the department that press-


leaders is as different in each case as it is interesting. Take the Marx cabinet as an instance. Hindenburg Likes Comics President von Hindenburg reads but few newspapers aside from a daily from his home town. However, the digest of the world's news is communicated to him orally each day at 10 o'clock by the secretary of the government's press bureau, Dr. Zechlin. Zechlin goes at his job from a journalistic point of view, that is, he summarizes the news in the order of its importance.
