George Starrh Veteran and Frontiersman, Answers Call

George Starrh, 84 years old, civil war veteran and one of the founders of Starrh's Ferry on Snake river in 1850, was called to answer the call of duty by attending funeral services with military honors at Burley, Idaho, where his death occurred three days before Mr. Starrh was widely known among early settlers of this territory. During the past several years he had made his residence near Marietta where he had power filings. His health began to fail at the home of his niece, Mrs. Olive Hanks at Burley, from effect of age and a severe cold.

Mr. Starrh was the youngest son of one of the old pioneers of the west, who knew the hardships and dangers incident to freighting from St. Louis, and extending to Washington, in the early states.

He was born in Fankleshire, England, July 21, 1843, and came to America with his parents in February, 1855. The family settled at Nebraska City in 1858, that point then being in the far west, with large herds of buffalo and horse and mule common neighbors in the immediate vicinity. At the age of 17 he took a position as assistant wagon master with the firm of Majors and Russell, freighters, who came each of their drivers a testimonial to carry, and which George did throughout his western travels for many years.

Heading the calling of President Lincoln to counter the power of the Kansas troops of the Union forces, together with his elder brother, Thomas Starrh, in 1861, this regiment was sent to western regions to hold back the Indians. He was honorably discharged at the end of the war.

Plants Now Thrive in Broad Fields That Were Once Covered by Rank Growth; Americans Aid in Development.

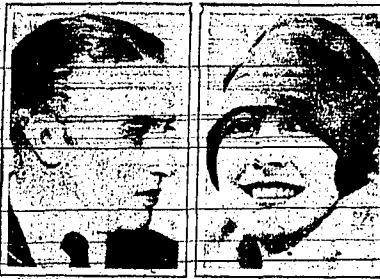

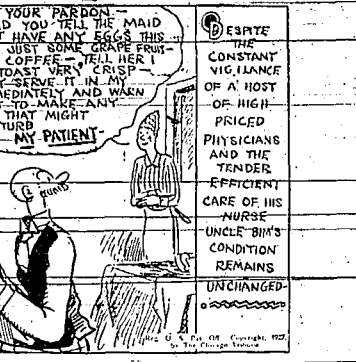
