NEARLY DESIGNED TO  
SETTLE DISPUTE

Declaration of National Government in China Outlines Cantonese View of Situation; Suggests Negotiation.

(By The Associated Press.) HANKOW, Jan. 24 (AP)—The national government stated today that "liberation of China from the yoke of foreign imperialism must necessarily involve any armed conflict between Chinese nationalists and foreign troops." The national government prefers to have all questions outstanding between themselves and foreign powers settled by negotiation.

"Nationalism," says the declaration, "is strong and conscious of its power; its ability through economic means to enforce its will on Chinese soil against any power."

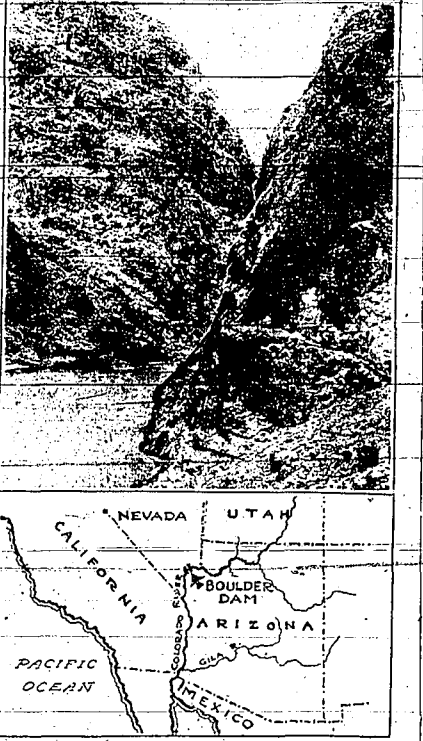
"Able to Manage Affairs," says the declaration, "the Cantonese government, which has increased its area in less than a year of conquest and present China with a population of more than 200,000,000, fully asserts its ability to take care of Chinese affairs without the aid of any foreign power."

"British and other foreign declarations of policy," it says, have intimidated the Cantonese "not enter into self-deceiving ordinances regarding China in order to safeguard her integrity and independence, promote her industrial development, rehabilitation and her life-interests."

"The national government's program includes abandonment of all foreign claims involving the rights of signature in international treaties."

A cabinet meeting of the Cantonese government today declared that the British in particular had understood that the national government's attitude regarding foreign life and property to the government of China was not intended to be a threat to those in whose hands is centered power that can paralyze the economic life of foreign nationals of the Chinese.

NORRIS TRIAL REACHES STAGE OF FINAL ARGUMENTS BEFORE JURY

Attorneys Contrast Lives of Texas Pastor and Victim in Summing Up Case; Preacher Surrounded by Friends.

(By The Associated Press.) AUSTIN, Texas, Jan. 24 (AP)—The lives of Dr. J. Frank Norris, pastor of the First Baptist church here, and Dexter E. Chappin, the man killed in his study last July 15, were contrasted by attorneys today in the final argument before the jury in the Norris murder trial.

Before attorneys pointed Norris "as the animal head of 9000 people," and Chappin "as the gentlest of gentlest spirits," who led a life of alleged dissipation while the pastor who killed him was a devoted minister.

Judge Georges J. Hamilton, in charging the jury, told them that if they believed from all circumstances that the defendant was in apparent distress at the time of the shooting, they should acquit. He said it was not necessary to prove that the slain man had been in the house at the time of the shooting.

When court opened this morning, Norris sat surrounded by his close friends with a former policeman at his elbow for protection from what his friends thought might be a demonstration against him. Norris said that a large number of his church members were in the courtroom and that his supporters had thought it best to be close to him in the closing hours of the trial.

Supreme Court Justice Seeger Orders Transfer of Separation Action From Carmel to White Plains, New York.

(By The Associated Press.) CARMEL, N. Y., Jan. 24 (AP)—The first act in the divorce and separation suit filed against his wife, the first Justice Seeger (Charles) Seeger, closed his divorce suit in Carmel, N. Y., today, and transferred it to White Plains, N. Y., where Justice Seeger indicated it transfer to the federal court.

The main street of Carmel, which is 40 blocks in the morning was black with automobiles, sleighs, photographs, photographers and camera men, and a night single ribbon of beaten snow, with nobody in it.

And the courtroom there is scheduled to open at 10 o'clock for the second time Supreme Court Justice Seeger will conduct the trial, this time in federal court.

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SOLONS AGREE TO PROTECT WATER RIGHT OF IDAHO

Measure, Passed Under Suspension of Rules by Both Houses and Signed, Designates Governor as Trustee.

(By The Associated Press.) BOISE, Jan. 23 (AP)—Appropriation of all appropriated waters of Priest, Pond and Idaho lakes in the northwest to protect the state's interest pending further investigation of the Columbia river basin, was passed today by the Idaho legislature.

The measure, which was passed under suspension of rules in both houses and signed by Governor, designates the governor as trustee of the water.

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MRS. CHAPLIN NEEDS FUNDS

Attorneys for Wife of Film Comedian to Renew Fight to Obtain Temporary Alimony.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 24 (AP)—Attorneys for Mrs. Chaplin tonight made a deposition in New York that Charles Spencer Chaplin had posted a bond to release the government's grip on the film comedian's finances and were pressing to renew their fight to obtain temporary alimony for their client.

A difference of opinion was held by counsel for opposing sides in the domestic matter as to whether the posting of a bond in New York would make local assets of the comedian available from which the receivers could pay alimony ordered by the superior court.

Samuel Goldwyn, prominent motion picture producer, whose attorneys for Mrs. Chaplin said they had asked to make a deposition as to the knowledge of Chaplin's assets, had made a deposition today. The attorneys stated that if it did not appear a subpoena would be requested on the court.

Announcement also was made by attorneys for the Chaplins that they had filed a bill in California property and bank accounts that it be paid for the payment of any alimony despite the order of the court that the receivers should be paid.

COURT'S RULING TRUSTS LINSEY

High Tribunal of Colorado Decides Noted Judge's Re-Election in 1924 Illegal.

DENVER, Colo., Jan. 24 (AP)—The ruling by the Colorado supreme court today ordered Hon. J. Lindsey to stand as judge of the Denver district court for the remainder of his term, which expires in a quarter of a century.

The noted judge, however, declared himself not to renew his office and took the position that he would continue in office until the next general election, provided a qualified successor in the position of chief justice of the court's action will be to leave the office vacant until filled by appointment of a successor.

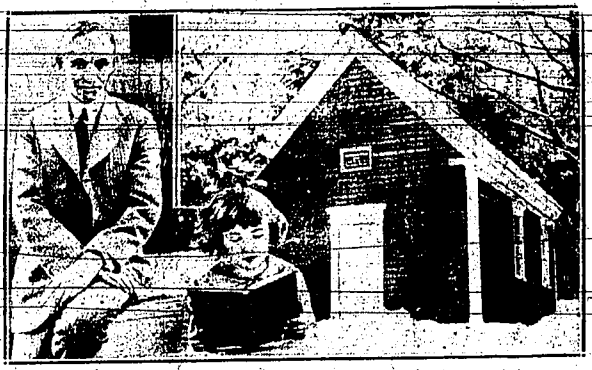
