BRITISH FORCES ENTER RACE FOR ORIENTAL PRIZE

England's Army and Navy Vie With Nationalists of China to Reach Shanghai First; Defense Plans Emphasized.

(By The Associated Press) LONDON, Jan. 26.—The race for Shanghai, prize city of the Orient, is on between the British army and navy and the Chinese nationalists.

Forty thousand foreign troops are in Shanghai, and many foreign troops from all parts of China now are gathered there.

The British maintain that the question of the control of Chekiang province, right up to the limits of Shanghai, is an international question inasmuch as it is a province to be settled by the League of Nations.

Should Shanghai itself be threatened under the fighting of the Chinese, the British defense force, together with the Shanghai volunteer organization and whatever forces Japan, United States and France have available, would probably be employed along a 20-mile line.

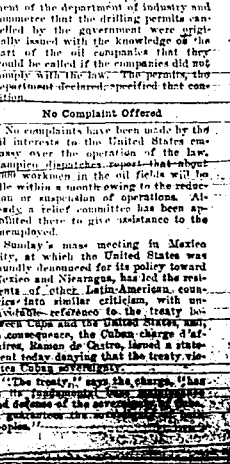

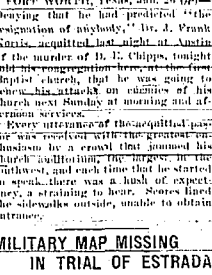

CASSIA COUNTY SHERIFF FACES OUSTER ACTION

P. D. Pace to Answer Charges of Malfeasance in Office in District Court at Burley With Particular Denials.

BURLEY, Jan. 26. Ouster proceedings against P. D. Pace, sheriff of Cassia county, filed January 25, by Haven Leigh will open in district court here Thursday morning before Judge Hugh A. Taylor, with E. V. Larson of Twin Falls and S. T. Lowe of Burley as attorneys for the plaintiff and P. D. Pace, of Burley, J. J. Carson, district judge, and E. W. Hines, attorney at law, representing the sheriff.

Leigh was one of the signers of the independent petition which placed Pace as an independent candidate in the field against Sheriff Pace at the last general election. The cause of action set out in plaintiff's information, it is alleged that the sheriff has permitted persons to go to large saloons in the city, that he has neglected and failed to arrest certain persons before magistrates or cause complaints charging gambling to be filed against them; that he neglected and refused to file charges to be filed against gambling places on the streets of Burley at the 1926 county fair; that he neglected and failed to remove a public nuisance in the nature of the store of the name of John T. Morris, local Presbyterian minister, but ignored and encouraged the commission of such offense.

Minister in Jail. The district judge last week released the minister after having arrested him for holding himself out as an opponent without a license; that he released and encouraged the minister without charging him with battery upon his wife; that he failed to make arrests of persons alleged to have been gambling in a local pool hall or club; that he neglected and failed to arrest other accessible magistrates after he had been arrested upon a battery charge; and made no attempt to arrest John T. Morris, minister in the Cassia county jail without taking him before an accessible magistrate after having arrested upon a criminal conspiracy charge.

Relates Circumstances. It denies that one Shaver committed a battery upon his wife, except as explained by Mrs. Shaver herself, the slight touching of one of her wrists, stating that she did not want her husband prosecuted and that she would not appear and testify against him. It admits that under authority of a warrant, he arrested Jefferson, "undercover" man, and placed him in jail without taking him before a magistrate, but that the arrest was made about 11 p. m., and that the magistrate, to his knowledge, was available and that the following morning at 10 o'clock he was taken before the probate judge, who upon his own motion, it admits, under direction of a warrant of arrest, the arrest of John T. Morris and the placing of him in the county jail at a late hour when no magistrate was available, but asserts that Morris remained in confinement for some 20 minutes, only while the sheriff went for the probate judge.

The answer, in conclusion, prays that the information and each and every cause of action be dismissed; that the plaintiff take nothing thereby and that he recover his attorneys' costs and disbursements expended.

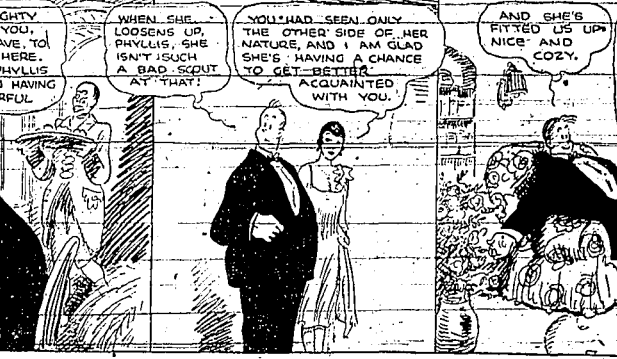
