# KIMBALL DRIVES IRISH SETTERS TO WIN CLASSIC

### Cascade Mail Carrier Takes \$1000 Prize and Dog Derby Cup in Ashton Race; Tud Kent Places Close Second.

(By The Associated Press.)  
ASHTON, Feb. 22.—Piloting a team of Irish setters, Earl Kimball, Cascade mail carrier, won the American dog derby here today over a field of 17 other teams from all parts of Idaho and Utah. Kimball made the 27-mile course in 1 hour, 57 minutes and 16 seconds. Last year the course was run in record time by Bill Trude's team in 1 hour, 55 minutes and 58 seconds.

Trude finished seventh. Bill Trude, winner of the Banff-Alberta race this year and who had been picked as a favorite to win, finished a poor seventh after he had led all teams for the first lap in fast time. Other entrants were far behind after the first seven had crossed the wire. Miss Dean Anderson, American Falls, who was driving a team of crossbred deer hounds and bird dogs, got off to a poor start and failed to improve while Miss Monte Haver, driving Belgian shepherds under a Salt Lake entry, sent her team out of town on a slow trot and could not increase her pace.

**Rated Among Favorites**  
Kimball, the winner of the \$1000 prize and the dog derby cup, was one of the favorites in the race, although spectators thought ordinarily Kent Trude, or "Smoky" Gaston were in better position to win.

The race has again been taken by a bird dog team which is taken by fanciers of this region, as an indication that this type of dog is the best of all for race purposes. An effort is already being made to pick a team of Irish bird dogs to enter The Dog Derby at the Wolftrams in Vermont next year.

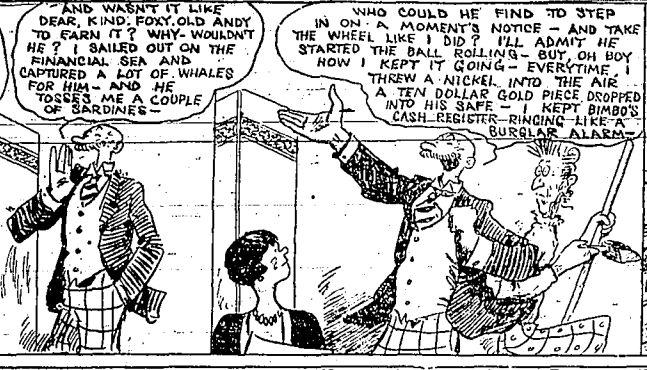

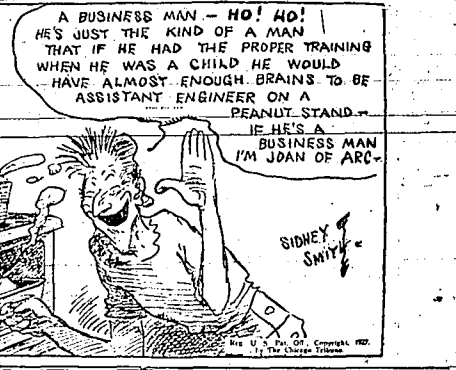

### BOURBON WANTS STRICT RULE IN COUNTY OFFICES

#### Democratic Member of Board of Commissioners Fails to Win Approval of Colleagues for All of His Proposals.

Twin Falls county commissioners, in fixing composition of the rate of 10 cents a mile for use of privately owned automobiles by officials, deputies or employees on county business and after April 1, approved only one of the three provisions of a resolution offered by James L. Barnes of Hanna, democratic member of the board. It was adopted last evening.

Other provisions of the resolution would have prohibited use of automobiles and other county property for personal or individual use, and would have permitted compensation for meals and lodging for county officials, deputies or other employees only when sent from their place of residence and in the performance of their official duty.

#### Outline Opposition

In discussion of the resolution's proposals that were not approved, the member of the board stated that it was his intention to bring the matter to the board, to deal with the situation, they asserted, would be to maintain right surveillance of expense accounts and claims for reimbursement.

The rejected provisions of the resolution were as follows: "That all autos and other county property is purchased and maintained exclusively for the use and benefit of the county and same must not be used by county officials, deputies and other employees who have same in their possession and charge for their personal or individual use or be permitted to be used by any other person for personal or individual use.
