

UPPER HOUSE IN OPPOSED JAM

Resolution to Extend Life of Campaign Funds Committee Causes Further Tangle; Opposing Forces Adamant.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, March 1 (AP)—The senate started its way into a tighter legislative jam than ever today, the issue cleared its calendar of several important measures, including the bill to permit the manufacture of medicinal whiskey.

Difficulties in the senate arose over the resolution proposing to extend the life of the campaign funds committee and to permit it to open the more than \$100,000 in campaign funds here from Pennsylvania under an order directing that committee to investigate the somewhat elastic terms last November.

Filibuster Brings Warning A filibuster was brought into play against this resolution, preventing action today, and promised still bitter fighting that would probably run from both the republican and democratic sides that delaying tactics would be employed until adjournment at noon Friday.

Such tactics are not expected to prevent a vote on the prohibition reassignment measure which the senate in yesterday's cloture debate limiting rule voted by one more than the required two-thirds majority.

As soon as this bill is voted on, probably tomorrow, Senator Reed, democrat, Missouri, chairman of the campaign funds committee, plans to introduce a motion to take up his resolution extending the authority of his special committee through this summer recess.

Senators Reed of Pennsylvania and Moses of New Hampshire, republicans, intend to continue the filibuster to prevent action.

Makes Point of Order With the resolving the special order of the senate at the beginning of the session at noon, Senator Reed of Pennsylvania, made a point of order that this special agreement had been brought by the invoking of the cloture rule and that the unfinished business must be completed.

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Remaining Planes of Pan-American Group Will Continue Trip

San Francisco and St. Louis to Take Off Immediately for Asuncion, Paraguay.

(By The Associated Press) BUREAU AERES, March 1 (AP)—The Pan American group of six planes, which arrived Saturday, will depart tomorrow morning in continuation of the 20,000-mile flight temporarily halted by the tragedy which took place Saturday on Captain Elliott's Winkley and his relief pilot, Lieutenant John W. Benton.

The present party of six planes will go directly to Asuncion, Paraguay. The American aviators, headed by Major Herbert A. Thayer, left Asuncion today.

They will be accompanied by a large force of marines and other personnel. They will be ready to be used for scouting and communication purposes.

Situation Quiet Scattered fighting by small bands was reported today from the Biafra district, but otherwise the military situation was quiet.

YANKEE PLANES REACH ZONE OF SOUTHERN WAR

(By The Associated Press) MANAGUA, Nicaragua, March 1 (AP)—Six American airplanes, their pilots and repair crews under command of Major Ross E. Howell, United States Marine Corps, arrived here today by special train from Oahu.

They were taken immediately to a landing field which had been prepared near the marine headquarters and where practice flights will be made as soon as the assembling of the planes has been completed.

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Organization Urges Immediate Boycott Of American Goods

Union of Central and South America Would Force Removal of Troops.

(By The Associated Press) MEXICO CITY, March 1 (AP)—The Union of Central and South America and the Andes, an organization which has conducted considerable propaganda against the United States, has issued a manifesto calling for an immediate boycott throughout Latin America of all things originating in the United States.

The manifesto urged: "We will do nothing more for Latin America than the respect that North Americans have accorded themselves."

It is stipulated that the boycott shall continue as long as the forces of the United States army and navy land, under any pretext, on the soil of any sister nation.

Two Accidents in England and Wales Claim Heavy Toll; Rescue Efforts Hampered.

(By The Associated Press) LONDON, March 1 (AP)—Sixty British mining industry today was struck on by two disasters, one in Wales and the other in Nottinghamshire, England, with a death toll that was feared would reach 45.

The Welsh disaster took place in a mine situated near Oala, a small town that lies in the shadow of the so-called Snowdon mountain, Snowdon Pass, which only last year saw a deadly river to shift its course, and by a section of the mine and nearby hills.

An explosion early this morning in the mine of the Ethelwydd company, employing 1700 men, caused deaths that are known to number 23, with 25 more missing.

Deaths were 130 in Wales when the explosion occurred. Most of them were lost to the surface, but the others were so far underground that escape was impossible.

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SELECTS BOARD OF CONTROL FOR RADIO INDUSTRY

President Chooses Five Names From List of 900 as Members of Commission; Asks Senate Confirmation.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, March 1 (AP)—Choosing from a list of more than 900, President Coolidge today named the five members of the new radio commission and sent the nominations to the senate for confirmation before adjournment of congress Friday.

The president's selections were: Rear Admiral William H. Byrd, retired, of Media, Pennsylvania, 52 years term.

Orestes Caldwell of Bloomville, N. Y., five years term.

Virginia C. Styles of Jackson, Mississippi, four years.

Henry A. Bellows of Minneapolis, three years.

John E. Dillon of San Francisco, two years.

One from Each District This nomination is from each of the five districts into which the United States was divided by the radio control act.

In choosing his commission, which will have wide control powers, President Coolidge carried out his intention of selecting men experienced in radio communication or familiar with the legal and business conditions surrounding the industry.

Admiral Byrd, who will be chairman, in addition to a long and distinguished naval career, was a delegate to the international safety at sea conference in London in 1915, was director of naval communications from March, 1919, to 1921, and is a member of the Institute of Radio Engineers.

Experienced Men Bykes is a lawyer and served in the Mississippi supreme court bench from 1916 to 1921, when he retired to resume the practice of law.

Bellows, native of Portland, Maine, since his graduation from Harvard, has been an editor of various publications, and since 1923 has directed the WCCO radio station in Minneapolis.

Dillon enlisted in 1911 in the army signal corps. Later he was appointed radio inspector for the department of commerce at Chicago, and still later transferred to San Francisco as supervisor of radio of the sixth district.

At Caldwell since 1919 has been editor of electrical and radio magazines.

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NO LIGHT ON MEXICAN NOTE

State Department Refuses to Divulge Import of Message to Calles Government.

WASHINGTON, March 1 (AP)—The refusal of the state department to throw any light on the Mexican note handed to the Mexican foreign office opened the way for unbridled speculation tonight as to the latest evidence of friction between the two governments.

The department did not say that the communication had no relation to the oil and land controversies, but made no comment on the statement from Mexico City that the note was of unusual importance.

Guesses Vary

Efforts to guess the subject of the note ranged all the way from the true Mexican attitude regarding the new American interstate regulatory legislation to the possibility that the state department had protested directly communications from President Calles to Senator Borah, and contended through normal diplomatic channels.

Another suggestion was that negotiations might be in prospect to extend the life of the Mexican-American claims commission, to expire within a few months.

It was pointed out, however, that correspondence received frequently between the two governments on a variety of subjects without even the fact that communications had been exchanged being made public.

HOPE FOR ARMS PACT NOT DEAD

President Coolidge Feels Way Will Open to Curb Competitive Naval Construction.

WASHINGTON, March 1 (AP)—In the face of French and Italian rejection of the American five-power naval limitation treaty extension plan, President Coolidge remains hopeful of the ultimate success of his efforts to further curb competitive war armament building.

Emphasis was made at the White House today on the fact that the Washington agreement had proposed the Washington, not adoption, of a five-year moratorium and submarine tonnage. The statement may prove to be significant in indicating the need for a Coolidge hopes to follow in pressing forward his proposal to immediately practical steps to stop an international race in warship building programs.

Opportunity May Come

Study of the British and Japanese replies, accepting the American proposal, as well as of the French and Italian communications, may point out an opportunity to further American initiatives. These lines have time for supplementary informal exchanges both in Paris and home in the light of which the formal refusal might be given a somewhat different interpretation.

The president has not authorized any yet with Secretary Kellogg to determine future procedure. He is already satisfied, however, that the door has not been closed absolutely, to a five-power pact.

A five-hundred dollar is appropriated for the investigation.

Other measures approved included the uniform stock transfer act, the bill making the state treasurer the trustee of the University of Idaho board of regents, and five appropriation measures to meet certain deficiency claims and to provide for operation of charitable and penal institutions.

In addition the governor signed several judicial committee measures covering facts in the state's procedural code.

The senate bill approved enumerated security to be accepted for the state treasurer as security for state deposits.

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WINS DAMAGE SUIT AGAINST SURGEONS

LOS ANGELES, March 1 (AP)—Miss Helen L. Collins, who underwent an operation to have her bowlegs straightened when short skirts came in style was awarded \$25,000 damages by a jury today in a suit against the surgeons in which she charged negligence. The operation resulted in blood poisoning and subsequent amputation of one leg below the knee.

Miss Collins sued the surgeons, John Danby and T. M. Hart, for \$100,000 damages. The defendants denied the charges, declaring the operation and treatment were according to the best medical practice and that the amputation was performed only because Miss Collins was so sensitive about her leg that she threatened suicide. Four women were on the jury which made the award.

150 SPORTSMEN GATHER HERE AT ANNUAL BANQUET

Members of Southern Idaho Fish and Game Association Hold Yearly Meeting; Work of Organization is Praised.

Forty tributes to the fishes and other sports who played a part in the winning of the west and extension of civilization from the place of its first appearance on this continent, H. P. 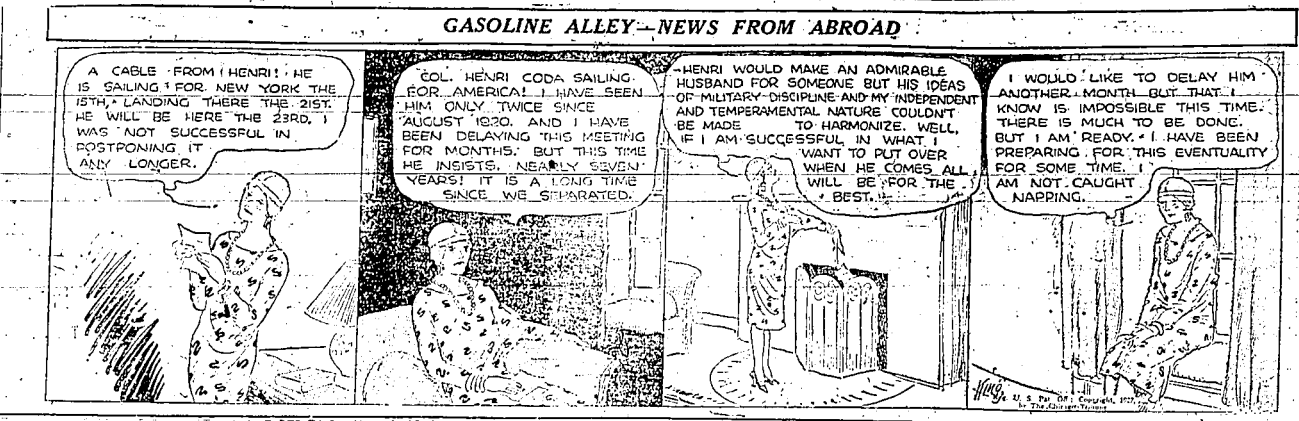

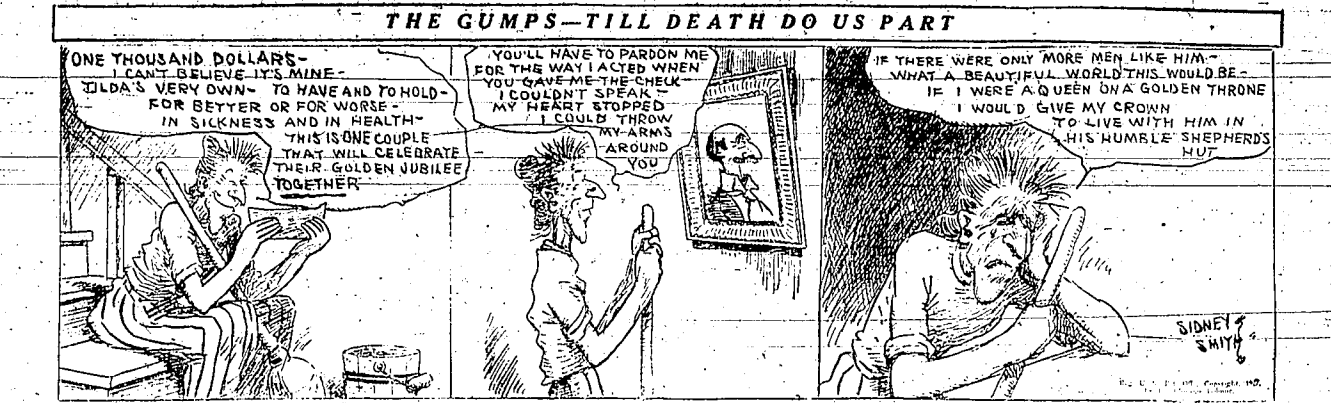

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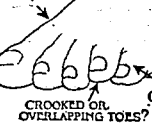
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DROPS CHARGES AGAINST NOLAN

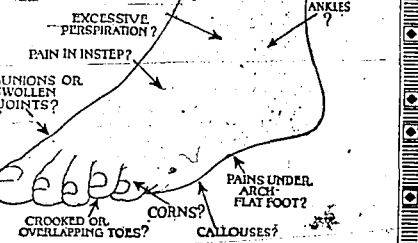
