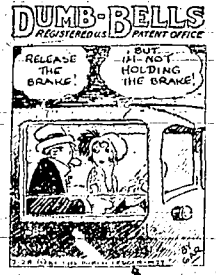

SHARKEY WINS TECHNICAL KO OVER M'FIGUE

Referee Stops Bout in Twelfth to Save Veteran Irishman Further Punishment; Boston Lad Leads in Points.

NEW YORK, March 3—A short sharp, Boston heavy-weight, gave a technical knockout tonight over Mike McFigue of New York in the twelfth of a 15-round match.

Referee Kid M'Connell stopped the fight with McFigue still on his feet, but cut, battered and bleeding from the mouth in a stream. It appeared that the veteran Irishman had been severely punished in the "downing" which, according to reports, gave the contest with blood in the referee's interest.
