Colonel Frank Kravitz of the national guard will pilot a Douglas observation plane on the attempt to reach the two towns, which were cut off from communication with the outside world more than two weeks ago.

Captain Fred Stimmer, regular army aviator attached to the national guard as instructor, attempted to reach Silverton and Enclava by airplane today but was unable to cross the Rocky mountains because of a blizzard.

Silverton lies 200 miles south-west of Denver.

### GRAVE PROBLEM BEFORE LEAGUE

Expropriated Property Dispute Between Rumania and Hungary Makes Appearance.

GENEVA, March 7 (AP)—The thorny problem of the expropriated property dispute between Rumania and Hungary made its appearance tonight during the first sessions of the forty-fourth meeting of the council of the league of nations.

Both Dr. Tigran vorostanski, the Rumanian foreign minister, who is presiding at the council, and the British foreign minister, stressed the gravity of the dispute which is at present being treated as a matter affecting the peaceful relations of Rumania with Hungary and also being considered in connection with the competence of all arbitral tribunals.

The dispute between Rumania and Hungary would not set Europe aflame unless Rumania wished it, declared the Hungarian representative at the council session tonight after a lengthy hour of discussion.

Representing Rumania's recent decision not to allow the mixed tribunal to pass upon the claims of Hungarians against former landlords of Transylvania which now is annexed to the Rumanian state, the expropriated property is treated as a legal question and not a political one.

### COURT GIVES DECISION IN OHIO DRY LAW CASE

WASHINGTON, March 7 (AP)—In an unanimous decision, the supreme court held today that judicial officers are disqualified from sitting in cases in which they are directly or indirectly interested. The opinion was delivered by Chief Justice Taft in a case from Ohio in which Ed Toney had been convicted by the state of violating the prohibition law.

The court held that the prohibition law and the village ordinance under which the mayor was allowed to sue on conviction was not in violation upon the due process provision of the fourteenth amendment to the federal constitution. It was of the opinion that the mayor, sitting as judge, had a pecuniary interest in the result of the trial which disqualified him.

# TAX LEVY FOR SCHOOLS UP TO DISTRICT VOTE

### Electors' Ballots to Decide Whether Board May Collect Extra Seven Mills for Operation and Maintenance.

#### TIME AND PLACES FOR VOTING ON SCHOOL LEVY

Where to Vote—Lincoln school for voters living north and west of Shoshone street. Block school for voters east and south of Shoshone street.

When to Vote—Polls will be open from 10 a. m. to 7 p. m. today.

Who May Vote—Voter must be legally qualified under provisions of the general statute and in addition, must be residents of the district and either a taxpayer or parent or guardian of at least one child of school age. Full taxpayers are not legal voters within the meaning of the statute at this election.


Whether to authorize or deny a tax levy of seven mills for operation of Twin Falls public schools next year is the issue presented to districts of electors of Twin Falls school district at an election today. Authorization of the levy will make possible a tax of 15 mills which the board of education deems necessary for maintenance of the Twin Falls school system for the present year.

It is estimated that the eight-mill levy which the board has authorized to make without authorization by the electors will raise \$4,777.29, and the seven-mill levy for which authorization is sought will raise \$4,089.74. The entire 15-mill levy, because of decrease in the district's property valuation, would raise some what less amount than the same levy raised last year.

Budget for the coming school year provides for a sum of \$10,482. The amount in excess of the revenue of the 15-mill levy that would be required to equal the budget total would be supplied in part by appropriation of state and county school funds, but even then, members of the board state, curtailment of expenses in some directions may be necessary.

## COUNTY CREDIT MEN OPTIMISTIC

### J. G. Adams of Buhl, Principal Speaker at Meeting of 40 Members Summarizes Views.

Optimistic views of the future economic condition of Twin Falls and surrounding towns were expressed Monday evening by J. G. Adams of Buhl, member of the board of directors of the Twin Falls County Retail Credit Men's association, in the course of an address delivered at a dinner meeting of 40 members of the credit organization in Twin Falls.

Had conditions throughout the Twin Falls country, which were caused by the heavy rains of the past six days, were not met by the speaker to be the principal factors in the economic depression that has been experienced during the past two months by merchants of Twin Falls and neighboring towns.

Mr. Adams based his assertions on personal investigation of conditions in Twin Falls and vicinity, and during the past two weeks in which he interviewed leading merchants and farmers of this section.

Towns in this vicinity, the speaker declared, depend in a large measure on the farmer for their patronage. Street conditions within Twin Falls were cited to show that in many instances rural public owners were forced to leave their machines in the garage and go to other towns for work on foot. A large percentage of the farmers, Mr. Adams said, depended entirely upon their automobiles for transportation and tax a great many cases were dropped by muddy roads of the use of this means of conveyance.

BLACKFOOT, March 7 (Sp.)—Budget for the 1927 summer Idaho state fair, which includes premiums, prizes and purses, entertainment and overhead, was fixed at \$26,976.61, and time for the show set for September 13 to 16, at a meeting of the fair board held here this afternoon.

Receipts for the exposition, based on last year's gate, were estimated at \$17,183.18, leaving a balance of \$9,793.43 to be raised by levy by the three participating counties, Bonanza, Bonneville and Bingham, a small amount, E. J. Folsom, secretary of the fair board, said, when compared with the output single counties make for their annual fair.

## Californians Take More Dairy Cattle

Three more carloads of dairy cattle were loaded here Monday for shipment to California to be distributed there among California dairymen.

Two carloads of the dairy animals were consigned by Charles Flowerdew to Hines, California, and another carload of dairy cows was sent by P. A. Hoyer to Los Angeles.

The Flowerdew shipment included the entire herd of cattle sold by E. I. Shaw, which was rated as one of the best dairy herds of this district.

During the past two weeks, according to records of Carl J. Donato, county brand inspector, California dairymen have purchased in the territory sold to Twin Falls and Filer a total of 57 dairy animals. Buyers have paid for these animals from \$90 to \$200 each and have sold them to California dairymen for from \$125 to \$200 each.

Two entire dairy herds have been included in the movement of Twin Falls dairy cattle to California, the E. I. Ellis herd having been purchased for Californians some weeks ago.


